MOST IMPORTANT NEWS in Motley County is rain. Continuous waves of rainstorms have suddenly reversed the drought situation that had become critical. Farmers are looking forward to fair weather that will make it possible to get the important cotton crop planted in the approximately two weeks left of planting time.

Accurate records kept by Pharmacist Bob Stanley showed yesterday that more rain has fallen in June this year to date than during the entire month of June in 1961. This year 4.35 inches have been recorded here in June until noon of the 13th day. Last year the entire rainfall for the month of June was 4.03 inches. Last year, however, 5.49 inches fell in the month of

July which aided in the production of exceptionally fine crops and range conditions.






