Mrs. Wilkinson, a native of Oklahoma, moved to Lamesa from the Matador area in 1952, and had been employed as a private duty nurse.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Lloyd Randel, Arlington; Mrs. Orville Fox, Midland; and Mrs. W. H. Schmidt, Spur; a son, Levi Wilkinson, Matador; one sister, Mrs. John J. Panary, Loveland, Colo.; two brothers, Lonnie N. Nigh, Denver, and Paul W. Nigh, Albuquerque; and four grandchildren.

HEAVIEST SNOW in recent years still blankets Motley County and much of West Texas although sunshine yesterday melted some holes in the estimated 12-inch covering. The snowfall which deposited slightly over two inches of moisture, started Friday and continued through most of Saturday.

Traffic was snarled in all directions and roads in some sections still remain hazardous. Church services were cancelled at Memphis and other towns in the belt covered by the snow storm.

There was no wind at the time the snow fell and because of the approximately freezing temperature, it clung to trees, power and telephone poles and even to wire fences. Snow plows were operated by the State Highway Department almost continuously and kept highways open in Motley County. Automobiles were mired in the wet snow throughout Matador early Saturday. Only reported damage from the snow was the collapsing of the canopy at Jay's Drive In.

Moisture Is Welcome
The moisture was welcomed by farmers and ranchers in most instances although some cotton still remains in the fields.

More snow was forecast for yesterday but failed to materialize. The storm which left the heavy snow here moved to the east coast which is declared the worst blizzard in 17 years. More than 200 lives were lost over the country resulting from the passage of the storm.

Yesterday some automobiles ventured to park at the curb in the Matador business section. Because of the snow previously parking had been confined to the center of the streets.

Freezing temperatures at night have added to the hazards of automobile travel since the rival of the storm.

Riley Day Hurt From Explosion

R. A. (Riley) Day was treated yesterday at Stanley Hospital for burns about his hands and arms as the result of an explosion at the Day by Day Cleaning Plant early Wednesday morning.

Mr. Day had started to light the gas furnace under a steam boiler at the plant when the explosion occurred. It resulted from an accumulation of gas under the boiler.

Mr. Day drove his automobile to Stanley Hospital where examination showed approximately 25 minute particles of small metal buried in his arm. A piece of metal was blown off the furnace and struck him on the arm.

Damage to the building was small and included breaking of several window panes as a result of the explosion. Mr. Day was able to return to the shop and work during the remainder of the day.

To Tell Life Story

Baptist Evangelist Is Ex-Dope Addict

A life of crime as a youth will be told Saturday night from the pulpit of the First Baptist Church, where revival services have been in progress this week. Evangelist Paul Carlin, a 26-year-old former narcotics addict and thief from Houston, is conducting the services daily at 7:15 in the morning and 7:30 p. m.

He has announced that on Saturday night his message will contain a revelation of his former life of dope addiction, robbery, vandalism and purse snatching.

The Rev. Carlin, raised in an average home in Houston, began smoking marijuana at 14 as a schoolboy. From that time until eight years ago when he was converted, he was a member of a young gang of hoodlums which used robbery, burglary and other criminal means for getting money for their "habit."

The Houston police finally caught up with Carlin and his gang and in 1951 they were indicted by grand jury for possession of narcotics.

Became Converted

After indictment, while awaiting trial by jury, Carlin became converted to religion, and it was swift and meaningful. He immediately began witnessing for Christ and winning former hoodlum associates.

When the police became convinced of the sincerity of his changed life, the grand jury was recalled and the indictment was dropped.

Carlin became a star basketball player in high school and then went to Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, where he became a 20, one of the youngest ordained ministers in the state.

Since then Paul Carlin has talked to millions, preaching the gospel of Christianity and warning youth against a life of thrill seeking.

Versatile Gospel Singer

Leading the singing for the revival services is Jimmy Snelen, versatile musician from Oak Cliff.

In addition to leading the singing, he also plays the piano, organ and trumpet. In evening services, for special music he plays his own piano accompaniment for a spiritual.

Snelen, who has a baritone

tenor singing voice has been recording for the World Record Co., of Waco for five years. He has a recently published 12-inch long-playing album, "Peace in the Valley," containing 14 of his best loved and most requested gospel hymns.

Despite severe weather conditions the first part of the week, attendance at all services has been good. Interest is increasing daily and many rededications and decisions have been made.

Spiritual preparation for the meeting was begun last week in evening prayer sessions in the homes of church members, and in extensive visitation led by Sunday School and church workers.

A zealous effort is being made to reach a high attendance goal of 255 in Sunday School, Sunday. "With everyone praying and working together, we believe we can reach the goal, and that many will be won to Christ," said Rev. Gene Hawkins, pastor, in extending a welcome to everyone to attend the remaining services of the revival.

Last August he resigned and purchased a small home here.

He had suffered from a heart condition. He was well known throughout the area and friends from time to time visited him. The severe snow storm had made the roads difficult to negotiate in the area in which he lived. It had been noticed, however, that no tracks appeared in the snow to his door during the past few days.

Mr. Donnell was a veteran of World War I and had been stationed in Russia and Japan. So far as is known, he had worked on ranches his entire life.

The body was taken Wednesday to Throckmorton where he was reared, by a Eddy-Seale funeral car.

He is survived by two sisters: Mrs. Gertrude Blackburn, Dallas and Mrs. Ora J. Tharp, Throckmorton, and one brother, Bob Donnell, Dallas.

Later information: Mr. Donnell was born at Throckmorton, March 14, 1893. Funeral services will be held today at 2:30 p. m. at the First Baptist Church in Throckmorton, with Rev. Roy Edgman officiating and interment will be made in Throckmorton Cemetery.

MHS Library Gets New Card System

The library at MHS is undergoing a complete reorganization. Work is being done by Mrs. Oden, who has had several years experience in library work in Austin and Houston. The purpose of the reorganization is to give the students and faculty an up-to-date collection of books and reading material classified by the Abridged Dewey Decimal System for high schools. This system is merely a modified version of the same system used in most libraries today. It provides an extensive card catalog with title, author, and subject headings. Students who become familiar with the MHS card catalog will find it much simpler to use college and public libraries.

Work on the library began about six weeks ago. The first step was to go through the library, book by book, assigning Dewey Decimal numbers, and noting proper author, title, and subject headings. A number of books that were too worn to repair were removed. Next, the old book numbers were covered with black paint. The new Dewey Decimal numbers were then written on the spines of the books with a new electric stylus. Then the greatest chore, that of typing of cards for the new catalog, was begun. Mrs. Oden is being assisted by Gwen Killingsworth, Janie Waybourn, and Donna Williams, all senior students. The typing is very tedious and painstaking, as each card must be aligned properly, with notations in the correct order. When the catalog is complete, the cards will be filed alphabetically in a new metal cabinet and placed so that students will have easy access to it. A number of items have been purchased recently, in addition to the new metal cabinet, which will make the tasks of the librarians and students easier. The electric stylus is a new and easy way of transferring numbers to the book spines without the mess and delay of paint. A new book can be classified and placed on the shelf in a matter of minutes. A new file box for check-out cards holds book cards in a vertical position within easy reach of the librarian. Two very necessary library reference books were purchased - the Abridged Dewey Decimal Classification, and the Standard Catalog for High School Libraries. The latter contains an extensive listing of books for high schools, approved by the American Library Association, and covering all subjects. Numerous other purchases were also made for book pockets, check out cards, book cards, and last, but certainly not least, three big shelves of brand new books.

Work on the library will soon be completed, and then students and faculty will be given a brief review on "How To Use Our New Library!"
