FARMERS WHO OPERATE the 386 farms in Motley County each averaged a gross income of \$14,175 in 1959, according to a tabulation released on a district basis by the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas. They were compiled on a county basis by Progressive Farmer magazine and

published last week in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. Total Motley County gross income in 1959 was \$5,471,793, according to the figures. This includes farm income from all sources excepting government payments.

Motley County ranked well in the non-irrigation South Plains area. The average Dickens County farmer, for instance, had a gross income of \$11,921 but Dickens County is rated with 646 farms. Garza County (Post) was listed with exactly the same total gross income (probably an error) as Motley County, but Garza County has 124 more farmers than Motley, and the average income was only \$12,550.

Motley County was far from being one of the top 25 counties in the state. Harris County (Houston) was in that group with a total gross farm income of \$20,295,660, but pity the poor Harris County farmer whose average was only \$5,247, or about one-third of the Motley County average income. Harris County has 3,868 farmers.

But these figures are peanuts. The South Plains area had 17 of the 25 top farm income counties in 1959. 
