Legion Auxiliary To Sell Poppies

American Legion Auxiliary will sell poppies, Saturday, from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m., it was announced this week by Mrs. D.P. Keith, chairman of the poppy committee. The poppies are made by disabled veterans each year, and are sold by Legion auxiliaries on Saturday before Veteran's Day, Nov. 11.

The poppies which will be sold here were made at the VA Hospital in Kerrville, under the direction of Lucian McKinney, a patient and volunteer worker, who taught the other men to make better poppies by hand, instead of spoils.

"Poppy-making benefits are used to strengthen lives blighted by war-time injury and suffering," said Mrs. Keith. "All contributions received from Poppy Day sales go directly to aid disabled war veterans or members of their families."

Former Cowboy of Afton Area Dies

Barney Fisher Hale, 61, former cowboy of the Afton area died of a heart attack, Tuesday, October 30 in Bakersfield, California and the body was returned to Texas this week, for burial.

Funeral services were held Wednesday (yesterday) at 3:00 p.m. at the Afton Baptist Church. Officiating were Elder Kenneth Martin of Floydada and Rev. Ben Pate, pastor of the Afton church. Mr. Hale was a member of the Afton Primitive Baptist Church.

Burial was in Afton Cemetery under direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home, Matador. Mr. Hale was born in Fisher County, Texas, December 10, 1900. He came to this area in about 1929 and worked for various ranches in Dickens County until about 1940 when he went Channing to work for the Matadors.

Mr. Hale was moved to New Mexico, and about six months ago he went to California. He was 61 years, 10 months and 20 days of age at the time of his death.

He is survived by two daughters. (Continued on back page)

Pioneer Attorney Claimed by Death

DEATH came to the vestibule of the Methodist Church last night and claimed one of Matador's most prominent citizens. G. E. Hamilton, 91, had entered the church to attend prayer meeting as was his lifetime custom and was placing his hat on a shelf when he was stricken by a heart attack. Dr. A. C. Traweek Jr., summoned from the hospital across the street, pronounced him dead after examination.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist Church at 2:30 p.m. Friday with Rev. Roy Patterson officiating, assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister. Interment will be in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

"Judge" Hamilton was one of West Texas' most prominent pioneer attorneys. He first opened his law practice in Matador in 1899. In 1906 he moved to Childress from where he was elected to the Legislature, serving two terms. He returned to Matador in 1913 and had lived here continuously since that time.

He was married to Miss Edna Cooper, October 14, 1903. Mrs. Hamilton died in November, 1936. Four years later he was married to Miss Maggie Knight at Childress.

Survivors include his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Melvin Meason of Matador, and two sons, Howard Hamilton of Seattle, Washington and John Hamilton of Matador, five grandchildren, seven great grandchildren, five sisters, Mrs. W. L. McWilliams and Mrs. F. C. Bourland of Matador, Mrs. Maggie Cooper of Roaring Springs, Mrs. Ella Freeman of Irving and Mrs. Virginia Stewart of Shreveport, La., one brother, J. Tom Hamilton of Matador.

TEXAS is a 2-party state but the GOP votes registered in Tuesday election, fell far short of erasing the Democratic domination. In most races the county reflected the state trend in voting. Total vote in the county was 706.

Walter Rogers on Encore Trip Here

Congressman Walter Rogers hit the ground campaigning when he landed in a private plane at Buzz Field Monday morning. He was met by County Democratic Chairman Furman Vinson, car dealer Glenn Woodruff, car and implement dealer Mike Hoyle and others. It was less than 24 hours before voters in his district would begin marking their ballots.

Congressman Rogers made a whirlwind campaign tour of Roaring Springs, then came to Matador, an encore to his visit here two weeks ago as guest of a small group for luncheon at the VFW building.

He visited with constituents hurriedly through the business section. His intense vigor at walking and shaking hands was an experience for Chairman Vinson and Woodruff, who introduced him on the whirlwind trip.

