LUBBOCK PLANS OLD FASHIONED FOURTH HOLIDAY

An old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration, with parade, fireworks, and family picnics in the park is being planned at Lubbock.

Sixty-one marching units, floats and bands will comprise Lubbock's first 4th of July parade in more than half a century, according to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

The observance is sponsored by the Lubbock Committee for the Preservation of Our American Heritage.

Beginning at 9:30 a. m. the parade is scheduled to begin at 9:30 a. m. next Wednesday and will follow a route down Broadway from Ave. E to College Ave. Downtown businessmen are urged to display American flags Independence Day.

The Khiva Temple motor escort will lead the parade, followed by the US Marine Corps Reserve Color Guard.

Other marching units will include the US Naval Reserve, high school bands, Cub Scout and Boy Scout groups, ROTC units and the ladies auxiliary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Flats will be entered by the American Legion, United Daughters of the Confederacy, Daughters of the American Revolution, Lubbock Boat Club, PBX Club, YWCA, Citizens Traffic Council, First Baptist Church young people, Lubbock Christian College women's association, Beta Sigma Phi Sorority and the Lubbock County Republican Committee. Special entries include antique cars, unicyclists and the Junior Rangers Riding Club.

Other activities scheduled include a patriotic sing-song and speaker at 11 a. m. in Municipal Auditorium.

A rattlesnake over three feet in length and bearing six rattlers was killed on Airport Country Club links late Thursday by Mrs. Frank Price and Mrs. Bundy Campbell of Matador.

Mrs. Campbell stepped on the snake's head as she, Mrs. Price and Mrs. Roy Grundy played a late round on the popular course between Matador and Roaring Springs.

Mrs. Campbell said she screamed when she saw the snake, and leaped aside. The maddened reptile spewed venom on her golf shoes when it struck. Mrs. Campbell and Mrs. Price alternately clubbed the snake to death with their golf clubs, the only implements available between the sixth and seventh greens about the middle of the fairway.

"I don't know why I did not see the snake in advance," Mrs. Campbell said, "since the course had recently been mowed, leaving the rattler in plain view. It seemed the most improbable place to look for a rattlesnake."

Mrs. Campbell said the snake rattled as she stepped on its head and struck as she leaped away.

School Integration Approved by Voters

VOTERS Saturday approved a plan to integrate Roaring Springs Independent School District by more than two to one majority. A total of 86 votes were polled in the special election called by the board of trustees, acting on a petition signed by 68 voters last month.

In proposition No. 1 to retain the dual school system (to continue segregation) the vote was 27. In proposition No. 2 (to abandon the dual system) for integration, the total votes, as canvassed by the Commissioners Court was 59. The returns were canvassed here Monday.

While 68 voters signed the petition asking for the election, nine less voted to abolish the dual system. The school district has 164 qualified voters.

The school district has but two colored families, with 11 school children, three of integration was sought to reduce school operating costs between \$6000 and \$8000 per year, the amount needed to conduct the separate school.

The First State Bank, Post Office, county and city offices and West Texas Utilities office will close.

Local merchants have announced that they will observe the holiday by remaining closed, as is the tradition of this community. It is assumed that cafes and filling stations will remain open, at least part of the day.

American Legion and VFW leaders remind business firms to fly their flags Wednesday in further observance of the holiday.

Storm Watch Plan Receives Try-Out

No stimulation was required Sunday night in a try-out of the new storm alert system started recently by the Matador Volunteer Fire Department.

Former Chief Freddie Welling said two to four members of the department kept watch on the storm from vantage points, and in turn were in contact with Deputy Ed D. Smith by short-wave radio. Deputy Smith was in contact with the Texas Highway Patrol cars in the path of the storm.

Had a cyclone been sighted, the fire department would have criss-crossed the city north and south and east and west with the "emergency wagon" which is equipped with a "penetrator" siren, to warn residents.

The fire siren will be used only in the event of a fire or by the fire department, and not as a storm alert.

Some high winds accompanied the Sunday night storm which deposited about .70 inch rain here but much heavier in Roaring Springs and areas to the west.

Friendly Ladybugs Lead Strange Life

LIFE of a ladybug is not an easy one, but it is interesting. The friendly little insects that feed on aphids, thrips, red spider, the nymph and eggs of flea hoppers, the eggs and small larvae of the corn earworm, cotton boll worm and leaf worms, are imported from California.

W. M. Draper, 1207 Oakland Street, Plainview, knows all about ladybugs. He has been selling them for years. By the gallon. A gallon of ladybugs contains 135,000, give or take a few, you can count them. He imports them under proper refrigeration from California and they are available day or night (except Sundays). He makes no deliveries unless you want about 50 gallons of ladybugs.

