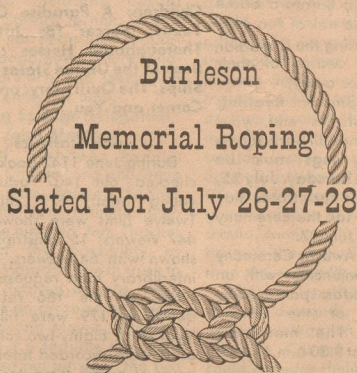

Tornado Funds Still Available For "Over 60" Victims

As reported in April, a contract between South Plains Association of Government (SPAG) and the city of Matador for \$29,249 was made.

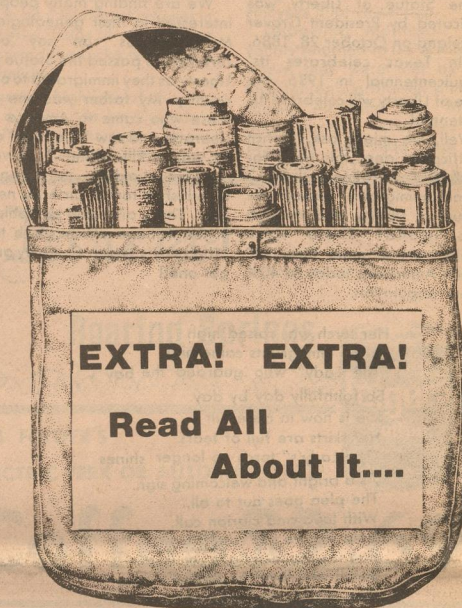
According to Mayor Gary Lancaster, there is still approximately \$18,000 of this fund available to those who qualify.

The purpose of this contract was/is to provide funds to pay for renovation and repair to

homes that were damaged by the May 1, 1984 tornado. The repairs are to be made to homes in which the homeowner is sixty (60) years of age or older, a moderate or low income person and is a resident in that home. The authority of this contract derives from the Older Americans Act of 1965.

Anyone who feels they may qualify is encouraged to apply by August 15th at the City Hall.

Matador City Council Reverses Decision

After a closed session from 7:30 a.m. until 8:45 a.m. to review job applications and interview applicants, the Matador City Council meeting was open last Thursday, July 11th at the Matador City Hall.

Those in attendance were Mayor Gary Lancaster, Councilmen L.B. Campbell, Lewis Bostick, Joe Smith and John Briscoe. City secretary was also present at the beginning of the meeting.

The first act of business was to vote on a new city employee, Mr. Lewis W. Harrist. Following this the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Twenty-three bills were then read, discussed and approved for payment.

Water Cut-Off

Discussion of the new water line in north Matador was then conducted. Bill Jameson explained that some residents will experience temporary water cut-off without notice during the installation of the new line and it was suggested to have a notification on the Lion's Billboard on the square to inform folks of the brief interference.

Trash Pickup Troubles

Several specific homes were discussed that are having or causing problems with the small "roll out" type dumpsters. The problems arise from the wind blowing them over to the resident tying the dumpster to something so that the wind does not blow it over. The Council decided to replace some of these with larger dumpsters at the rate of 1 per month. It was noted that trash pickup would be swifter and would help the city personnel who drives the truck if those residents having the roll out dumpsters would take them to the proper location at their homes on Monday morning so that the truck could pick it up and empty it mechanically. Also, residents need to keep their alleys

cleared of cars, boats, limbs, toys, etc. so the garbage truck can make its passage and get to the dumpsters.

Fire Dept. Unsuccessfully Struggles For Budget Increase

Rodney Williams and James Gillespie representing the Matador Fire Department then came before the City Council requesting a \$100.00 per month budget increase for the department. They justified this request due to a large increase in insurance on the city fire vehicles and fire station. Even with this increase, the suburban (old M.C. ambulance) which is used for first aid at fire sights, taking members of MFD to fire schools and cloud watching, will be uninsured.

Lancaster addressed the representatives suggesting that they cut their equipment budget (which also covers gas and vehicle repairs) and use those funds for the insurance. Chief Williams replied that to cut back on equipment is to cut back on the safety of people. Mr. Gillespie then explained that even now the department does not have enough safety equipment for every man to have the proper protection to go into a burning structure. Lancaster asked how many times they have actually had to go in. Firmly Williams answered that they try their best to do things in a professional manner and to stand outside a house squirting water is never professional.

