Kenny Barton started the scoring last week early in the first quarter when he rammed over right tackle and raced 35 yards for the score. Extra points try failed.

The next score came only minutes later when Lloyd Martin raced around right end and ran 62 yards for the TD. Try for extras again failed. Late in the 1st quarter Gary Lancaster raced around right end and went in to score from 8 yds. out. Again the try for extras failed.

Lancaster opened the scoring in the 2nd quarter with a drive over left end and a 30 yd. gallop, but again the extra try was NG. Mike Barton ended the 2nd period scoring with a plunge off left tackle and a 35-yd. run. David Rattan kicked the extra point and the half-time score was 31-0.

Paducah's only score came in the 3rd quarter when quarterback Bill Neskorik ripped 13 yards to the end zone. Try for the extra failed.

Matador scored once in the 3rd quarter when Lancaster passed to end Tim Green. Try for extra failed. Early in the 4th fullback Ken Pitts plunged over right guard from one yard to score. Martin ran the extra.

Carr Charges Youth With Responsibility

"YOURS IS THE GENERATION OF destiny," Attorney General elect Waggoner Carr of Lubbock Sunday night told the many young people in his Veterans' Day address at the First Baptist Church here. "The destiny of this great nation is in your hands and its future is your responsibility."

"I feel that the thousands who have given their lives to make this nation strong and free, would want me to tell you that the future is your challenge," Mr. Carr said.

"Here in a nation that has only 7% of the world's population, more than 50% of the world's wealth is held. You are fortunate by reason of having been born in America but your inheritance is charged with responsibility."

"It is the rule of nations down through the pages of history, that they begin to decay at 150 years of age. That is the age of the United States.

"This decay begins," Mr. Carr said, "with the loss of morals, followed by increased crime and finally barbarism. The pattern has not changed in the past—the communists have said your grandchildren will live under their rule, not because they have conquered you but because your grandchildren prefer it."

"Crime is growing at great strides, and over 40% of the 12,000 in Texas correction institutions are under 24 years of age—it is your responsibility to keep this nation from sliding into the vice age—not the generation that let America destroy itself—it will depend on the manner in which you carry the torch of those who have died for freedom."

Mr. Carr was introduced by his former associate in the House of Representatives, Judge Elbert Reeves. Furman Vinson served as master of ceremonies, invocation was by Rev. Miller Robinson. Pledge of Allegiance was led by Eagle Scout Kenneth Pitts. Special music was a solo by Mrs. Glenn Woodruff and benediction was by Rev. Roy Patterson.

The county-wide program was sponsored by Veterans of Foreign Wars and Fleming Post American Legion.

The service will be held Wednesday at 7:00 p.m. at the First Baptist Church. Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor of the Methodist Church will bring the message, and the choirs from both churches will combine to furnish the music. Singers from the other churches in the community are invited to participate also.

The oldest resident of Motley County died early Sunday morning, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. R. Patrick, with whom she resided. She had fallen Saturday night, and death was believed caused by internal hemorrhaging.

Rev. Gene Hawkins, pastor of the Lockney First Baptist Church, former pastor here, officiated, assisted by Rev. Miller Robinson, present pastor and Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under direction of Eudy Seale. Funeral Home, Grandsons and nephews served as pallbearers.

The former Margaret Catherine Whitlock was born March 7, 1861 in Russellville, Colbert County, Alabama, one month after the Confederate government was established at Montgomery. She died November 11, 1962 having attained the age of 101 years, 8 months and four days.

She came to Texas in 1906 with her family, settling at Paris, in Lamar County. She came to Matador in 1927 with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Patrick, and had resided here since that time.

She was married to Joe Watkins, and following his death, she had been a widow since his death in 1902.

In 1960, Mrs. Fisher, then 99, set herself a goal to live to be 100. She achieved it, with a

year to spare. She was not able to celebrate her 101st birthday this year however, because of the flu.

She had remained alert and fairly active during her declining years, and in 1960 when she achieved her goal of 100 years, five generations of descendants were present for a family meal as a pre-birthday celebration. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Patrick, Matador, and Mrs. Annie Patterson of Lubbock, 10 grandchildren, 18 great-grandchildren and 18 great-great-grandchildren.

Tourist Here from Berlin

HITLER'S LEGIONS WERE MARCHING toward world conquest in 1940 when a daughter was born to a Berlin pharmacist and his wife. Last week the daughter, Heide Ropnack, 22, arrived in Matador as a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Campbell. She is following an itinerary of girlhood dreams that included a visit to the United States and actual work on a Texas ranch.

