MINUTES HELD FOR PAUL M. PATTON

Paul M. Patton, 56, life-time resident of Matador died Thursday night shortly before midnight in Stanley Hospital, where he had been a patient the past few weeks. He had been ill for several months, following surgery for brain tumor, in June.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Gene Hawkins, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister of Matador.

Burial, with graveside Mason services led by Bill Moss, was in East Mound Cemetery, with Eudy-Seale Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Pallbearers were Howard Traawek, Brooks Calloway, Bob Fullinmeyer, Jack Simpson, J. D. Spray and Glenn Woodruff.

Mr. Patton was born at Matador, April 29, 1904 and died December 1, 1960 at the age of 56 years, 7 months, 2 days. He had lived here all his life and had been employed at the Matador Auto Company for 31 years. He was married here in 1923 to Miss Rachel Patton.

Decorations Herald Christmas Season

SPIRIT of the holiday season was heralded in Matador this week with colorful lights and decorations throughout the community. Many more will be arranged this week according to reports.

Colored Christmas lights on Matador's Main street were installed quickly this year through the cooperation of city employees and the West Texas Utilities Company. Colored lights were also being strung on the tower tank and around the base of the tall elevated reservoir.

More windows have been decorated with lights, Christmas trees and holiday merchandise.

Winter Arrives

Old Man Winter moved into the Texas Panhandle with shuddering audacity early Tuesday and promptly kicked the mercury in thermometers down below the freezing point.

Light rain, sleet and snow brought the cotton harvest to a stop and allowed gins to catch their collective breaths. Light snow covered the ground at Flo-mot Tuesday morning and made highway traffic hazardous for a time.

Forecasters see a warming trend expected to set in about the end of the week. Meanwhile skies remain overcast and the temperature holds around the freezing point, with much lower readings at night.

Bennie Keltz Is New Manager at West Texas Gin

Bennie Keltz, well-known Motley County farmer, is the new manager of West Texas Gin plant here. He assumed the responsibilities of the place last week, filling the vacancy created in the death of former manager Ernest Elliot who was the victim of a heart attack ten days ago.

Mr. Keltz said the offer as manager of Matador's only cotton gin came unexpectedly when Gordon Hedrick, manager of the gin department of the Quannah Cotton Oil Company asked him if he would accept the position.

He said he accepted and asked Hedrick when he wanted him to go to work. "Within the next 30 minutes, if you are ready," was the reply.

The gin, which is operating on a 24-hour basis, may complete the largest season in its history. Currently 16 local people are employed. Powered by a 500 HP electric motor, the gin is the largest user of electric current in the community, also a large amount of butane gas is used in the drying of cotton.

Largest cotton crop since 1949 is taxing the capacity of gins throughout the Texas Panhandle. Although the plants hum day and night, farmers bring cotton to the yards faster than it can be processed.

Mr. Keltz said he would estimate that approximately 90% of the cotton in the Matador area has been harvested.

The use of mechanical strippers has greatly accelerated the harvest of the 1960 crop.

Lions Speaker Says World Not Tough When Christ is Accepted as Partner

"THE WORLD is not tough when you invite Christ to be with you every day and keep Him as your partner," Ray Noblitt, retired Clarendon business man told the membership and visitors at the regular Tuesday luncheon of the Matador Lions Club. Visitors included the entire Matador Matadors victorious football team, and two basketball girls, Frances Cooper and Carol Campbell guests of the club.

Former Resident Killed in Crash

A 58-year-old Petersburg resident, William R. Moffett, was killed instantly about 7:50 p.m. Thursday when his car and a pickup truck loaded with cotton collided near Petersburg.

The mishap occurred on F-M Road 54 2.6 miles west of there, investigating highway patrolman R. C. Dunn said.

Moffett, a sales manager of Schuler Implement Co., of Petersburg had formerly lived in Matador and owned an implement business here during the late 1930's, and again in 1954.

The car driven by Moffett, Dunn said, struck the rear of the cotton trailer, which was attached to a pickup truck driven by Nolan J. Fred, Rt. 2 Petersburg.

