Farmers Informed On Insect Control

the best position to know the situation in his field.

When controls are necessary, he told the farmers, timing, using the correct amount of insecticide, coverage of plants and intervals between applications are all keys in a successful control program. For example, in late season boll weevil control, the plant must be covered with insecticide for 16-21 days, as this is the life cycle of the weevil. If only one or two applications

are used, less than 50% of the weevils will be controlled, as many are still in the bolls in the form of larvae which can not be reached. This can be done by using four to five applications at five-day intervals however, while the two applications are not economical.

In many cases one application of early season control can be very effective in weevil control. Weevils start laying eggs when the squares are about one-third grown.
