Earl McBride is Claimed by Death

Death Tuesday claimed Earl McBride, 48, of Lubbock, former Tribune printer and resident of Matador most of his life. He died at 10 p. m. at M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, where he had recently undergone surgery for a throat tumor. He had previously been treated at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston.

Funeral services will be held here today at 2 p. m. at the First Methodist Church with Rev. Roy Patterson officiating, assisted by Rev. Miller Robinson, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist pastor, Rix Funeral Home, Lubbock, who is in charge of funeral arrangements.

The body will arrive here from Lubbock before noon, and lie in state at the church until time for the service.

Interment will be in East Mound Cemetery, with I.O.O.F. graveside rites. Members of the lodge will serve as pallbearers.

Jessie Earl McBride was born at Roscoe, Texas, December 8, 1913, and died June 12, 1962, at the age of 48 years, 6 months and 4 days. He moved with his family to Matador about 1916. He attended school here and began work as a printer apprentice in about 1929, for the Motley County News, then published by G. C. Mitchell.

He worked for the Matador Tribune in 1935 and then went to Forney, Texas where he worked for a newspaper for about a year. He returned to Matador and worked for the Tribune at various times, and continuously during the four war years. He was again employed at the Tribune after the newspaper was moved to the present new building. (Continued on back page)

LIONS CLEANUP IS RAINED OUT

Lions sponsored city-wide cleanup scheduled for Tuesday, was rained out, but the inclement weather has merely postponed the campaign for a week.

Cleanup chairman, Lion Clyde Gilbert announced Monday that heavy rains had made it impractical to start the cleanup scheduled at 6 a. m. Tuesday. He said the date has been postponed for seven days.

"Matador will need a cleanup more than ever by next week," Lion Gilbert said, "and the Lions have decided on Tuesday morning, June 19th, starting at 6 a. m. as the new date."

"The fire alarm will sound at 6 a. m. and Lions are asked to meet at the Legion Building, bring rakes, hoes, yo-yos, power mowers and other equipment to help eradicate the unsightly weeds, grass and rubbish. Resident property owners are again asked to join the campaign by cleaning their premises and vacant lots in the vicinity."

MOST IMPORTANT NEWS in Motley County is rain. Continuous waves of rainstorms have suddenly reversed the drought situation that had become critical. Farmers are looking forward to fair weather that will make it possible to get the important cotton crop planted in the approximately two weeks left of planting time.

Accurate records kept by Pharmacist Bob Stanley showed yesterday that more rain has fallen in June this year to date than during the entire month of June in 1961. This year 4.35 inches have been recorded here in June until noon of the 13th day. Last year the entire rainfall for the month of June was 4.03 inches. Last year, however, 5.49 inches fell in the month of July which aided in the production of exceptionally fine crops and range conditions.

At this date in 1961, Mr. Stanley had recorded 7.48 inches of rainfall for the year as compared with 6.76 to date this year, which is only .72-inch less.

For the same period in 1959 his records show 11.54 inches and in the same period in 1960 the total rainfall was 10.40 inches.

Crop Damage Small Hackberry Branch of Ballard Creek just north of the Tribune building was flooding the small flats Monday morning, but damage to crops from the series of storms has been limited to comparatively small areas, according to reports. A report from Patton Springs Tuesday morning said Jack Lawson had registered 3.60 inches Monday night and Tuesday morning, and that crops were seriously damaged.

An unconfirmed report from Flomot said some sections had been washed out and that hail had also damaged young crops. Only report of hail damage here was gardens damaged in the colored section of town Sunday night. According to Mrs. L. B. Turner, Tribune's Flomot correspondent, the rainfall west of Flomot since May 31, as measured on the Turner farm, has been seven inches, including rain that fell Monday morning.

Extreme electrical storm swept the Matador area in several waves early Monday, with a few "near misses" reported but no serious damage except to nerves of residents.

Observers believe the rainfall has been general over the county and entirely ample for all farming and ranching needs.

In addition to competing in contests, members attended recreational programs on Tuesday night, watched an exhibition by the A & M Sky Divers on Wednesday afternoon, and attended different programs presented by the departments of the college.

The meeting was climaxed by a program presented by professional entertainers, secured by the State 4-H Recognition committee, who also provided a barbecue Tuesday afternoon.

