Robert Brandon, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Brandon, also a passenger on the scooter, was not seriously injured.

A steel rod windshield support on the bike pierced young Rattan's groin. He was brought to Stanley Hospital by a Eudy-Seale ambulance where it was impossible to X-ray his injury for some time because of excessive hemorrhaging.

His condition yesterday was reported satisfactory unless some complication results from the injury.

It is believed the bike may have struck loose gravel causing it to dislodge the two passengers.

Both boys graduated from the eighth grade last week during Matador school commencement exercises.

Man Pinned Under Tractor Two Hours

Glen Morrison, 44, farmer in the Gasoline community, east of Quitaque, was pinned beneath his overturned tractor for two hours Tuesday. Helpless to free himself, Mr. Morrison waited patiently while in extreme pain, for the passing of Rural Route Carrier Morris Wilson, who freed him.

Mr. Morrison was brought to Stanley Hospital here where examination showed that his left leg, caught by the tractor was not fractured, but severely crushed.

His condition was greatly improved late yesterday, although he is still receiving treatment. He said he started to turn his tractor around when a small embankment caved off, causing it to overturn. He tried to jump free of the tractor but his foot was caught, causing him to be pinned down until the arrival of Wilson.

Last Well Is Largest

OIL production in the West Roaring Springs field was stepped up in the completion of the latest Perkins-Prothro No. 2 J. A. Hamilton offset. It tested over 531 barrels on a 24-hour potential, and the largest producer in the field.

Report of the well as published Sunday in the oil section of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, was as follows:

"Perkins - Prothro, Wichita Falls, and Pan American Petroleum, Lubbock, potentiated the largest well in the West Roaring Springs (Permo-Pennsylvanian) field with completion of the No. 2 J. A. Hamilton, east offset to the field's most westerly well in south central Motley County.

"The well was finaled for a calculated 24-hour flowing potential of 531.84 barrels of oil, based on an actual seven hour flow through a 3/4-inch choke of 155.10 barrels of 38.7 gravity oil with a tubing pressure of 40 pounds and a gas-oil ratio of 225-1.

"Total depth is 4,210 feet. Perforations are in the Permo-Penn reef from 4,185-95 feet and were treated with 1,000 gallons.

"It is located 660 feet from north and 467 feet from west lines of Section 47, Block J, IRR survey, 2 miles east of Roaring Springs."

Test Shows Skunk Rabies Infected

The skunk which attacked little Glenda Savage, 3, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Taylor of Whiteflat, on the afternoon of May 2, was infected with rabies.

Dr. A. C. Traweck Jr. Tuesday received a report from the State Health Department, that further tests from the skunk's head, had proved the animal to be infected with rabies. An earlier report had advised Dr. Traweck that it was impossible to make the rabies test because the head was mutilated.

Later certain glands in the skunk's jaw were administered to mice which developed rabies.

The skunk bit the small girl several times until it was beaten off by the child's mother. The animal later attacked the little girl's aunt, Mrs. Levi Wilkinson, who killed it with a rock.

The child, her mother and aunt, have all received their full course of rabies vaccine and show no ill effects of their experience.

Surgery may be performed today following an exploratory test by the specialist, Dr. Jack Dunn Jr., members of the family here were informed last night.

Homes Demolished, Livestock Killed As Fast Twister Sweeps County Area

SPAWNED in the Duncan Flat area of north Dickens County, a tornado late Tuesday left an erratic path of destruction across the southeast corner of Motley County. The pioneer Duff Green home was completely demolished and obliterated. Shade trees and fruit trees as well as barns, windmills and fences were destroyed in the path of the vicious storm.

The cloud from which the tornado originated was not ominous appearing, and followed the rain and hail that had fallen earlier in the late afternoon.

City to Observe Holiday

Keeping with tradition, Matador will close Monday in the observance of Memorial Day. The Tribune was informed early this week.

First State Bank, public offices and stores will observe the holiday. A survey was made among business firms to obtain the sentiment of merchants and business operators toward closing. The Tribune was told that the majority of businesses and offices will be closed, including City and County.

Traditional Memorial Day ceremonies will be held at East Mound Cemetery by two service men's organizations, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and American Legion.

The service will be held at 7 a.m. according to arrangements made at a recent committee meeting. Heading the committee is VFW Commander Vance Gilbreath. Other members are Bill Palmeyer, Floyd Bradley, Billy Wason and Leon Smallwood. Representing the Legion on the committee are D. P. Keith, Sterling Price and Tom Hamilton.

Fleming Post American Legion will be in charge of placing flags on the graves of the war dead, officials of that organization stated.

Watch From Pickup

Mr. and Mrs. Blevins had been to the ranch when hail began falling. They backed the pickup in which they were riding, to the hail Mrs. Blevins looked up to see the tornado crossing the highway a short distance from where they were located.

At the point of the Cunningham Curve (within 100 yards of where the infant Dianna Lynn Alexander was killed in an automobile accident, May 15) the tornado ripped up a place in the paving of U.S. Highway 70. It tore down fences, snapped the tops off telephone poles, and pulled up large mesquites.