The Council then asked if it is right to raise taxes to pay for fire department equipment...is that a priority item? Gillespie reiterated that the extra they were asking for was for insurance and not equipment.

All people 60 years of age or older may show items they have made this year. They ask the whole county to participate in this event. There will be 3 judges to select the winners.

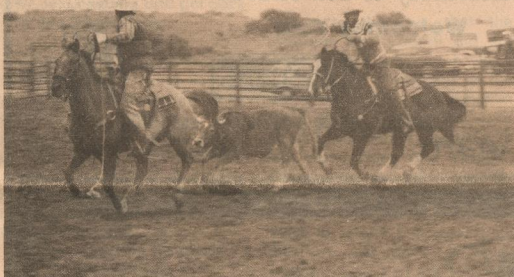

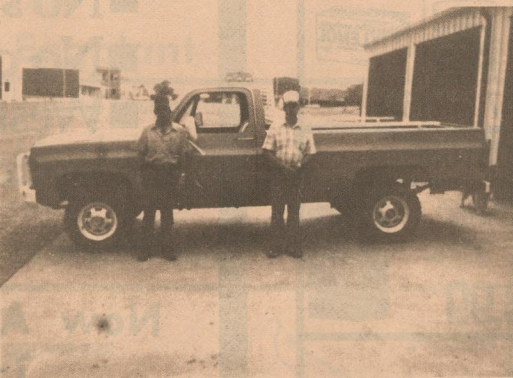

June Statistics

Eleven interlibrary loan requests were filled. Of the 186 reference questions, 179 were filled by local staff. Eighty-two computer users were recorded totaling 61 hours of public computer use.

The Library collection now has 7574 cataloged books and 1500 uncataloged paperbacks.

Williams went on to say "We try to equip our men for the highest personal protection before sending him into a fire. We don't want to get anybody hurt. This equipment is expensive to buy and expensive to keep up." This explanation was given in response to why they could not cut the equipment budget to pay the insurance.

Councilman Bostick spoke for the group saying that the fire department does a good job and the council is proud of them but that they just couldn't afford them.

Other options for funds were discussed including asking Roaring Springs to help in that they do not financially support the fire department, more fundraising projects and looking at another entity for help.

Roaring Springs Delegation Joins Meeting

Harold Brantley, Ronnie Thacker, Charlie Long and Gene Watson from Roaring Springs along with Harry Hamilton then joined the meeting. Mrs. Thacker discussed the possibility of utilizing Matador's trash truck to pick up Roaring Springs trash. Details of an arrangement were discussed and Mayor Lancaster said that it is feasible this could be worked out between the two cities. The council informed the Roaring Springs delegation that trash pickup could be done in one day. The Matador City Council will discuss an arrangement and fee process at their next meeting and get back with Roaring Springs.

Fire!

Councilman Campbell then addressed the Roaring Springs group about helping financially support the Matador Fire Department. The visiting group seemed receptive to the idea and said that they will discuss this matter at their next council meeting which was scheduled for the same evening.

Tax Collection Contract Cancellation

At this point, Charlie Long addressed the Matador City Council concerning the tax collecting firm which the Motley County taxing entities have a contract with. (Of note, at their

last meeting, the Matador City Council voted to cancel their contract with this firm.)

Long encouraged the city to keep their contract with the tax firm because of the success the Roaring Springs has had. Long continued that the firm had collected \$4000 of Roaring Spring's \$7000 delinquent taxes. Councilman Campbell asked if the firm had actually collected these and the Roaring Springs delegation confirmed that this was so. Mrs. Thacker went on to say that it took approximately 2 days labor to compile their delinquent tax roll for the firm and that she felt like Matador's would not be that much more difficult. Mr. Long then informed the council that the city of Roaring Springs requested that Matador please reconsider their decision to cancel the contract in that they felt that the company would drop them (Roaring Springs) if Matador does cancel. The Roaring Springs delegation gave examples of why Matador should continue to persevere this because the return is much more than the expenditures.

After a lengthy, polite plea with no demands, the Roaring Springs delegation left so that the City Council of Matador could consider their appeal.

Before their departure, Councilman Campbell explained that Matador was not against the concept of collecting the delinquent taxes just the contract.

Due to the fact that the Matador City Council did not want to take any action which would cause a hardship on the City of Roaring Springs, a motion was made, seconded and passed to keep the contract with McCreary, Huey and Veselka, delinquent tax collecting law firm in Austin. During this meeting a letter from October 1984 to Mayor Lancaster from the firm was produced which alleviated some of the problems which had originally persuaded them to cancel their contract.

