County to Receive Survey of Economy

STARTING next week, the Texas Employment Commission will make a complete economic base report of Motley County. The work, which is expected to require six weeks will employ a crew of four with Gene P. Clements as supervisor of the smaller communities team.

The office will be open on October 16 and office hours will be from 8 to 5, Monday through Friday.

The team, headed by Mr. Clements, is experienced in the work and is composed of two married men and two unmarried employees of the Texas Employment Commission. Office will be located in the courthouse, in the basement area formerly occupied by the Motley County ASCS.

The only expense to the county will be the utilities used during the six weeks stay here. The telephone service for the period will be paid by the Matador Lions Club.

Primarily the survey will disclose the labor potential of the county with view of possible future industrial requirements.

County Judge Forrest Campbell said the TEC is anxious for everyone in the county to register, regardless of their present state of employment. Most of the interviews will be made in the office and will require but 5 or 10 minutes. An effort will be made to catalogue the skills, job experience, job potentials and job preferences of all the residents of the county, Judge Campbell stated.

High School juniors and seniors will be interviewed and members of the crew will go to the schools to secure the information.

A complete printed report of the survey will be made and the county will be supplied with 100 copies for future use, in the event of industry interest, or other purposes.

Mr. Clements will be the principal speaker at the next luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club, Tuesday, October 21.

Delinquency Blame Placed on Parents

THE SORRY harvest of today's delinquency is the fruit of seeds sown by parents, according to Minister Woodrow Pringle of the Matador Church of Christ, who made the principal address Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club.

"No character can exist without teaching," Minister Pringle declared, "and today we have a generation of adults reaping a harvest of delinquency simply because children were not taught the basic principles of character. . . it is regrettable that we have an army of delinquents larger than the army of volunteer servicemen. . . the great strength of our nation's character has been violated by bribes and treason and the basic needs for Christian training have been cast aside. . . it is the 'Law of Harvest' from seeds sown by adults. . ."

Minister Pringle's concise address received enthusiastic applause from members of the civic club and visitors. He was introduced by program sponsor, Lion Wayland Moore.

Autumn Chill In Panhandle

The chill of autumn spread over the Panhandle of Texas during the week end and dropped temperatures sharply after showers which accompanied the front that left as much as eight inches of snow in Colorado.

Clear, cool days and chilly nights have followed the passage of the storm.

The rainfall registered here was .42 inch, bringing the total to 8 inches since the break in hot, dry weather in August. The rainfall in August was 3.76 in and in September the total was 3.82 inches.

The mercury dropped to 46 degrees Tuesday morning, according to records kept by pharmacist Bob Stanley. The total for the year to this date is 18.52 inches.

Jaybirds Silence Matadors 19 to 6

The Jayton Jaybirds Friday night silenced the Victory Bell for the Matador Matadors, with a score of 19-6 on the 'birds home field.

A thrilling finale to the game was performed in the last 20 seconds of play when Ronnie Welling executed a spectacular 75-yard dash for Matador's only touchdown.

Sports Editor Lance Jameson for the Matador Brand reports: In the first two quarters of the game both teams put up a defensive battle and the half ended with a scoreless tie, 0-0.

Jayton returned with an explosive offense highlighted by Martin Garcia's three touchdowns. In the third quarter he crossed the goal line from the 5-yard line, but the extra point failed. In the last of the quarter, the Jaybirds were on the Matadors' 5-yard line with a first down and goal to go. The Matadors' defensive strength held them back; however, luck was with Jayton when the ball was fumbled and Jayton recovered. In the fourth quarter Jayton added six more points when Garcia dove across the goal line from the 2-yard line. Garcia scored the final touchdown for the Jaybirds on a 66-yard pass play and Kin Nichols booted the point.

With 20 seconds left in the game the Matador Matadors showed their "Don't Give Up" spirit that everyone has admired this season, when halfback Ronnie Welling raced 75 yards for a Matador touchdown. The try for extra points wasn't successful.

The Matadors lost fullback Kenneth Marshall with an injury in the first quarter of the game and it's undermined when he will be able to return. Also, end Stanley Thompson received a shoulder injury and halfback Ronnie Welling has been playing with a hand injury. End Glen Moss is out for the season with a knee injury, and Don James has been out for several weeks with an arm injury.

"It's obvious by Matador's playing we would be winning more games if our players hadn't received football injuries," said Coach Stan Irvine. "These are the things that a team and a coach have to face; nevertheless, I'm proud of our boys' determination and attitude against such odds."

The Matadors will meet the Rochester Steers here at Burleson Field Friday night at 8 o'clock.

Article Features Resident's Father

An article by Tanner Lane, Lubbock Avalanche-Journal staff writer, in Monday's Lubbock Avalanche, featured the late John Davis Earnest, father of Mrs. Bob Echols.

The article related several legends concerning the old "High Lonesome" ranch, a name given the Mallet Cattle Co., ranch which Mr. Earnest, better known as "Uncle Dave," managed, and which lay across the Texas-New Mexico line.

Mr. Earnest served as a Texas Ranger for a time, and also as an Indian fighter before ranching on his own.

Mrs. U. L. Wilie, prominent clubwoman, civic leader and lifetime resident of Matador died about 1 a.m. Wednesday in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock. She had been in failing health the past year and was conveyed to the hospital Friday.

Funeral services will be at 4 p.m. today (Thursday) in the First Methodist Church, with the Rev. John Fitzgerald officiating. Burial will be in East Mound Cemetery with Seigler Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

The former Virginia Walton was born in Matador, September 11, 1893, to the late Carrie and Walter A. Walton. Her father was one of the founders of the town of Matador and served as the first County Clerk of Motley County. Her husband, the late U. L. Wilie was a prominent rancher in this area, and as a couple they led in community fund drives such as the March of Dimes. They were married April 24, 1916, in Plainview.

Following her husband's death September 30, 1952, Mrs. Wilie assumed management of their ranching interests and was counted among the successful financiers of the county.

Mrs. Wilie, for whom the Virginia Walton Wilie roadside park south of town, was named, gave the land for the recreation facility.

She was a charter member of El Progresso Study Club when it was organized in 1927 and served as its president three terms, in 1935-37 and two consecutive terms from 1941 to 1945. She had held a number of appointments in Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and was State Treasurer for the term 1949-1951. She was a member of Matador Garden Club, which she served as president during 1963-64. Mrs. Wilie was Past Worthy Matron of Matador Chapter No. 66 Order of the Eastern Star and had been a member for almost 50 years. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Clotelle Horn of Matador, one sister, Mrs. R. E. Donovan (Hazel Walton) of Matador and a niece, Mrs. Carl Pierce (Rose), of Lubbock.

Pallbearers will be Howard Traweck, Bill McCaghen, Pat Sheridan, Forrest Campbell and John Evans; Scotty Gearner of Paducah, J. J. Gibson of Guthrie and U. C. Sterquell of Amarillo. Members of Matador Masonic Lodge will serve as honorary pallbearers.

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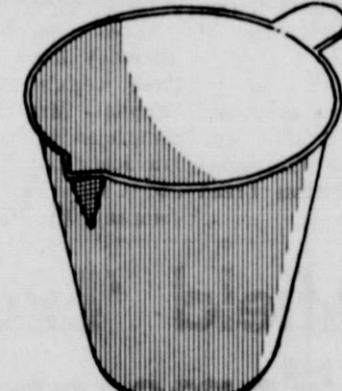
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Pep Rally Held on Courthouse Lawn