Pioneer Woman Dies Who Drove Ox Team

A PIONEER WOMAN who drove ox wagons, Mrs. Arch (Aunt Tennie) Black, 87, died at her home here about 3 p. m. Sunday. She had been a resident of Motley County for almost 64 years. A wagon train en route from Tennessee to Arizona paused near Weatherford, Texas, May 3, 1875 and a baby girl, one of nine children, was born to Will and Myrtle Lemons. She was named Tennessee Arizona and the Lemons wagon dropped out of the train, with the family settling in the Weatherford area.

It was here that Tennie C. Lemons, at the age of 13 in 1888 married Jim Cunningham. In the spring of 1898 they started to Motley County with their possessions which included 100 head of cattle. The cattle were quarantined in Haskell County.

Jim Cunningham left his wife and possessions, riding on to Motley County where he fenced the Cunningham Ranch, about 11 miles east of Matador, and built a dugout, then returned to Haskell County.

A blowing snowstorm swept the Foothill Country on Christmas Day, 1898, when Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham dropped a section of the new fence and drove the cattle across, then went to the protecting warmth of the dugout.

They freighted lumber with ox wagons from Childress, the nearest railroad, and built a large ranch house. Mrs. Cunningham frequently drove the oxen. The house burned in 1930 and was replaced with a smaller one.

Jim Cunningham died in the spring of 1932 and Mrs. Cunningham was married later the same year, to Arch Black. He died in 1956.

Services for Mrs. Black were held at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday at the Matador Church of Christ with Minister Leonard Dennis of Edmondson, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister. Interment was in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Scal Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were C. M. Barton, Johnny Jackson, John Stotts, Billy Wason and Raby Webb all of Matador and George Skaggs of Oklahoma City.

Survivors include two daughters, nieces whom Mrs. Black reared and later adopted, Mrs. Olga Robertson, Matador, and Mrs. Willie Langley of Westbrook, and their six children, whom she reared as grandchildren.

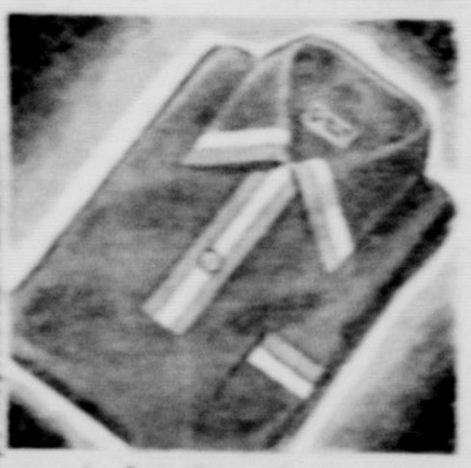

ASSISTANCE REQUESTED ON "WORM" PROGRAM

All Motley County livestock owners are requested to help in

the fight to eliminate the screw-worm. The main items for producers in this area are to doctor worms when found, and collect about 10 from the wound to send to the laboratory at Mission to determine the extent of the screw-worm infestation.

All owners are urged to pick up a mailing container from County Agent Bill Pallmeyer, so that screw-worms can be mailed to the laboratory for identification. If the infestation in the area is great enough, sterile flies will be released to help local ranchers.

Legume seed should be inoculated with fresh inoculants and must be seeded not later than the date specified. Sales invoices showing purchase of seed and fertilizer and inoculant must be furnished the county ASCS office. A good stand and growth must be obtained and left on the land or turned under. The crop must not be harvested for hay or grazed.

Guar and sesbania must be planted between May 1 and July 1, and cowpeas between May 1 and July 15. Cost share approvals will be issued at the recommended seeding rate. Not less than 75% of the recommended rate must be seeded. Fertilizer applications must also be between 75% and 125% of the recommended rate.

For seeding rates of different seed, contact your local ASCS office. (As all of the fertilizer is not consumed by the legume crop, farmers will receive benefits in following years.)

Legume Fertilizer to Receive Federal Aid

Motley County farmers who participate in the fertilized legume program will receive up to 50% of the cost of fertilizer and legume seed if the following provisions are met, according to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

Fertilizer should be applied in an amount indicated by a recent soil test, with no cost-sharing offered for the application of more than the equivalent of 200 pounds of 10-30-10 per acre. Not less than the equivalent of 100

pounds of 0-20-0 must be applied per acre unless the county committee determines that no fertilizer is needed because of a recent application on the area seeded.