Miracle of the storm is that no life was lost, and no one seriously injured. Many unusual incidents are associated with the storm. A room in the Carol Johnson home near the Motley-Dickens Counties line east of State Highway 70, had the linoleum pulled out from under the furniture and collected in a corner, although the home was not seriously damaged.

After the tornado crossed South Pease River it hit the Turner Bros. Ranch, overturned a trailer and partly unroofed the house. It then turned toward the Stearns Estate ranch.

Played Hide and Seek

Alvin Stearns, who had just reached the ranch, was watching the cloud through binoculars, and played hide and seek with it in his pickup. He would drive toward the Glenn place in the Flag Springs area, until the funnel appeared to be coming his direction, then he would drive the other direction.

Two empty houses on the Stearns Ranch were completely demolished and the wheel of a windmill was twisted out of shape.

For several hours Matador was cut off from outside communications about 10 p.m. There was no power failure here, although Patton Springs and Glenn areas were without power when the storm left a tangled mass of transmission lines.

City Wages War On Stray Dogs

All stray dogs without tags are doomed in a new "cold war" announced recently by the City Council. New dog catcher Louie Edwards has been authorized by the city to pick up all stray dogs without tags, and to destroy them after three days if not claimed by the owners.

The dogs may be reclaimed by the owners by paying \$1 per day, plus 50¢ per day for feed. Dogs must also be vaccinated if they have not recently received a rabies shot.

A drive to clean up the city was also launched recently by the city officials, and the council also issued a reminder that it is a violation of city ordinances to keep livestock within the city limits, if the animals create a nuisance to neighbors.

COME TO CHURCH SUNDAY

Over 1,000 Rural Electric Districts Celebrate Program's 25th Anniversary

Today marks the Silver Jubilee, the 25th anniversary of the Rural Electrification Administration program. In the quarter century just past, there has been a tremendous development, that of bringing power to rural America.

May 11, 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 7037, establishing the R.E.A., which has meant, in a short period of 25 years, the formation of over 1,000 rural electric cooperatives and power districts. As a result of the program, over 96% of the farms

now have electric service compared to 11% in May 1935, 25 years ago. With reference to our own local area in parts of seven counties, over 99% have that service.

Federal agency status was attained by the R.E.A. upon the passage of the Norris-Rayburn Act which was signed into law on May 20, 1936.

During 1959, R.E.A. borrowers made payments to the Government totaling \$145,000,000. This figure includes principal and interest due plus an additional \$15,000,000 in payments made in advance of due dates. The balance of advance payments which electric borrowers have with R.E.A. now stands at \$154,000,000. Including that amount, borrowers have repaid more than \$823,000,000 on the principal of their loan obligations. They have also paid \$397,000,000 in interest which is some \$50,000,000 above what the money has cost the government in interest. At the close of the 1959 report, only one electric borrower was delinquent in payments, amounting to only \$97,579.

In Texas, the rural electric cooperatives have paid \$55,000,000 on the principal of their government loans. In addition, they have paid \$32,000,000 in interest and \$12,000,000 ahead of schedule. As of January 1, 1960, no borrower in the state was overdue in its loan payments.

The Hall County Electric Cooperative, Inc. was incorporated in 1938 by the following pioneers in rural electrification in this area: R. D. Hall, T. E. Lenoir, Edgar Foster, Mrs. N. A. Hightower, Mrs. Chas. A. Williams, W. H. Youngblood, H. D. Tyler, H. A. Hodges, H. C. Fowler, C. M. Hawkins, Jake Lamb, and B. L. Gresham.

The first loan from R.E.A. was for \$95,000 in 1939 for construction of 117 miles of line to serve approximately 300 meters from the Eli metering point west of Memphis. Since that date the Cooperative has negotiated 13 new loans bringing the aggregate total to \$1,549,000 borrowed, sufficient to serve approximately 2,500 meters on 1,000 miles of line in the operating area. At the end of 1959, the Cooperative had repaid \$338,000 in principal and \$150,000 in interest to R.E.A. and at this date is operating in the black on a current basis.

The Cooperative has 10 employees with an annual payroll of \$41,000.00.

The power distributed through Cooperative lines is purchased from West Texas Utilities Co.

The Cooperative is a locally owned and controlled organization being directly responsible to its 1,500 members through its present board of directors.

The board meets monthly and the entire membership convenes once a year, the next annual meeting being August 4th, 1960.

J. W. Coppedge is the present manager having been employed in April 1952.

The aim of the organization in 1938 as noted in the By-Laws was to make electric energy available to its members at the lowest cost consistent with sound economy and good management. It isn't anticipated that this aim will be changed as we enter the next 25 years of the Rural Electrification Program.