Ladybugs are gathered from "bug beds" in the moist highlands of the Golden State, where the streams flow westward. Ladybug bug beds are always found on the north side of streams, and bug beds are permanent. They are valuable, too, similar to a mining claim. Some ladybug gatherers employ armed guards to protect their "claims" against poachers. When warm days come to the four to five thousand feet elevations, the ladybug migrates to the lower lands for food (the unfriendly insects) but they always return, like the salmon to a spawning ground, to lay their eggs and die. They always return to the same bug beds.

Ladybugs are collected from the California bug beds and shipped to Plainview under exacting refrigeration conditions, where they are kept until purchased by farmers. The ladybugs are hungry and ready to go to work when they become warm. They are also ready to lay millions of eggs. They cost from one-fourth to one-half as much as insecticides and they protect everything from rose gardens to wheat fields, infested by green bugs. Ladybugs are friendly bugs.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

If bagworms have been giving trouble on evergreens, now is the time to apply controls. At this time, worms are small and can be successfully controlled by using Malathion (50% emulsifiable concentrate 1 to 1 1/2 ounces per 5 gallons of water), Toxaphene (60% emulsified concentrate, 2 1/2 ounces per 5 gallons water), or lead arsenate (2 1/2 to 3 ounces per 5 gallons of water).

Now is the time to plan a silage program to insure that good feed is available when needed. Three types of horizontal silos may be used. The stack is the least expensive, and generally used for emergency silage storage. This is done by piling silage on the ground at a convenient and well drained site to the height of four to seven feet. Usually the stack is from 20 to 30 feet wide, and is covered with a plastic cover, anchored securely around the edges and over the top to prevent entrance of air. The trench silo is made on the side of a hill, and is usually 6 to 8 feet deep. The bunker silo is built above ground, and can be more conveniently located than the trench silo. For dur-

ability, it should be constructed of treated poles and planks or with tilt-up concrete panels. Plans for all types may be secured at my office.

The District 3 4-H leadership camp was held at Buffalo Gap on June 18-20, with campers receiving instructions in Soil and Water Conservation; Motor Safety; Entomology; Plant Life; Recreation; and Tips for Teens. Attending from Motley County were Trudy Hand and Shirley Stafford, Roaring Springs; Max Barton, Barbara Bird; and Tommie Green, Matador. Mrs. Loyd Stafford, Roaring Springs, served as 4-H leader for the group. Training received by the group will be used to strengthen the 4-H program in the county.

Today I received a new supply of Cotton Insect Control Guides. These may be obtained by calling at my office, or giving me notice that you would like a copy. Also available are control guides for Garden Insects; Orchard Insects; Field Crop Insects; Livestock and Poultry Parasites; Household Insects; and Ornamental Plant Insects.

Are you using fertilizer this year? If so, I think you will find it advisable to leave a check plot, and keep accurate records on the production of the check plot as well as the fertilized plot. The land type of the check plot should be the same as the land that is fertilized, or a true picture of the results produced by the use of fertilizer will not be

obtained. Don't try to compare one year against another, because it can't be done. The only way to determine the value of fertilizer is to follow the instructions given at the beginning of this paragraph, as this eliminates all guessing.

GRAIN SORGHUM TEST

Alfred Cooper of Matador carried out one of the four grain sorghum tests in accordance to plans made by the Motley County Program Building Committee. Twenty pounds of seed were secured from the breeders for each test, and results of the Cooper test that was planted on June 5 and harvested on October 1 were as follows:

RS-610, furnished by Taylor Evans Seed Co., Tullia, 1875 lbs./ac.; 0268, furnished by Paymaster Seed Farms, Aiken, 1875 lbs./ac.; L-744, furnished by Lindsey Seed Co., Lubbock, 1700 lbs./ac.; F-63, furnished by DeKalb Seed Co., Tullia, 1700 lbs./ac.

Cooper reported that the varieties in order of maturity were L-744, F-63, 0268 and RS610. The L-744 fell in places.

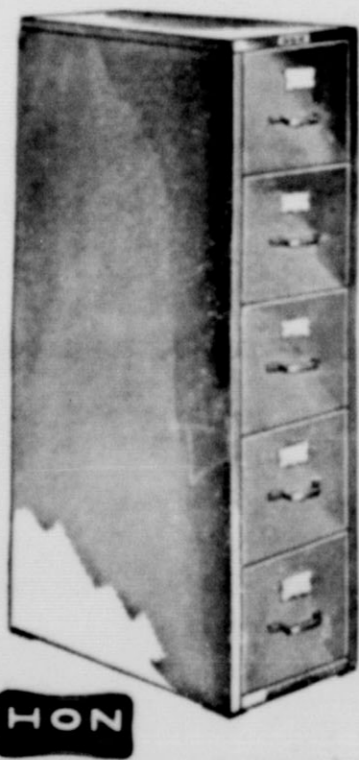