Democratic John Connally received 362 of the 641 votes cast in the county for governor. Democratic Congressman Walter Rogers received 454 of the 670 votes cast in the county for Congressman (18th Dist.). Democratic John White received 461 of the 658 votes cast for Commissioner of Agriculture.

Democratic Andy Rogers received 465 of the 660 votes cast for State Senator for the 30th Senatorial Dist. Largest total vote polled in the county was 647 for Mrs. Velma Fulfer, County treasurer. County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan received 645, County Judge Elbert Reeves received 641.

Cox carried only one box in the county Whiteflat voted 27 for Cox and 22 for Connally.

By boxes the county voted as follows: Matador (total vote 354) Connally 183, Cox 149, Walter Rogers 222, Seale 112, Andy Rogers 219, John Zahn 109.

Roaring Springs (total vote 154) Connally 72, Cox 58, Walter Rogers 92, Seale 49, Andy Rogers 100, Zahn 41.

Northfield (total vote 24) Connally 19, Cox 4, Walter Rogers 20, Seale 3, Andy Rogers 18, Zahn 4.

Flomot (total vote 95) Connally 53, Cox 29, Walter Rogers 70, Seale 24, Andy Rogers 75, Zahn 17.

Whiteflat (total vote 59) Connally 22, Cox 27, Walter Rogers 34, Seale 22, Andy Rogers 38, Zahn 18.

Absentee (total 22 votes) Connally 14, Cox 8, W. Rogers 34, Seale 6, Andy Rogers 15, Zahn 6.

Drive Date Set for Week of Dec. 3-8th With Intensive Work Plan Outlined

"A COMMUNITY is the responsibility of the people who live in it," Douglas Meador, 1962 fund chairman for the Matador Community Chest said Saturday at a meeting of directors held in Commissioners Court room. "Despite the most exacting economy we spent \$437.54 more in the past year than we collected in the 1961 fund drive."

"The problem originated in the shortage of contributions last year. We collected only \$1,859.17 of a \$3,000 goal," Meador said. "People of this community and this county have always given freely to worthy causes. Surely there could not be a more worthy cause, in which every penny given, goes to the purpose intended and in which every case is screened before any money is released. We must better alert the people to the purposes and achievements of the Community Chest."

Secretary Judge Elbert Reeves submitted a financial report which showed that approximately \$975 had gone to local needy cases. Only \$47.95 went to outside cases in which stranded travelers received a little gasoline or food (never both) to get them to another town.

Richard Stafford On Pro Grid Team

Richard Stafford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Stafford of Roaring Springs, graduate of Matador High School and former guard and fullback on the Matadors squad four years ago, has been selected on the Philadelphia Eagles, professional football team. The 250-pound athlete, who was on the Red Raiders squad at Tech, has been working out for the Eagles at Hershey, Penn. since July 23, and was on the reserve squad until Oct. 31. He will return to Texas in the spring to attend Texas Tech.

His position on the Eagles squad will be defensive end and offensive tackle, he informed his parents in a letter this week. Stafford set a state record in Texas on the discus throw while he attended Tech, and also in the Red Raiders relays.

MATADORS CRUSH ESTELLINE CUBS

LASHING out at their hosts, the Matador Matadors Friday night crushed the Estelline Cubs 41-6 in the first conference tilt of the season. Opening the scoring early in the first quarter Matadors' Lloyd Martin went 35 yards for a touchdown. The try for extras failed.

The Matadors then held the Cubs short of a first down. Lancaster then took the punt and scampered up the middle to score on a 60-yard run. Try for extra was good to put the Matadors ahead 14-0.

The third touchdown for the Matadors came only minutes later when Mike Barton rammed over right tackle to score from 10 yards out. Kemy Barton kicked the extra point to make the score at the end of the first quarter 21-0.

