The following is an excerpt from an article by Wilbur Howard which appeared in a recent issue of "Twelve Fifteen", a magazine for youth, published by The Methodist Publishing House.

"Teenagers have grown so soft and so fat that they won't work. They are satisfied with mediocrity. Unless we can stop this decline, our society will crumble." These are the words of a guidance teacher in a large high school.

"Being considered an odd ball is the worst thing that can happen to you. It's worse than death." These words are from a teenager on the Pacific coast.

"It's hard to go to church and absorb all that jazz." "I don't go to church very often but I believe everyone should have a faith." Thus two teenagers expressed themselves about religion.

"In some schools," said Marjorie Rittwagen, staff psychiatrist for New York City's children's courts, "it is physically dangerous for a school child to try to behave and learn."

These and other voices are heard today. You can hear reactions to our world rebounding all around you. They rebound from back fences, seats in buses and subways, the walls in high school locker rooms and cafeterias, TV sets, portable transistors, newspapers, slick magazines, paper back books.

Life becomes one big, booming buzz of confusion. In the midst of it all, people are trying to get your attention with things, ball point pens, skin diving equipment, the wave back; the bubble bouffant, the page fluff, the poodle, and the pony tail; "Blue Denim," "I Was a Teenage Monster," Cuticura, Clearasil, Fabian, Ricky Nelson, Dick Clark, Frankie Avalon; picture patches; "Mad," "Compact," "Seventeen."

What a world! Somebody goofed. How do you make sense out of it or is every body and everything sick, sick, sick? Where can a guy or a gal find security?

If you want to get off the merry-go-round, you've got to dare to be a maverick. Vernon Trott, a psychologist, has been quoted as saying recently: "Youth is conformist and security-conscious. There are no mavericks left. Everybody wants to be like everybody else."

We need young people who will not be afraid to be labeled "odd ball." We need young people who will not run around simply doing what all the rest of the gang are doing.

Bert Green Wins Paducah Contest

Delayed

Roaring Springs FFA members captalized on honors at a soil and grass judging contest at Paducah Wednesday, March 23, which was sponsored by the Upper Peace Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

Roaring Springs representatives took the four top places in senior grass judging and first and third places in senior soil judging.

Bert Green of Roaring Springs topped 14 competitors in grass judging with a near perfect

score. He collected 399 points from a possible 400.

In second place was A. J. Dye with 396 points and George Smith with 390 points. Both represented Roaring Springs FFA.

Max Thacker of Roaring Springs and Tommy Isbell of Paducah FFA placed fourth and fifth, respectively, in the event.

Roaring Springs' Jimmy McInroe won the soil judging event over 43 entries. He posted 219 points from a possible 500. Roger Holley of the Paducah FFA took second with 209 points and Cecil Nolen of Roaring Springs scored 206 points for third place.

In junior events, Jack Luckett of Matador 4-H club won in grass judging, while Roger Branson of Paducah 4-H placed second.

Junior soil judging honors were topped by Fred Davis of Paducah with 213 points, and Curry Braggs, a Paducah 4-H'er, scored 196 for second place.

The last three places, respectively, were Garland Coleman, 186; Rodney Richardson, 179; and Harvey Ward, 173, all of the Paducah 4-H.

Contests were conducted at Paducah High School vocational ag building with contestants from Motley and Cottle Counties.

The top three places in senior events were awarded trophies by the Paducah Lions Club, and silver 4-H belt buckles were awarded first three places in junior competition.