Dunn said the impact "all but disintegrated" the trailer, which came loose from the truck and spilled the cotton, blocking part of the highway. Tom Elliott, Petersburg, sustained minor injuries when his car plowed through the cotton moments later.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday at the Petersburg First Baptist Church, and burial was in the cemetery at Sylvester.

Survivors include his wife, eight sons, five daughters, five brothers, four sisters; his mother, Mrs. Laura Jane Moffett of Winfield, La., and 10 grandchildren.

Testing Finished For Brucellosis

Cattle testing in Motley County for Brucellosis (Bangs) control has been completed and the mobile laboratory has moved to Cottle County where testing is underway.

All owners of cattle in Motley County who for any reason failed to get their herd tested, whether it be one cow or more, should contact the County Judge Elbert Reeves and ask for a date for a technician to return and secure the test.

Since the majority of the cattle owners signed a petition to have Motley County designated as a free area so far as Brucellosis is concerned, every herd had to be tested and it is unlawful for a herd to remain untested for a herd to remain untested, officials of the Animal Health Commission have advised.

In view of the above ruling, owners of untested herds should report that fact at once to the proper officials, Judge Reeves stressed.

Season's Summary For Big Red Team

When the Matador Matadors stopped Newcastle to win the Regional Championship, they completed their most successful season in history. They won 11 games and tied 1, winning the last 8 in succession. Other Matador teams have won 11 games, but they all lost a game.

The Matadors rolled up 464 points during the season, and allowed only 88 to their opponents. Guy Campbell led the Matador scoring with Ros Bear-

den second. Campbell was the leading rusher. He gained 1,468 yards on 238 carries for an average of six yards per carry. Gary Lancaster was the top passer. He threw 38 passes and completed 18, 11 for touchdowns.

The Matadors shut out four teams this season and allowed only one touchdown to five others. The most points scored against the Matadors were 22, by Ralls.

The Matadors, on the other hand, scored more than 30 points in 8 games, and more than 40 in 5. Their high was 78 points against Floydada "B". Their low was 12 against Rochester.

The Matadors have now won 5 Regional Championships, four in the past 7 years. They may do it again next year.

Three Matadors were honored by area papers during the year. The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal named Guy Campbell and Gale Stafford "Back" and "Lineman of the Week", respectively. Gary Lancaster was named "Class 'B' Player of the Week" by the Amarillo Globe-Times.

The students of the fourth grade were entertained with a program presented by the third grade. This program took them back to the days when there were no machines or books.

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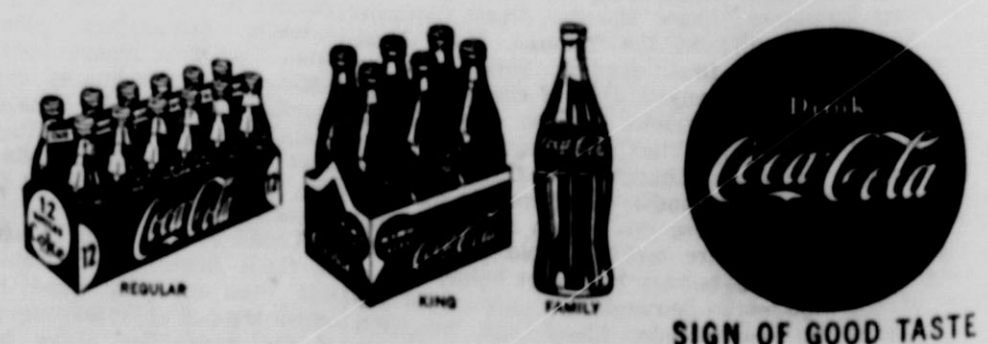

Cotton Allotment Plan is Defined

In response to questions raised by some growers about 1961 upland cotton allotments, Tommy Moore, office manager, Motley County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, explained the difference between the 1961 program and the one in effect for the past two cotton crops.

He pointed out that the 1961 national allotment of 18.5 million acres compares with the "regular" 1960 allotment of 16.3 million acres. This 1960 figure was increased to 17.5 million acres under Choice (B) elections.

Opposition to the quotas by more than a third of the voters would mean no quotas or penalties for 1961 and support at 50 per cent of parity to growers who complied with their acreage allotments.
