Matadors Squelch Sooner Fire 48-12

PLAYING some of the best football in an illustrious season Friday night the Matador Matadors extinguished the last spark of fire in the Sayre, (Okla.) Eagles here on Burleson Field. The Sooner visitors departed counting their tail feathers, with 48 points for their hosts and 12 for themselves.

The Matadors opened the scoring in the 1st quarter when Lancaster went up the middle to

pay dirt from three yards out. Extra points try was futile. Lancaster scored again in the 2nd quarter on a run around left end with Kenny Barton kicking the extra.

Later in the 2nd quarter Lloyd Martin went around left end to score from the 8-yd. line. Barton kicked the extra. In the same quarter Lancaster passed Ezzell went around right end to score from 15 yds. out. Try for extra failed.

The score at bandtime was 26-0. The Eagles open the 3rd quarter scoring when halfback Joe Bell went over from the 1-yd. line. The try for extra failed.

Lancaster came back to score again late in the 3rd quarter on a 69-yd. run. Martin made the extras.

On the 4th quarter Charles Ezzell went right end to score from 15 yds. out. Try for extra failed.

Final score came to the Eagles when quarterback Nick Reed passed to halfback Joe Bell from 15 yards out.

On the kickoff to Matador, Lloyd Martin took the ball on his own 5-yd. line, and with the fine blocking of the rest of his team, went 95 yds. to score. Lancaster passed to Kenny Barton for the extras.

Doing outstanding blocking on offense were Pete Davis, Mike Barton, David Rattan and Tim Green on the right side of the line.

Richard Campbell, Jack McCallie, Robert Brandon and Tommy Green opened gaping holes on the left side of the line. Outstanding on defense were Pete Davis, Lloyd Martin, Mike Barton, Kenny Barton, Richard Campbell and Tommy Green.

Matadors will open their defense of the Dist. 6-B crown Friday night when they meet the Estelline Cubs at Estelline.

The Cubs, running from a wing T, slot back or short punt formation, has scored only 26 points in 6 outings.

The Cubs have allowed visiting teams an average of 38 points per game while posting a 0-6 record. With its 48-12 score over Sayre, the Matadors are the 2nd highest leading scorer in the South Plains, with 272 points this season, only 13 less than class AA Denver City.

The Matadors will have a weight advantage over the Cubs (average line 142 and backfield average 145 per man), giving the Matadors about 15 lbs. advantage per man.

Post Office and Theatre Lost While Stubborn Blaze Threatens to Spread

FIRE STARTED in the Spring Theatre in Roaring Springs about 6 p.m. Sunday and for a time threatened to spread in the heart of the business section. The theatre and Roaring Springs post office buildings were destroyed. Carl's Barber Shop and Traveler's Hotel were damaged.

Fire departments from Matador, Spur, Floydada and Paducah aided Roaring Springs Volunteer Firemen in confining the stubborn blaze to the two buildings.

Panhandle Compress Co.'s 100,000-gallon water storage located south of the Q.A. & P. Railway tracks was used to augment the Roaring Springs 50,000-gallon city supply. The extra water is credited with providing the extra protection that saved the hotel and possibly Braselton Implement Company across the street. All water in both tanks was used and two nearby irrigation wells were ready to be tied in the supply before the blaze was brought under control.

Fire hose was laid across the railroad tracks, bringing the compress water to the fire. A train due at 9 o'clock was alerted to stop in event the hose had not been removed.

Cause Is Unknown

Cause of the fire is unknown. Wade Berryman of Matador, manager of the theatre said he closed the Sunday afternoon Spanish show matinee about 5 p.m. and went back through the theatre before he left. He saw no signs of fire.

Postmaster H. L. Smith said he worked the mail at 5:30 and did not notice any smoke or sign of fire. When first discovered, the fire was in the rear of the theatre.

Matador received a call through Sheriff Jinks Wilson shortly after 6 p.m. The fire alarm sounded here and the Matador Volunteer Fire Department responded immediately. Spur, Floydada and Paducah sent trucks and firemen. For a time it seemed impossible to save the two-story hotel building.

Barber chairs and other equipment were moved from Carl's Barber Shop. Cafe equipment and beauty shop equipment in the hotel were moved to the sidewalk next to Braselton Implement Co.

