HOUSTON -- For people with scasonal affective disorder, 'tis not the scason to be jolly.

Scasonal affective disorder (SAD), most often a form of depression, occurs with the seasons, especially winter. A psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston says SAD differs from the typical holiday "blues."

"The blues are common during the holidays and mostly comes and goes. But people with SAD are often depressed all winter long," said Dr. Ernest Fruge', an assistant professor of family medicine at Baylor.

Fruge' says although stress may be contributing factor to SAD, the disorder appears to be related to a low-light enviconment. It is also more common in higher

"As the longer days of spring and summer are replaced with short, dark days of winter, mood changes can occur,

more commonly in women as in men. It can run in families with a history of alcoholism or depression.

The first line of treatment for SAD is light the same place.

light therapy, which exposes the patient to white fluorescent indoor light for several weeks.

Studies show that results with light therapy are detected within the first we of treatment.

Although light therapy can produce side effects such as headache, eye strain, irritability and insomnia, the effects are mild and can be lessened by decreasing

light intensity.

If light therapy is ineffective, a physician may add antidepressants to the treat-

ment regimen.

Diet, exercise and stress management can also help increase energy level, Fruge' says, but it is important to seek medical attention.



Cotton harvesting on the High Plains of Texas is still underway. According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) estimated volume at USDA's Lubbock and Lamesa Cotton Classing Offices has risen close to the USDA crop estimate of 2.91 million bales.

Wendell Wilbanks, Director of the

Lubbock Classing Office, notes that his estimate for the 1994 crop has increased to 2.3 million bales. Projected volume for the Lamesa office is 480,000 bales.

for the Lamesa office is 480,000 bales. Taken together the estimates indicate a crop of 2.78 million running bales. Converting to 480 pound statistical bales puts the crop of 2.86 million bales based on the classing office figures. A total of 2.14 million bales have been classed in Lubbock and Lamesa through December

August and September very few people would have considered the possibility that this year's crop would come close to or top 2.9 million bales. Now it appears this year's crop is going to come very close to that level, with quality similar to what we saw in 1993.

"Quality has really become a key goal of producers across the High Plains," adds Johnson. "The last two growing seasons have proven that High Plains producers are willing to do whet it takes to produce a season of the producers." have proven that High Plains producers are willing to do what it takes to produce the highest quality fiber they can."

Classing reports indicate their efforts

High Plains Cotton Crop Records High Price, Cost

LUBBOCK -- Cotton growers on the Texas South Plains, an area that annually produces about half the state's cotton and 20-25 percent of the nation's crop, are rapidly winding up an unusual season with a more usual scenario: Good newsbad news. For many, the emphasis is on the good news: Mills are paying top prices for the lint, as high as 65 to 75 cents a

Despite a long, dry summer with rainfall well below normal, which devastated 1 million of the 3 million cotton acres in the 25-county area, the fields which surjusticated a million of the 3 million cotton acres in the 25-county area, the fields which surjusticated a million of the 3 million of the 25-county area, the fields which survived are yielding an estimated 2.7 to 2.8 million bales, said Kater Hake, cotton agronimost here with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Last year the 25 counties produced 3.45 million bales on 3.1 million acres which were harvested. Quality of last year's crop was very high and this year's quality is equally as

high and this year's quality is equally as good, Hake said.
"But the price from the mill is about 10

"But the price from the mill is about 10 cans a pound higher than last year," the agronimist said. "Last year, most growers' top receipt was about 60 cents."

Although many South Plains growers are receiving top price for their cotton this year, there is another side to the coin, says Dr. Jackie Smith, professor and agricultural economist with the Extension Service at Lubbock.

"This may be our highest gross return on our cotton, but we haven't had a more expensive gront for roduce, either." Smith

expensive crop to produce, either," Smith said. The long summer drought wiped out said. The long summer drought wiped out much of the dryland crop and meant high irrigation costs for farmers who could water their fields, he said.