Matadors 2nd team played most of the second quarter and moved the ball down to the 10-yd. line before scoring Joe Martin smashed over right tackle (Continued on back page)

Critics of the Community Chest have declared that certain groups or families of shiftless, indigent people are being supported out of the funds. "This is entirely untrue," Meador said, "and any such claim is without foundation. We make this public challenge. Name the person or the case in which a single penny of Community Chest funds has not been wisely used."

Money Is Returned

Many people are not aware that Judge Reeves has a revolving loan fund which last year recovered \$258.77 loaned to indigent families in the community who needed emergency funds. Instead of a grant of funds, it was loaned (without interest) on the condition that it must be repaid within a reasonable length of time. These were cases where Judge Reeves knew personally that the people seeking aid were capable of earning money. The loans were always small.

Director Bill Seale asked the Community Chest to make an allocation to the "Teen Canteen" which represents 48 families attempting to provide recreation for teenage boys and girls. The application was tentatively approved.

Goal Set At \$3000

The directors set the goal at \$3000 as a minimum with the date of the drive starting December 3 and continuing the entire week through the 8th.

It was pointed out that the drive is for an entire year and represents the entire community and area (Matador Independent School dist.), and that employees as well as employers should make contributions.

Based on a plan used in cities, employees will be asked for one hour's work per month, or \$12 for a year. The fact that a firm or place of business makes a contribution in no way absolves the employees of responsibility to also contribute. Placards will be presented to firms that make 100% contributions.

Another strong point that will be used in the drive to raise funds among those in high-bracket incomes, is that Community Chest is a recognized income tax deduction.

Much preliminary work will be done in the business section and among members of the Matador Lions Club. Special sponsors of the Community Chest before the drive is launched.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

It is time to think about cotton planting seed. At times, insects become a problem in stored cottonseed, especially if bins that harbor insects are used, or a large percent of the seed are cracked.

Cottonseed should be stored only in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned, with its ceilings and walls, and clean the cracks in the floor. Waste grain beneath the bin, and around the edges should be destroyed.

After cleaning spray the surface areas with Methoxychlor, TDE or Malathion at the rate of 2 gallons per 100 square ft. of surface area.

Cottonseed should also be treated, using Toxaphene, DDT or Malathion at the rate of 2 oz. per bushel. TREATED SEED SHOULD NOT BE CRUSHED OR USED FOR FEED. If seed is not treated, it should be fumigated. L-217, Control of Insects in Farm Stored Grain may be obtained from my office, and this publication covers treatment of all farm stored grain.

From Nov. 5-9, I will be attending a short course on plant diseases. Plant diseases are becoming more prevalent in Motley County, and training received may help to solve problems that are arising in this field. Nematode damage will also be included in the 5 day course.

4-H members who are 14 or older as of Jan. 1, 1963 are reminded of the Texas Cotton Ginners Assn Award Program. Records must be submitted by Jan. 1st, and should include a record of the member's cotton crop in addition to the other parts of a 4-H record. County prize is a medal; \$10 for district and \$100 for state winners. All members with a cotton project are urged to check with me on this awards program.

Questions continue to arise about cotton defoliation. Proper use of chemicals can make the

operator money, but improper use can cost the farmer. At least 60% of bolls should be open before a true defoliant is used. Any bolls expected to mature (top bolls) should be 30-35 days old at time of application. Harvest aid materials used under these conditions have not reduced quality yields. Cool weather slows up defoliation process, and when night temperatures are below 50 degrees, and day temperatures below 70, action of the chemicals will be very slow.

Maturity is not speeded up by use of defoliants, but maturity of cotton fibers stops when chemicals are applied. Bolls have been noted to open sooner in treated fields, but fiber from the treated cotton was not more mature. Use of defoliants about 2 weeks ahead of frost permits earlier stripping. The leaves are in a dehydrated condition at time of the first frost, and decomposition of leaves is speeded up. Often this allows stripping to start before exposure to weather has reduced grades or caused actual losses in lint.