Carl's shop was back in business by 11 a.m. Monday and the other businesses resumed operation. The theatre and post office building were the property of M. S. Thacker. He said they were not insured.

Wade "Mutt" Berryman estimated that the loss of his projection machines, seats, pop corn machine and other equipment would be in the neighborhood of \$5,000 to \$7,000. It was not insured. The barber shop building and hotel are owned by Joe Bridges and insured. Loss of the two Thacker buildings was estimated in the neighborhood of \$25,000.

Special Delivery Mail

Postmaster Smith Monday delivered mail to Roaring Springs patrons from a truck in front of the burned-out post office building. The boxes and other equipment, also damaged, have been moved across the street to the Thacker building (formerly Casey Jones drug store) which had recently been remodeled and was vacant. At present it is a temporary location, Mr. Thacker said.

Mrs. L. E. Cooper, Tribune Roaring Springs correspondent, had to re-write her news this week. It was in the post office at the time of the fire and was soaked by the fire hoses. Roof of the post office fell in before the fire was brought under control.

Roaring Springs City Hall received some smoke damage, it was declared.

2nd Polio Vaccine Response is Good

Response Sunday to the 2nd Sabin Oral polio vaccine was good but less than the 2,000 that received the 1st vaccination. Percentage-wise, however it was about the same as other counties in the South Plains area, including Lubbock. More than 160,000 in the entire area received the vaccine.

The total receiving the sugar cube vaccine at the Legion building here was 1544. Dr. J. S. Stanley said yesterday that he hoped much of the gap would be filled Sunday (Nov. 4) when Make-Up vaccine will be administered to those who failed to receive it during the past Sunday.

The vaccine will be administered from the same location (Legion Building) but the time will be shorter, starting at 2 p.m. and ending at 4 p.m. Those of the area who will apply for the vaccine are reminded to bring their small registration cards which were issued when they received the Type 1.

A "Coke" bottle burglar bungled his plans here Friday night and landed in jail within minutes after breaking a plate glass window at Salem Dry Goods with a "Coke" bottle.

Victor Flores, 18, entered the store after he had broken the window. Fred Crenshaw was in his car in the street in front of the store and saw him enter. He immediately notified officers.

"Teen Canteen" teenagers were in the midst of a party at the Legion Building across the street. The time was about 11:30 and numerous cars were in the vicinity as parents waited until the party was concluded.

The Mexican youth was sighted inside the store and coaxed back to the window he had broken. He protested that he could not get out the hole through which he had entered. He was grappled by the collar and pulled outside by the time Sheriff Jinks Wilson arrived.

When manager Ronnie Christian arrived and entered the store he found a vast amount of clothing at the back door. Other merchandise was on the floor. The youth was wearing a hat which he had taken out of stock.

Deputy Ed D. Smith, who was guarding the back door, said the burglar kicked the door "like a mule" trying to break out after learning his entry had been discovered. He also turned on the air conditioner, perhaps thinking it was the light switch.

Quail Hunting Permits Available

AUSTIN, October 24—Application for hunting quail on two North Texas wildlife management areas will be accepted by the Game and Fish Commission in Austin, until 8 a.m. November 16.

Al Springs, wildlife coordinator, has announced that the hunts will be conducted on the Matador Wildlife Management Area in Cottle County, and the Gene Howe Wildlife Management Area in Hemphill County.

These hunts are a part of the Game and Fish Commission research program on those areas.

Application for the hunts may be made by writing to the Game and Fish Commission, Walton Building, Austin. Dates for the hunts are:

Matador—December 1, 2, 15, 16, 29, 30 and January 12 and 13. A total of 400 permits will be available for the Matador Area, and the permits will be for a one-day hunt.

Gene Howe—December 8 and 22, and January 5. There will be 48 permits for this area and hunts will be for one day only.

Only persons 17 years of age or older can be considered for these hunts. The bag limit will be 12 quail and successful permit holders are urged to take their dogs. The ground cover is rank on both areas and the loss of cripples and dead birds will be unusually high if dogs are not used.

