County Incomes Up After "Recession"

NEW YORK, Dec. 25—What sort of a comeback have Motley County residents achieved since the depression? How much of a recovery has been made in the way of local incomes and of business in general?

According to a new economic report, detailing conditions in every part of the country, Motley County rebounded well. The study, released by the Standard Rate and Data Service, covers the fiscal year from July 1, 1958, to July 1, 1959.

It shows that local residents had considerably more money to spend, after payment of taxes, than they had in the prior year.

Roaring Springs Pioneer Claimed

Funeral services for J. D. Green, 85, pioneer of Dickens and Motley counties were held at 2 p. m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Roaring Springs, with the pastor, Rev. Bob Moore, officiating.

Mr. Green passed away at 3:30 a. m. Saturday at Spur Memorial Hospital, where he had been a patient for two weeks. He had been in failing health for several years.

Burial was in the Afton cemetery, with Eudy-Seale Funeral Home of Matador in charge of arrangements. Pallbearers were Melvin Meason and Alvin Stearns of Matador; Dean McIntire, Bill Cooper, Banty Brandon and Hollis Godfrey, all of Roaring Springs.

Was Native Texas
John Duff Green was born at Lampasas, Texas, November 19, 1874, the son of the late Col. and Mrs. John A. Green. He died January 16, 1960, at the age of 85 years, 1 month and 27 days. He was a retired stockman-farmer, and member of the Baptist Church.

He moved to Stonewall County in 1889 with his parents. Col. Green, a well-known lawyer, county surveyor and soldier, was in the Black Horse Cavalry and was with Gen. Robert E. Lee at the battle of Gettysburg. Upon moving to Stonewall County he built the first house in Aspermont. Col. Green and his family moved to Dickens County in 1891.

Duff Green met Miss Myra Kelly who was teaching school at Afton, and they were married December 24, 1901, at Afton. They moved to their ranch eight miles east of Roaring Springs, where they lived until moving into Roaring Springs in 1955.

Their first home was a half dugout on the south bank of Tongue River where they lived

Their incomes amounted to \$5,859,000 net, compared with \$5,833,000 previously.

Per household, determined by dividing the total by the number of household units, this was equivalent to a spendable income of \$6,368.

It was more than was available to most families in the United States, where the average was \$6,082 per household. In the State of Texas, it was \$5,466.

Locally, it appears, the year of recession caused less of an upheaval than it did in many areas, where there was less stability and fewer resources to fall back upon.

Most of the year's earnings in Motley County, it is shown, went into purchases of consumer goods in the local retail stores.

A backlog of needs and wants had been accumulating during the previous year, when people were spending their money very cautiously. More than the usual proportion of their earnings was being used by them for the retirement of existing debt and for savings.

The retail stores in Motley County, as a result, were able to chalk up a sales volume of \$3,130,000.00 in the fiscal year. This compares with \$2,970,000 in the prior year.

Almost every type of retail business showed a gain, especially those selling durable goods, which were hardest hit during the depression.

M. C. JONES NAMED "COACH OF YEAR"

A Flomot man, M. C. (Salty) Jones, coach of the Roscoe Plowboys the past two years, recently was named "Coach of the Year," in the 1959 Abilene Reporter-News Class A All-Abilene Area football.

Jones was named to the honor after guiding the Plowboys to their first district championship since 1945. The Plowboys went through District 6-A unbeaten and lost only to Merkel, Albany and state finalist Sundown (coached by Ray Hopkins who was named Coach of the Year of the South Plains area). The contest with Sundown was in the playoffs.

Coach Jones is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Jones of Flomot, and a graduate of Flomot High School. He attended Tarleton State College two years, then when to Sul Ross where he received his B.S. and Masters degrees.

He coached at Flomot one year, was assistant coach at Roscoe three years, and has served as head coach two years. His team also won district basketball honors last year.

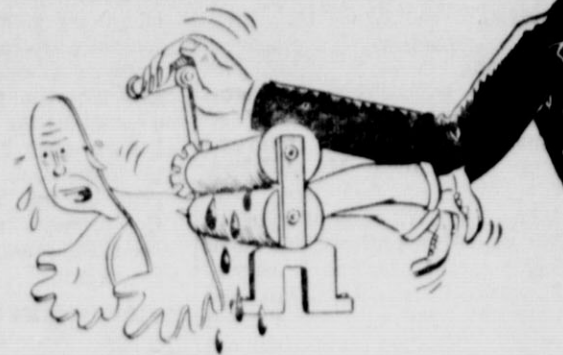
