Matadors To Face Mustangs In Competitive Scrimmage

The Motley County Matadors are working hard this week preparing for their upcoming scrimmage this Friday against the Claude Mustangs. The scrimmage is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. Friday evening in Claude, Texas.

The Mustangs should provide the Matadors with a very competitive scrimmage. They have an experienced offensive line led by 5' 9", 200 lb. junior tackle, Clifford Davis. Senior tight end Mark Hall (6'5", 200 lb.) is being touted as one of the

area's standout receivers. The Mustangs' offense is led by senior quarterback Jeff Whelchel (6'0", 160 lb.). However, the rest of the starting backfield was lost to graduation. The Mustangs' offense is primarily a veer option type attack from multiple formations, motions and shifts. The Matadors will have to play disciplined, defensive football to stop the Claude offense.

Defensively, the Mustangs will line up in a 4-3 defense. With six starters returning from last

season's defense, the Matador offense will face a stiff challenge.

The Matadors' progress has been severely hampered the last

several days by players missing practice. "A football team is like a race car. The coaches are the mechanics and the players are the different parts of the machine. It is impossible for the coaches to fine tune the race car

and get it operating at maximum efficiency with two wheels and three spark plugs missing," explained Coach Hollenback. The players who miss practice are required to stay after practice for "Roadgang", a combination of running and exercises to help them make up for the conditioning they missed in regular practice. However, there is no way to make up the actual football practice they are missing.

"We have the talent and numbers to have a successful football season this fall; but the players must attend each and every practice for this to happen. We have so many things to work on offensively and defensively that time is very precious. The players and their parents must understand the vital importance of practice to the ultimate success of our program, if we are to be successful," added Hollenback.

Minkley urges everyone to call if they would like to go.

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
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

District 2-T2 Governor To Pay Official Visit To Lions Club

The top district official of Lions International, Melvin Powers of Lubbock, District 2-T2 Governor will pay his official visit to the Matador Lions Club at the organization's meeting September 3.

Announcement of the scheduled visit was made last week at the club's regular luncheon-meeting, August 23, at the United Methodist Church. Boss Lion Jack Van Eaton presided and led the club in appreciation applause for the meal, prepared and served by Mrs. Mutt Smith and Mrs. Mike Smith.

Guests introduced by Recorder Lion Bill McCaghren were Ronald W. Cummings, new principal of Motley County Schools, and Jobe Moss of Lubbock, who presented the program. Mr. Moss is Associate Vice President, Investments and Futures specialist with Dean Witter Reynolds, Inc.

Lion Larry Hoyle introduced the speaker as a graduate of Texas Tech University, currently a broker and a "good golfer". His subject covered commodities trading of basic raw materials and goods such as cattle, wheat

and corn and how the Chicago Board of Trade functions.

The investments specialist offered some sound advice to the Lions by suggesting that they "follow rules, figure out what you can afford to lose, have a plan and limit your losses. Don't over trade. There are cattle and live hogs options, as well as cotton, corn and wheat options." He also discussed U.S. Government interest rates and retirement plan, saying that the interest rates are stable, but might go up later.

"Futures are high risks," he said. "they can be wrong --- and they can be good."

A report on the Lions-Eternas Club ball game held recently revealed that the net profits would be divided between the organizations. The amount to be divided is about \$350.00. Approximately 40 community calendars distributed by the Lions, were sold at the game, and these will continue to be on sale at West Texas Utilities office.

Also announced was the upcoming date for the annual fall Ladies Night and faculty members banquet, October 15 has been set for this event.




