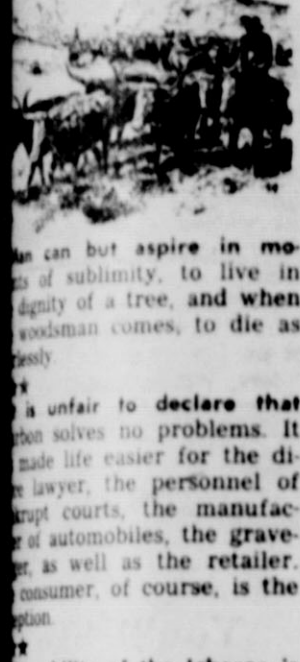

Matadors Control Dragons' Fire, 14-14

FIERY CLASS A Paducah Dragons were quenched here on Burleson Field Friday night when the Matadors soused them with a 14-14 tie score at the end of four exciting quarters of play. That the Matadors were not out classed is evidenced by their top end of 9-6 first downs and total yardage of 151 to the Dragons 123. Guy Campbell picked 51 yards to pace the Matadors ground attack.

Mavericks Skin Panthers 70-8

The Matador Mavericks started scoring when the game began and didn't quit until they had skinned the Quitaque Panthers 70-8 last Thursday night at Burleson Field in a grade school football battle.

Tim Green ran the opening kickoff back 70 yards for a touchdown, and Gary Campbell scored the extra points. Then Chuck Ezzell raced 38 yards to score with Tim Green adding the extra points. Tommie Green took over and scored on runs of 29 and 20 yards. Ezzell tallied on an 11 yard run to complete the scoring in the first quarter. Campbell and Tim Green added the two-pointers after the last two scores.

Tommie Green went 43 yards for a second period score, with Campbell adding the two-pointer.

In the third quarter Tommie Green went 15 yards to score again. Campbell scored the extra points.

The Mavericks crossed the goal line twice in the last quarter. Campbell went 8 yards and Ezzell sprinted 37 yards for the TD's. Ezzell and Tim Green made the extra points.

Dragons Again Lead

The Dragons moved back into the lead in the final quarter. They moved 62 yards for the tally with quarterback Warren Townley scoring on a 30 yard run up the middle. Gene Healy raced around left end for the extra points that put the score at 14-8.

The Big Red opened their final scoring march when they took the following kickoff on their 35 yard line. Ros Bearden gained 8, while a penalty and two running plays moved the ball to the Paducah 46. Bearden added ten more, Campbell carried for 7, Lancaster 2, Campbell 3, Bearden for 1 and Campbell moved for six more. Campbell slammed to the 12 for a first down, Lancaster carried for two, Campbell went for 2 more and a penalty moved the ball to the 4. Ros Bearden then blasted over left tackle for the six pointer. Campbell raced wide around right end on the extra point try but fell short of the goal line and the game winning extra points when he was forced out of bounds 18 inches from the goal line.

Defensively, Gale Stafford, Dale Dixon, Guy Campbell, Jimmie Welling, Buddy Davis and Ros Bearden stood out for the Matadors.

The Matadors will meet the Petersburg Buffaloes in another home game tomorrow night at Burleson Field. Game time is 8:00. The Mavericks will play the Esteline Grade Team to night at 7:30 on Burleson field.


