COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS: NO SHARP BREAK SEEN IN 1960 CATTLE PRICES

A sharp break in cattle prices is not likely in 1960 but we are entering a period which calls for wariness, is the latest word from John McHaney, A&M extension economist.

The small increase in cattle slaughter expected for 1960, together with a large hog slaughter, will take the bloom off cattle prices.

Imports of live animals and meat accounted for about nine per cent of our meat supply in 1959. However, McHaney said imports are not expected to be quite as large in 1960.

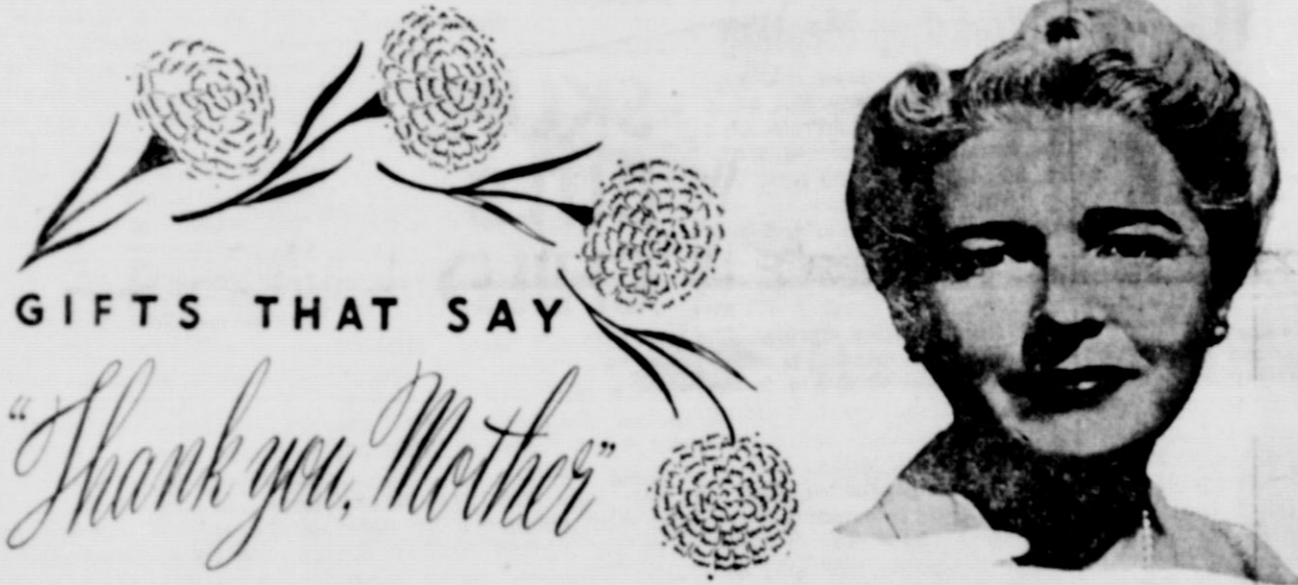

Reading Develops Our Youth's Minds

The child who enjoys reading and has free access to books will develop, by himself, a mind capable of withstanding the stresses of the modern world, a University of Michigan education professor has told school librarians.

Prof. Donald E. P. Smith, chief of the UM reading improvement services, described the gradual growth of children's literary tastes to some 300 conferees at the 10th annual spring conference of the Michigan Assn. of school librarians.

"Children's taste in reading develops spontaneously," he said. "If your high school boys spend their reading time in the library pouring over the sports page, make the sports pages of several newspapers available. They learn to read on the sports page just as I learned from pulp magazines. When they have had enough, they'll move to the feature columns, then to the news columns and finally to magazines and books."

"If younger children spend their time in reading comic books, make comic books available in quantity. They take their first faltering steps there and as the plots become repetitive, these

neophyte bibliophiles move spontaneously to animal stories and beyond. If they ask for the literary problem of the comic book let them have it. Above all give them time to grow."

"The second condition for reading enjoyment is free access to books. Our responsibility is to make books available to children rather than to choose books for them," the reading specialist urged.

Entire Population of County Could Now Travel at One Time in Own Automobiles

(Special to the Tribune)

NEW YORK - The automobile is playing an ever-increasing role, year after year, in the lives of Motley County residents.

Today, only a small percentage of local families are without cars. It would now be possible as a result, for the entire population of the county to be carborne at one time - using only the front seats, in fact.

According to a recent national survey on the distribution of cars among the population, it was found that the ratio, in Motley County, came to 115 cars per 100 households as of the early part of last year, compared with 109 per 100 in the United States. It was 111 in the West South Central States.

The figure is from a market study, covering the entire country, conducted by the Standard Rate and Data Service.

Just how much progress this represents may be seen by referring back to similar figures, published by the Department of Commerce for 1936.

At that time there were only 57 cars per 100 families in the county, well below the current 115.

The growth in car ownership reflects the rise in living standards. As people go higher on the income scale, as has been the case locally, their ability to buy cars naturally improves.

This is apparent in the great increase in passenger car registrations in Motley County since the Commerce Department's 1936 report.

At that time there were 868 passenger cars registered, compared with 1,060 on January 1, 1959, according to SRDS. The rise amounted to 21.8 percent.

The forecasters see no immediate limit to the growth in the number of cars on the road by

1975, they estimate, Americans will have nearly 100 million cars, as against the 57 million at present.

The average driver, using his car for transportation and for vacation jaunts, now travels some 10,000 miles a year, states the American Automobile Association.

Motley County drivers, with the number of cars at their disposal, cover 11 million miles in the course of a year, at that rate. The urge to travel and see the country is becoming possible for more and more people, thanks to the trend toward a shorter work week and more leisure time.



New Stamp Issued Commemorates SCS

A new 4-cent water conservation stamp went on sale Apr. 19 at local post offices to commemorate the Soil Conservation Service.

The stamp, printed in three colors went on sale last week in Washington, D. C., at the Seventh National Watershed Congress. The unique two-part stamp portrays a close-up view of a drop of water falling from a leaf, which symbolizes the influences of land and vegetation upon water supply. This design leads the eye into a right-hand panel depicting an actual small watershed panorama.

People and industries in the town in the foreground are dependent for their water upon the watershed above, which ideally includes conservation-managed farm and forest lands and small dams for flood prevention and water storage.

The Upper Pease Soil Conservation District is among those local groups being honored by the latest in a series of conservation commemorative postage stamps, according to D. I. W. Birnie, vice-chairman of its board of supervisors.

Mr. Birnie pointed out that virtually every community in the country has a water problem of some sort - too much (periodic floods), too little (drouths), or too poor (polluted).

"On the Upper Pease watershed, for which our district is named, we usually try to hold the water where it falls-on the farm or ranch," Birnie continued. "But occasionally we do get

a temporary surplus which we must dispose of with as little damage from run-off as possible. This points up the need for grassed waterways like the Soil Conservation Service has helped install on the A. D. Mosely farm at Flomot and the farms of Marvin Patton, Matador, and Casey Jones, Roaring Springs."