How Heide Ropnack achieved her dream is a story of determination. Her memories of the war are vague. As the bombing of Berlin became more intense her father moved his family away to a farm at Christmastime in 1943. Her grandmother stayed although every other house in the block was struck by a bomb. Heide remembers a big pit in the yard where the Russians had based a large gun and later removed it.

"We were glad to see the Americans," she declared "because the invading Russians had taken our possessions. We were near the Autobahn when the American soldiers came and we rushed to meet them. They gave us white bread which we had not seen in a long time, and candies. We tossed flowers before them." She was then five years old.

Heide went to school in Berlin after the war. She dreamed of America and studied English for 9 years. After she finished high school she went to England and worked as a hotel clerk. During the period she acquired a "pen pal" in Atlanta, Ga. with whom she has corresponded for six years.

This friend proved to be the source of her trip to America. The family of her pen pal decided to sponsor her and suddenly the way was open for her to come to the United States on a tourist visa. She has been here six months and during that time has worked in a depart-

ment store in Atlanta.

Miss Ropnack has visited New York and Washington and other cities of the east and south, but the worn German map of the United States on which she has traced her itinerary, included Texas and especially a ranch in Texas.

"I wanted to visit the Panhandle, and I just like the name Matador," she said, "so I wrote a letter to the mayor of Matador." Mayor Bill Seale received the letter and gave it to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Campbell. They decided to invite the German girl to visit them. Last week they met the bus at Dickens and brought her to Matador.

She has ridden a horse, driven a pickup truck and tractor and still looks forward to more ranch work. She likes America very much, "but Americans have it so easy," she said, "and there is such an abundance of everything. Perhaps that is the reason there is so much waste as compared to (Continued on back page)

Girls Are Found Physically Fit

Physical fitness tests recently given to Matador High School girls show they are in good physical condition. This nation-wide project, promoted by President Kennedy's

Council on Youth Fitness, has for its goal a nation of physically fit young men and women. To obtain this goal, the importance of keeping physically fit is being stressed at all school levels.

A series of events have been chosen as a basis to determine the student's strong and weak points. These tests are given three times during the school year in order to check the progress and growth of each student.

Ninety-nine per cent of the high school girls passed four or more of the seven required events, with scores rating from poor to excellent. The events and the per cent that passed each were as follows: sit-ups, 94 per cent; shuttle run, 92 per cent; broad jump, 92 per cent; 50-yard-dash, 84 per cent; softball throw, 84 per cent; and, 600-yard-run-walk, 76 per cent.

The school officials are very pleased with the results of the program.

