## Broadcast Set By Methodist Church

A new schedule of broadcasts is announced by the First Methodist Church in addition to the regular broadcasts heard each Sunday at 11:00 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. Beginning at 7:00 a.m. Friday the church will broadcast a morning devotion. These morning devotions can be heard Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. Beginning Saturday evening vesper music will be heard from 6:30 to 7 o'clock. The vesper music is under the direction of Miss Roberta Jameson and can also be heard on Tuesday and Thursday. All these services can be heard regularly on 1100 on the radio dial.

The arrangement is now in use by several churches in this area, including Spur and Crosbyton.

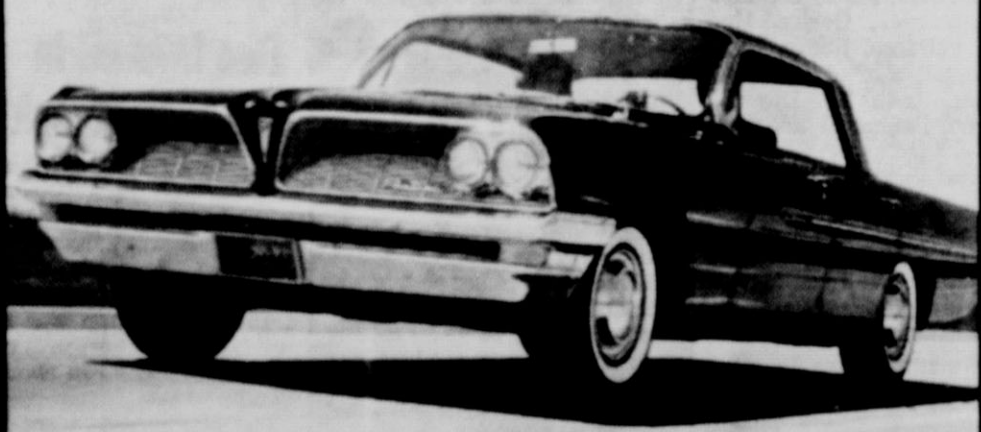

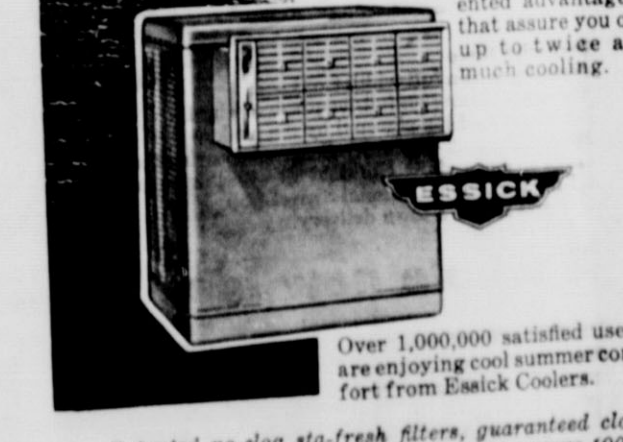

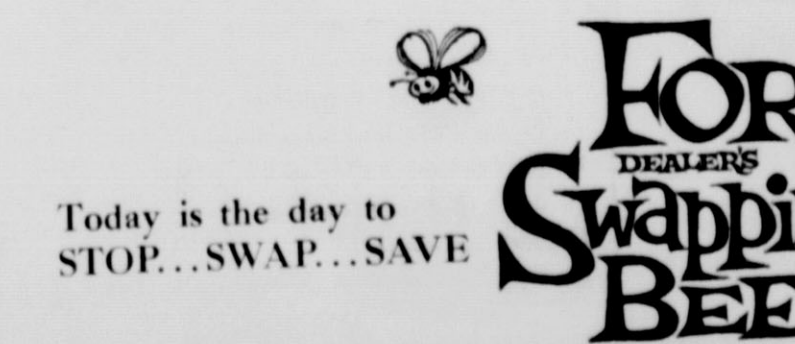