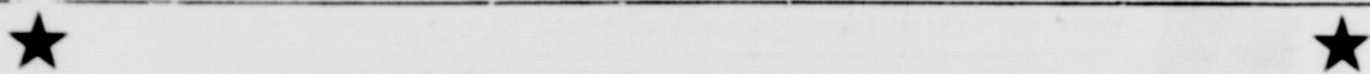

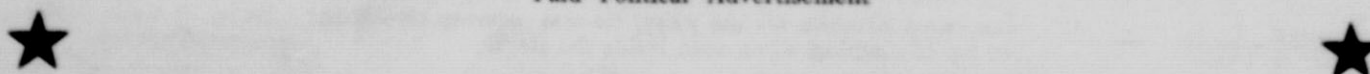

Governor Price Daniel, while Attorney General, wrote an opinion on the question of party loyalty in which he said, "The courts of Texas have answered this question by holding that the pledge taken at the time of voting in the primary election DOES NOT create a legal obligation."

Recently Governor Daniel repeated that opinion by saying that the pledge on the primary ballot does not obligate anyone "legally or morally" to vote for the Democratic ticket in the general election.

"Trial de Novo" Amendment to Get Vote "Hot Fool"

State Senator George Maffett of Chillicothe, foe of unlimited trial de novo legislation, predicted this week Amendment No. 14 would be "badly beaten" at the General Election, Tuesday, November 6.

The adoption of Amendment No. 14, last on the ballot, would upset the long established balance of powers between the executive, legislative, and judicial departments of our government, and accomplish no worth-

while purpose. This proposed amendment would transfer much of the lawmaking process from the Legislature to the courts, and probably call for the creation of double the number of courts we now have.

"It would seriously interfere with local self-government, thereby crippling the normal operation of schools, city councils, etc. No other state has such language in their constitution as is proposed in Amendment No. 14, and we don't need it in the Texas Constitution."

Bouldin Opposes
Victor W. Bouldin, Houston attorney, and native of Motley County, says "This is the most serious and dangerous proposal to come before the people in my lifetime. Under this amendment, any crackpot with a \$15 to \$20 court deposit could file a lawsuit and delay a \$15,000,000 project for years."

To vote AGAINST Amendment 14, scratch out the FOR section on the November 6 ballot.

Waggoner Carr has Impressive Record as Texas Statesman

Waggoner Carr, Lubbock attorney and former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, will be principal speaker here at a county-wide service November 11, commemorating Veteran's Day.

The service will be held at the First Baptist Church at the evening hour, 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Carr has a noteworthy background of public service as a lawmaker and law enforcer.

He served five terms in the House, where he played a leading part in the passage of needed laws relating to law enforcement, prevention of crime and juvenile delinquency, education, sound state fiscal management, promotion of the state's economic growth, and in the investigation of official corruption and private fraud. As Speaker, Carr also was influential in the creation of a state-wide committee to study constitutional revision.

He served as Speaker of the House in the 55th and 56th Legislatures, and is one of only three men in the history of Texas to be elected to the Speakership for two consecutive terms.

Before going to the Legislature, Carr's practical experience in law enforcement began with one term as County Attorney of Lubbock County and also as Assistant District Attorney in the 72nd Judicial District. This laid the groundwork for much of his legislative service.

As acting chairman of the Crime Investigating Committee in his first term as a member of the House, Carr won state-wide acclaim for exposure of a bootlegging syndicate in West Texas. The investigation led to the indictment and conviction of an Amarillo liquor dealer on a

charge of attempted bribery of a Crosby County Sheriff.

Wrote "Hot check law"

As a legislator, Carr wrote the Texas "hot check law" and the small-claims court laws.

Waggoner Carr was born 43 years ago at Fairlie, Hunt County, Texas, the son of Vincent and Ruth Carr. His family moved to Lubbock County in 1932 where Waggoner graduated from Lubbock High School and Texas Technological College.

He enrolled in the University of Texas School of Law, left school to serve in the Army as intelligence specialist and aviation cadet, returned to receive his law degree in 1947 and was admitted to the State Bar.

After the war, Carr married the former Ernestine Story. They have one son, 13-year-old David.

Since his retirement from the Legislature, Carr has practiced law in Lubbock. He is a lay leader and a Sunday School teacher at the First Methodist Church of Lubbock, a member of the council board of the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America, and is a member of the Lions Club, American Legion, Farm Bureau, and the State Bar of Texas.
