How much does research cost? The better question would be What is research worth? Research is indeed the pro

verbial "stitch in time." Medical research has brought about many outstanding drugs and spectacular operations which save individual lives and relieve suffering, but more outstanding and spectacular are the advances in preventive medicine that have been made which stop suffering before it starts.

Economically speaking, preventive medicine has saved the people of the United States count less dollars. 

Other items developed solely through research include the Salk vaccine and steriod (cortisome) compounds-which prevent blindness relieve arthritis, and aid skin diseases and allergic conditions

Who can put a price on the suffering and crippling averted because of them. The life expectancy of Americans now born is now past 70 years of age. In just 17 years-1937 to 1954-it increased 9.6 years.

This means, because of the decline in the death rate, over \$770 million additional federal income taxes was received in 1955 alone, plus the accompanying rise in earning power and productivity from an increase
