GRAND CHAMPION steer in the 23rd Motley County Stock Show Saturday was exhibited by 16-year-old Janice Brandon, a Roaring Springs high school girl. In addition to the grand champion award and trophy, she received 32¢ per lb. for her 995-pound Hereford from the First State Bank of Matador. Reserve champion steer was shown by her brother, 13-year-old Dan Brandon. He received 30¢ per pound for his 1080-pound Hereford with the Memphis Production Credit Association of Matador as the high bidder. Ann Brandon, 9-year-old sister of the two top winners, showed the 3rd place steer, a 1000-lb. Hereford.

A Matador trio, Kate Thompson, David Thompson and Loretta Thompson took the top places in the swine division. Kate Thompson won the grand championship in the barrow division with her 235-lb. Hampshire, her brother David won the reserve championship with his 260-lb. Hampshire. Loretta Thompson won the grand championship with her 230-lb. Hampshire in the heavy gilt division. Kate Thompson won the reserve championship in the same division.

Tommy Cooper of Roaring Springs won both the grand and reserve championships in the lamb classification. A total of 44 exhibitors showed 20 steers, 6 heifers, 3 lambs and 36 hogs. The exhibitors received a total of \$5,217.38, which included \$677.39 in prize money. Each of the 44 exhibitors received \$2 from the Motley County Farm Bureau American Hereford Association will pay (direct to exhibitors) 20% on all Hereford steers where prize money was over \$5.
