Amount of the transaction was not disclosed but the sale includes all equipment and stock of the firm. Equipment includes storage tanks, transport and delivery trucks. The office will remain in the same location.

"We feel extremely fortunate in the sale to Mr. and Mrs. Cooper," Mrs. Thacker declared late Tuesday, "because he is a native son, well-known and well-liked by the people. We know that he will continue to serve our loyal customers in a manner which they have a right to expect."

# The Noble Experiment And A Pledge Renewed

We are nearing the bicentennial of our nation's birth. It might do all of us good to read, or reread, the words of Thomas Jefferson in our Declaration of Independence. This document and the war that followed it led to the noble experiment that is our U. S. Constitution.

Although we honor the signing of the Declaration on the Fourth of July, the resolution was actually adopted on the second. The final names of the 56 signers were not revealed until six months after the event for fear of British reprisals. The lone dissenter was Pennsylvania's John Dickinson, who held out with the hope of reconciliation with the mother country.

One of the many acts of personal courage foretelling the determination of the colonials was that of Delaware's Caesar Rodney, who rode eighty miles to Philadelphia to cast his vote. Rodney was dying of cancer and had been bedridden.

John Adams, who had deferred to Jefferson in the writing of the document, wrote to his beloved wife, Abigail, on July 3, 1776: "Yesterday the greatest question was decided which ever was debated in America; and a greater perhaps never was, nor will be, decided among men. A resolution was passed without one dissenting colony, that these United Colonies are, and of a right ought to be, free and independent States."

And then they marched to war. Thirteen pitiful little colonies armed with a pipe dream. Thirteen stars on a field of blue against the mighty Union Jack. But they had their dream of freedom and independence. They had a cause to further. They had a grievance with King George. When it was over they had the embryo of a nation.

It was a difficult fight and it took time, but from this noble experiment came a new giant. It isn't over yet. It will take all of us working together. The founders of the nation were men unaccustomed to cooperation. Their interests and occupations were as dissimilar as some of the differ-

ences that separate us today. But they managed to unite through the qualities and goals they held in common. There was honorable compromise, and debate with a minimum of emotion. We must equal their courage if we are to continue to enjoy the blessings gained through their sacrifice.

### A PLEDGE RENEWED

In his report to his constituents, Rep. Gene Snyder, of Kentucky, reprinted the text of the January 14, 1969, description of the Pledge of Allegiance by the TV great, Red Skelton.

It is so meaningfully eloquent that it bears repeating. Mr. Skelton said:

"I remember this one teacher. To me, he was the greatest teacher, a real sage of my time. He had such wisdom. We were all reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, and he walked over. Mr. Lasswell was his name. He said: 'I've been listening to you boys and girls recite the Pledge of Allegiance all semester, and it seems as though it is becoming monotonous to you. If I may, may I recite it and try to explain to you the meaning of each word: I—me, an individual, a committee of one. Pledge—dedicate all of my worldly goods to give without self-pity. Allegiance—my love and my devotion.

To the Flag—our standard, Old Glory, a symbol of freedom. Wherever she waves, there is respect because your loyalty has given her a dignity that shouts freedom is everybody's job. Of the United—that means that we have all come together. States—individual communities that have united into 48 great states—48 individual communities with pride and dignity and purpose, all divided by imaginary boundaries, yet united in a common purpose, and that's love for country.

Of America and to the Republic—a state in which sovereign power is invested in representatives chosen by the people to govern. And government is the people and it's from the people to the leaders, not from the leaders to the people. For which it stands.

One Nation—meaning so blessed by God. Indivisible—incapable of being divided. With liberty—which is freedom and the right of power to live one's own life without threats or fear of some sort of retaliation. And justice—the principle or quality of dealing fairly with others. For all—which means it's as much your country as it is mine."

"Since I was a small boy, two states have been added to our country and two words have been added to the Pledge of Allegiance—'under God.'"

"Wouldn't it be a pity if someone said, 'That's a prayer,' and that would be eliminated from schools, too?"

It certainly would. And wouldn't it be a pity if there were no Americans such as Red Skelton to remind us.

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

The small grain variety test planted by Susie and Darrel Marshall on September 28 was harvested on June 6 with results as follows:

OATS: Cimarron 86 bushels per acre, Bronco 61 bushels per acre, New Nortex 59 bushels per acre, Norwin 56 bushels per acre.

BARLEY: Will 19 bushels per acre.

Samples were also weighed to determine forage production per acre. Including the grain, the following amount of forage was produced:

OATS: Cimarron 4140 lbs. per acre, Bronco 4480 lbs. per acre, New Nortex 3050 lbs. per acre, Norwin 2610 lbs. per acre.

BARLEY: Will 1520 lbs. per acre.

Other varieties that were included in the test were Cordova barley, Gator rye, Caddo, Improved Triumph, Scout 66, Tascosa, and Warrior wheat. All of these varieties were killed by the greenbugs as no attempts were made to control this insect, thereby, allowing for the collection of information relative to greenbug resistance of the varieties included in the test.

Tokak barley was also included as were Elbon, and Elk rye. These varieties survived and showed excellent growth and yield ability. Due to a misunderstanding none of these plots were left to obtain a sample for yield information.

Speltz was also planted but as the stand was very poor no information was gained upon this grain.

Varieties were also rated for maturity time. For the oats, New Nortex was the first variety ready to cut, followed closely by Norwin, Cimarron was a week to 10 days later and Bronco was the slowest to mature, being approximately 2 weeks slower than Cimarron.

Tokak and Will barley appeared to have the same maturity time and approximately the same as Norwin oats.

Elbon and Elk rye also indicated the same maturity which was similar to the Cimarron oat variety.

The purpose of this test was to gain information on small grain varieties for Motley County producers. In addition to yield and forage abilities information on

greenbug resistance was also obtained. One year tests cannot be used to provide recommendations, therefore, the small grains test will be repeated in the fall of 1969.

Producers who are interested in a particular variety are urged to let me know the varieties of their interest so the can be included in the 1969-70 test.

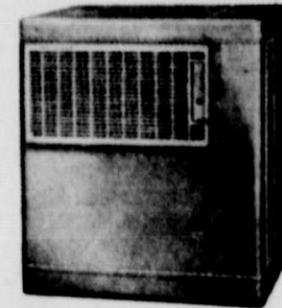
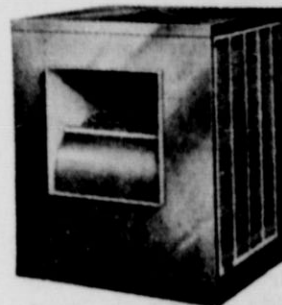