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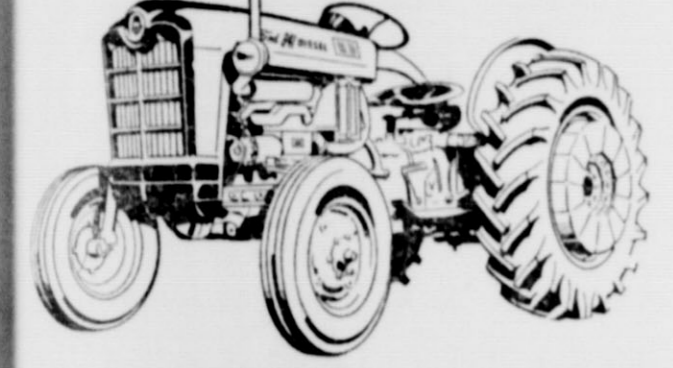

Bob York is Part of Operations where "Rockets Roar Over the Eastern Shore"

From the concrete-padded beaches of Wallops Island on Virginia's Eastern Shore, young men are lobbing million-dollar skyrockets thousands of miles high over the Atlantic in one of the nation's many defense areas.

In the group of technicians, most of whom are in the 25-28 age range, is Bob York, native of Roaring Springs, Texas. York is one of a crew posted in the blockhouse nearest to the rocket, who control the last minutes of a countdown.

Such feats are all in the scientific day's work for the small family of technicians at this National Aeronautics and Space Administration test facility, according to a recent feature, "Rockets Over the Eastern Shore," by John C. Schmidt, in the magazine section of the Baltimore (Md.) Sun.

In the accompanying photographs, York is shown with other technicians at their post in the blockhouse as they report progress to the test director, Robert T. Duffy in his nearby control center. In addition to a battery of telephones and a complicated instrument panel, the blockhouse is equipped with numerous television monitors which the technicians watch as they report the countdown.

Rocket firings at Wallops average about one a day, and an example of the close-knit operation is the firing of the Scout, a 72-foot, four-stage, solid-fuel research rocket. It is capable of putting a small satellite into orbit or lofting a 50-pound scientific payload almost straight up to a height of 10,000 miles. The fact that a Scout even without its payload costs \$1,000,000 does little to ease the tension that keeps building until the count reaches zero — the moment of firing.

It was from this installation that the monkey was fired into space and returned alive. The Echo missile which is still oration was also shot from this location.

With Chance-Vought

Mr. York, a veteran of the Korean conflict, is in the employ of Chance-Vought Aircraft Corp. and was in California for six years before being sent to Wallops Island. While on the coast he was an inspector for the Navy during the tests of firing the Regulus missile from submarine bases.

His wife is the former Shirley Estes of Matador. They have two children, Sharon 9, and Barry Scott, 7. His mother, Mrs. Etta Mae York still resides in Roaring Springs.

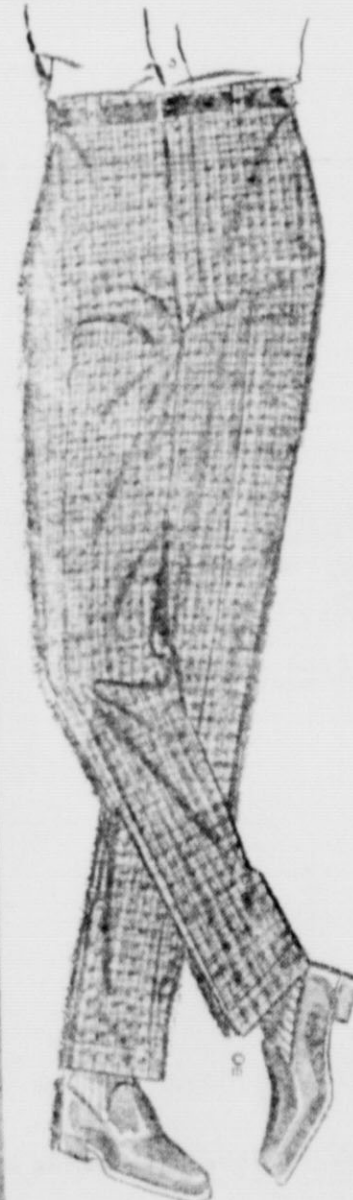