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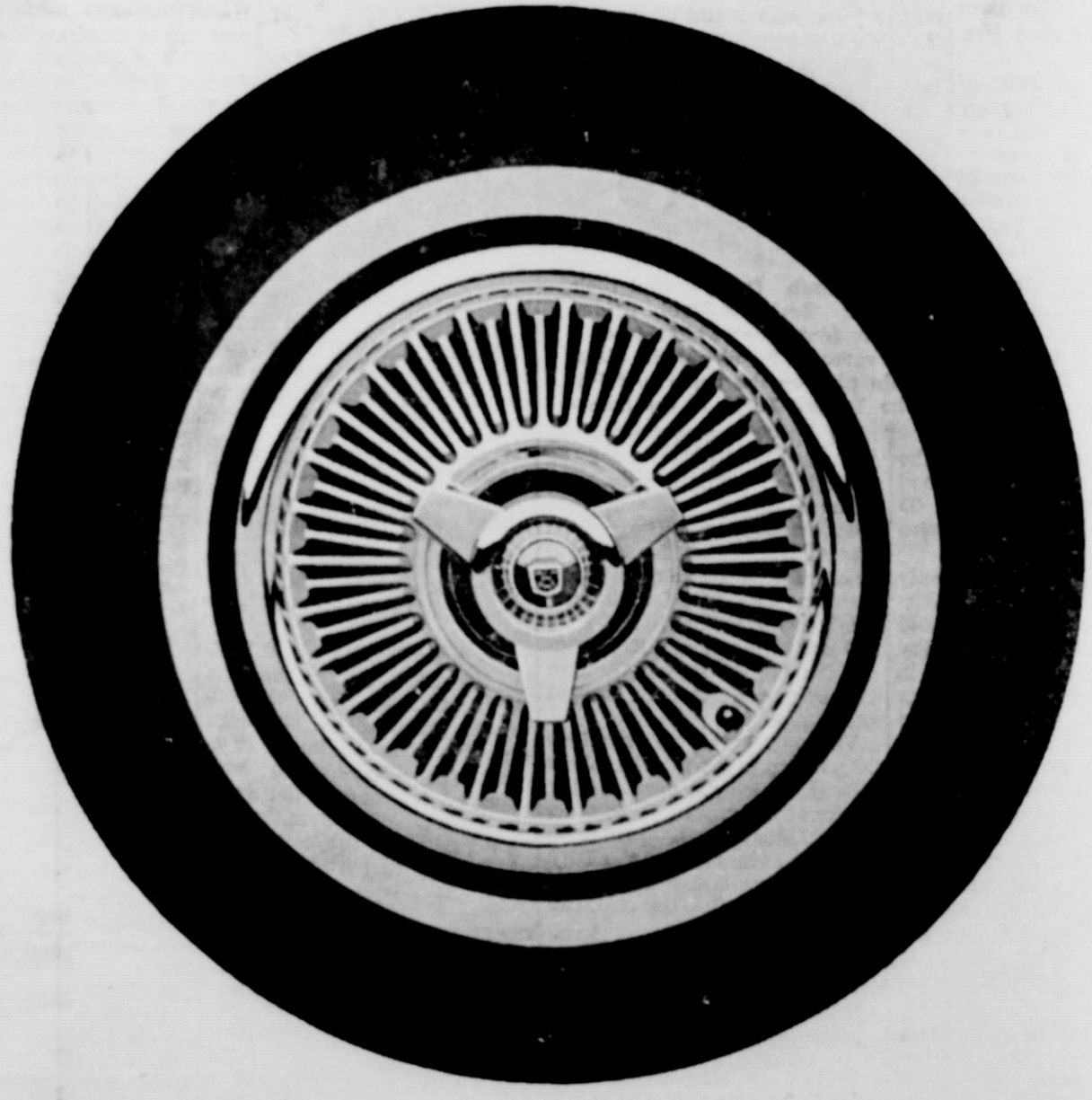
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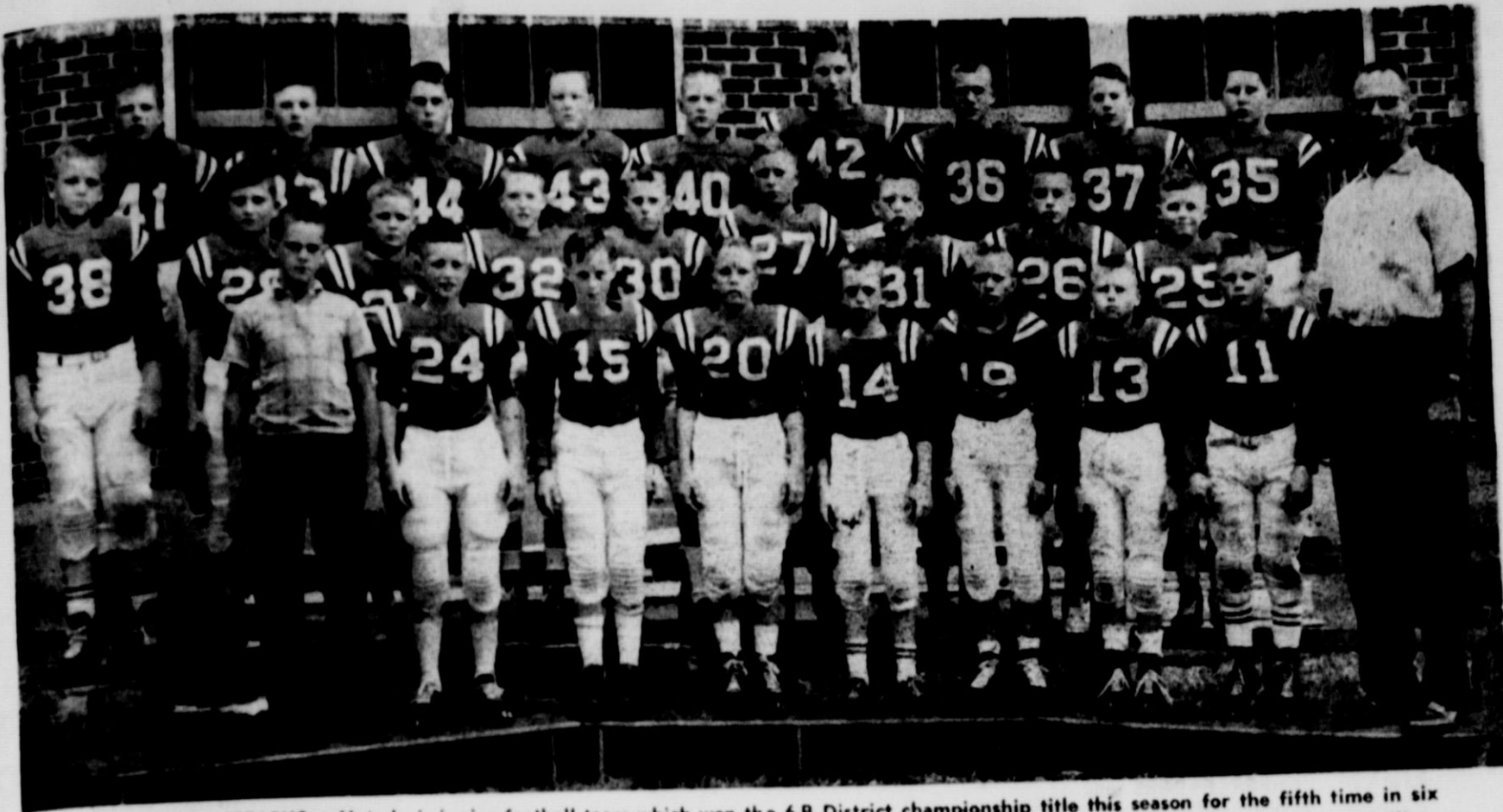

