Note that the automobile has gas lights and that the steering wheel is on the right hand side. Texas Rangers Once The Law in Matador

GRIM-FACED TEXAS RANGERS once walked the boardsidewalk streets of Matador and held the newly-established county seat under martial law. Most of the citizenship, estimated at 100 to 150, were glad to have the Rangers here.

It happened in 1893, two years after the county was established. Harry H. Campbell, county pioneer, whose father established the Matador Ranch, was a boy, and remembers the details of the trouble. His father, Henry H. Campbell, was the counties first judge

The Commissioners Court impeached Sheriff Jim Beaucham for misappropriation of funds, and tossed him out of office The court then appointed J. L. Moore as Sheriff, who in turn appointed two deputies. Beaucham left the country and went to Oklahoma to participate in a land run.

Beaucham, who Mr. Campbell aid, had many friends, returned. He was arresed on some 'trumped up" charge, but was not placed in jail. He was guarded by deputies. Beaucham managed to gather a group of his friends and disarmed the

"I am the high sheriff of Motley county and no damn set of men can carry guns, if I can't. Friends finally persuaded Beaucham to leave town to avoid bloodshed.

The Matador Ranch "was at odds" with Beaucham because he had previously arrested a number of cowboys for getting drunk and shooting up the town before they returned to ranch headquarters about a mile away. The ranch was in sympathy with the appointed sheriff



FORMER HOME of the Matador Tribune was the old Kanzler building on the south side of the "square," one of Matador's first and largest buildings. It was built by A. Kanzler, a German-born blacksmith who came here in 1901, and W. P. Gilpin, early-day county judge. Top floor of the building was rented for offices and apartments. Chalk's Hardware (when above picture was made) was located in the store on the right, downstairs, where in December, 1933, the first issue of the Tribune published in Matador rolled off the press. An earlier Matador Tribune had been printed for seven issues in Floydada by the Hesperian Publishing Company. In March, 1934, the Tribune moved to the Masonic building on the highway, where it was published until the Tribune's own building was constructed in 1953, almost on the same site on Main street, west side of the "square," where Motley County's first newspaper plant opened about 1894.