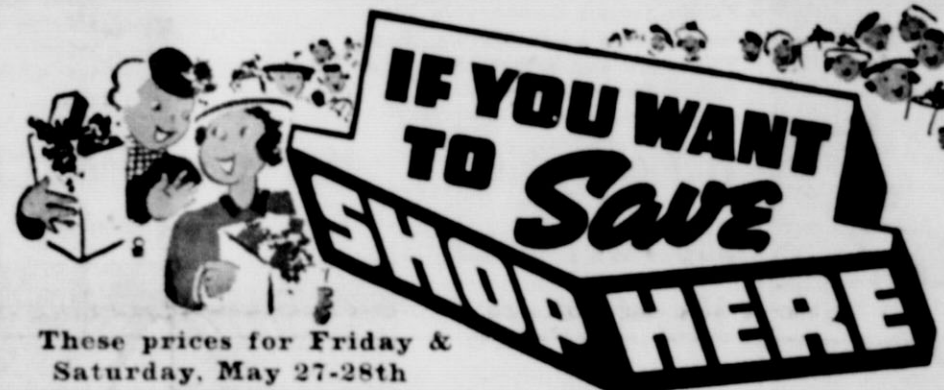

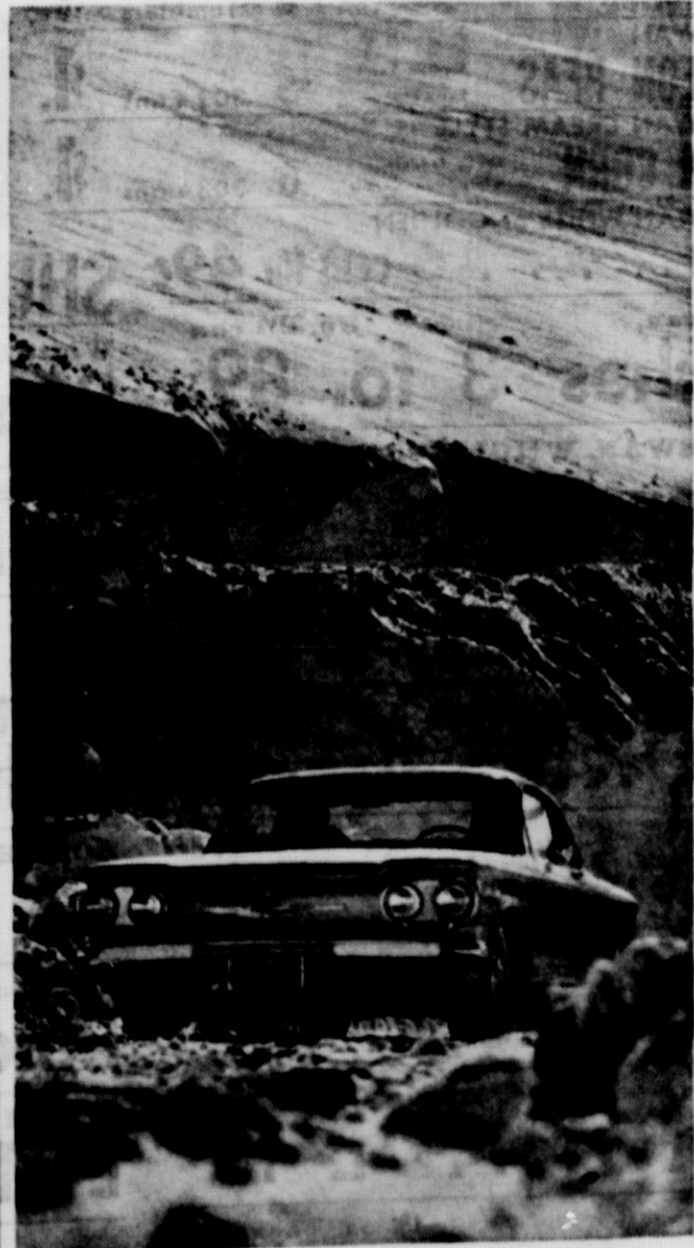

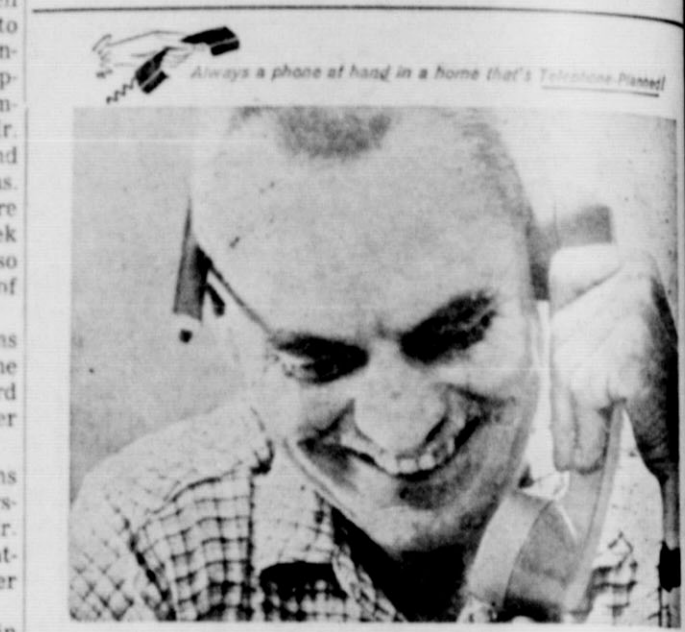