OBITUARY

G. E. Hamilton Held In Highest Esteem

G. E. Hamilton was held in the highest esteem not only by his family, but the great circle of friends extending to the length and breadth of Texas. Up until his retirement he was an able lawyer, a political authority and an accurate historian. He had witnessed Matador's growth from a few scattering false-front wooden buildings to a modern community of brick, concrete and steel. He remembered the windmills, hitch-racks and plank sidewalks.

"Judge" G. E. Hamilton stood on the bridge that linked the pioneer with the jet age, and his sharp perception weighed the good and evil of both. An astute businessman, he saw and had a part in the miracle of development, but his life was dedicated to the Methodist Church in which he held continuous membership for 79 years.

For sixty-two years he had been a member of the Matador Methodist Church. He had served as steward, Sunday School Superintendent, Charge Lay-leader, teacher of the Men's Bible Class for over thirty years, and was a delegate to Annual Conference for thirty consecutive years.

Honored By Community

Four years ago Matador honored Judge Hamilton as one of its most outstanding and influential citizens, on the event of his 87th birthday. He was a humble and grateful man and received the tributes paid him, with simple appreciation.

Georgs Elbert Hamilton was born in the small Georgia village of Subigna, September 4, 1871. He came to Texas at the age of 21, to work and study law in the office of O. H. Cross at McGregor. He passed his bar examination in Waco in 1897 then went to Abilene where he practiced law for two years before returning to McGregor.

In August, 1899, George Hamilton, his brother, Dr. Roscoe Hamilton and a friend, Guy Ramsey arrived in Matador. They had traveled for three weeks, in a wagon.

He opened a law office here, and on October 14, 1903 he was married here to Miss Edna Cooper. To this union were born three children, Howard, John and Mary.

They moved to Childress in 1907, where Mr. Hamilton continued to practice law, and in 1909 he was elected to the Texas Legislature and served four years.

Return To Matador

In 1913 they returned to Matador and lived here continuously until their respective deaths. Mrs. Hamilton passed away in November, 1936.

In 1927 Gov. Dan Moody appointed Mr. Hamilton judge of the 50th Judicial District but he declined the appointment. He was attorney for the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railway for 38 years, until his retirement a few years ago. He was attorney

for the Matador Land and Cattle Co., for many years.

He was a member of Matador Masonic Bodies, past trustee of McMurry College, and a charter member and past president of Matador Lions Club.

On July 25, 1940 Mr. Hamilton was married to Miss Maggie Knight at Childress.

On Wednesday night, November 7, 1962, Mr. Hamilton was stricken with a heart attack and died in the vestibule of the First Methodist Church, where he and his wife had gone to attend mid-week prayer services. He had attained the age of 91 years, two months and three days.

Funeral services were held Friday at 2:30 p.m. at the Methodist Church. The Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor and Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister, officiated. Also assisting was Rev. E. E. White of Lubbock, a long-time friend of the Hamilton family, former pastor at Childress and later Presiding Elder of the Plainview District. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery with Masonic Graveside rites. Arrangements were directed by Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.