Many area growers sell their cotton through the Plains Cotton Cooperative

Association (PCCA) pool, which pays a seasonal average price. "These growers may not be getting the season's highest price, but today's market is improving their seasonal average," Smith said. He noted that, year in and year out, growers in the pool feel they benefit from it. Some growers entered cash contracts earlier in the season which, while bringing a good return, won't equal the current price. "Many of our growers are in the denim

option, which means they sell their lint to the PCCA denim plant at Littlefield and share in the plant's profits," Smith noted. While the current market price may be higher than the price received through the denim option, over the years growers have benefitted from the option, Smith said. He said probably 15 to 20 percent of the area's cotton is in the denim option this year. this year.

Hake said the high price mills are paying for South Plains cotton, desite a record U.S. crop, "reflects the strong mill demand for West Texas cotton that has been built by two back-to-back years of excellent quality." He said it means there is a strong foreign and domestic demand for U.S. cotton and optimism about fu-

The quality of the South Plains cotton goods.

The quality of the South Plains cotton "is virtually identical to last year's record quality," Hake said. "Discounts for low quality this year are very, very slim." He said the reputation established by last year's crop is one reason mills are pursuing this year's South Pains crom

Social Security Tips

SOCIAL SECURITY IS AN INDEPENDENT AGENCY

History repeats itself. On August 15, 1994, President Clinton signed historic

1994, President Clinton signed historic Social Security legislation using the same pen that President Franklin Roosevelt had used to sign the original Social Security Act on August 14, 1935.

"For millions of Americans that signature 59 years ago transformed old age from a time of fear and want to a period of rest and reward," the President said as he signed the Social Security Independence and Program Improvements Act of 1994. The act establishes Social Security as an independent federal agency as of March independent federal agency as of March 31, 1995.

Commissioner of Social Security Shirley Chater commented on the nearly six decades since the program was en-acted. "When President Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act 59 years ago," she said, "it would have been impossible for him to conceive of a Social Security Admnistration that had 64,000 employ-ees serving the needs of 42 million people.

This institution may have changed in magnitude. And it is now changing in terms of its place on the federal organization chart.

But we still keep faith with Franklin Roosevelt's original vision. Social Secu-rity provides a competent, compassionate helping hand to people at the most vulnerable times of their lives. That is a mission we will continue to fulfill."

mission we will continue to fulfill."

Social Security has been a part of a larger government agency since 1939 when the Social Security Board became a component of the Federal Security Agency. The Social Security Administration (SSAS) was born in 1946. It has been linked with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and its predecessor department (Health, Educaton, and Welfare) since 1953.

Donna Shalala, DHHS Secretary, said, "With independent agency status, the President is giving a new level of recognition to SSA and to all those who receive Social Security benefits and who support this system through their payroll deduc-

tions." In discussing the relationship tions." In discussing the relationship between the agencies - past and future - she said, "Ithas been a long and satisfying relationship Many of the relationships and linkages that exist among as will be maintained. There will still be a need to coordinate the services provided by SSA and HHS programs such as Medicare and the programs of our Administration on Aging and the disabled."

Reiterating their mutural commitment

Aging and the disabled."
Reiterating their mutural commitment to the customers both agencies serve, Commissioner Chater and Secretary Shalala issued a joint statement in which they said, "The close working relationship between SSA and the Department... will be maintained. In particular, SSA will continue to work with its HHS partners the same services through SSA offices. We are committed to serving the American people even more effectively American people even more effectively in the years ahead." The 1994 act continues SSA's respon-

The 1994 act continues SSA stesponsibility for administering the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance (OASDI) and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) programs. The independent agency will continue to assist in administering the Medicare and black lung programs.

administering the Medicare and black lung programs.

To head the agency, the President will appoint a Commissoner, and Deputy Commissioner, both subject to Senate confirmation. Each will be appointed for a six-year term, with the initial term to end January 19, 2001. The law also calls for a new position, Inspector General, to be filled by the President. The Commissioner will appoint a Chief Financial Officer for SSA.

The act creates a seven-member bi-

Officer for SSA.

The act creates a seven-member bipartisan Social Security Advisory Board.
This Board is to meet at least four times a year to review "matters of policy" and make recommendations to the Commissioner. The board will not have a role in SSA operations. The President will appoint three Board members; the Speaker of the House and the President pro tempore of the Senate each will appoint two pore of the Senate each will appoint two members. The Board members will serve staggered six-year terms.