Meeting Adjourned

After a closed session with Harry Hamilton, the City Council meeting was adjourned.

NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. 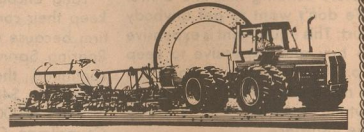
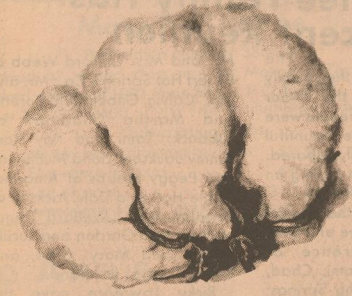

WTU Asks Permission To Refund

West Texas Utilities Company filed a petition Tuesday, July 2, 1985, with the Public Utility Commission of Texas asking permission to refund \$13.7 million in fuel costs savings and interest to its retail customers.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said the refund is possible because of efforts by the Company to reduce production costs by obtaining cheaper boiler fuel and buying available economy power from other companies. As a result, WTU has actually been able to spend less for power plant fuel than was anticipated when the fuel factors were established by the PUC.

The savings have accumulated since August 1984 when the fuel recovery account was last reconciled by the Commission. The total available for refunding includes \$12.6 million in actual savings, plus an estimated \$1.1 million in interest.

"We want to pass these savings on to our customers as quickly as possible in order to bring some relief during the season of hot weather and high utility bills," Churchill said. "While we are not yet due for a reconciliation, we are voluntarily asking permission to make refunds now."

Since 1983, electric customers in Texas have been charged for fuel according to fixed fuel factors set by the PUC. This method of fuel cost recovery was ordered by the PUC to replace the automatic monthly fuel adjustment which matched fuel billings to fuel expense immediately and under which utilities had operated for many years.

Under present rules, a reconciliation of the fuel costs may be required a year after the factors are fixed, but adjustments are possible sooner if actual fuel costs are substantially above or below the amount being charged.

"Over the past several

months, the Company has made considerable savings by purchasing surplus power from other companies cheaper than WTU could generate it, and by taking advantage of a softer natural gas market," Churchill said.

Natural gas is the principal fuel for all the WTU's eight major power generating stations. In recent years, fuel costs have amounted to more than half of WTU's total operating revenues.

Much of the economy power being brought from other companies now comes through a new high voltage, direct current interconnection completed last December near Vernon. This facility allows WTU to import electricity from outside the state of Texas.

WTU proposes to make the refunds to existing customers through a one-time credit to their bills, commencing immediately after Commission approval. Refunding through bill credits would be more timely, efficient and cost effective than attempting to send customers checks, Churchill said.

The credit would be calculated on an individual customer basis using each customer's monthly kilowatt-hour consumption during the period involved.

Refund amounts will vary with the amount of the customer's usage. The average residential customer is expected to receive about \$32.

The petition filed Tuesday is for an exception to PUC rules requiring a formal reconciliation procedure. A full fuel cost reconciliation for WTU is not due for several months.

Experience has shown that reconciliation proceedings are quite lengthy, delaying refunds reaching the customers. For this reason, the Company is asking the Commission to make an exception to its rules so that refunds can be made immediately during the hot summer season.

cafeteria manager for Plainview Independent School District. She was a member of American School Food Service Organization and the First Baptist Church.

It is not unusual for a family to have a dog, cat or bird as a pet, but Nelson McMahan is an

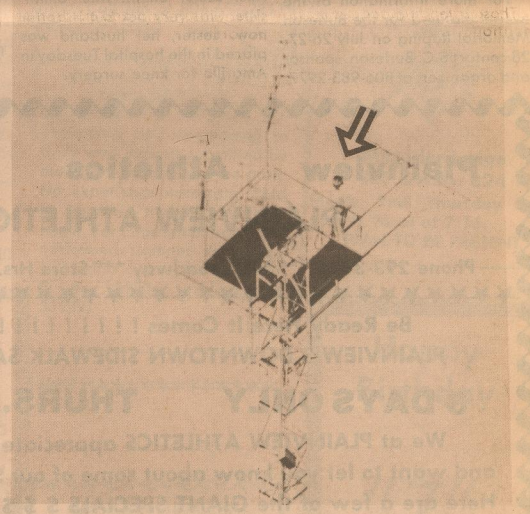
