Stanley Advances Coffee to 10c Cup

These are changing times. Effective Monday, February 1, the price of a cup of coffee at the Bob Stanley Pharmacy will be 10c. Matador is one of the few towns in West Texas that has held the line on nickel coffee.

Monday will be the first time Stanley has charged 10c for a cup of coffee.

"We had to make a choice," Mr. Stanley said, "to offset part of the soda fountain loss, or remove it entirely. Many stores are removing their fountains entirely."

Actually, the price of coffee per pound has little bearing on the price per cup," Mr. Stanley said, "but the cost of operating our soda fountain has increased until we can no longer absorb the loss. We hope to continue operation of the fountain, although it will still be a loss with coffee at 10c."

Saddle Shop Closes To End Matador Era

FRAGRANCE of saddle leather is gone from Matador, home of the cowboy. The once cattle country community that knew the sound of cowboy spurs dragging on board sidewalks, has changed.

For the first time in more than a third of a century Matador is without a saddle shop. Carl Darr of Paducah, Monday moved the leather, the lariart rope, the spurs, girths and other equipment of riding men, to his Paducah shop. Matador has

reached the end of an era. O. Cannon, former manager of the shop, was forced to give up the work because of his health and is now employed on Dutehman line camp. Mr. Darr said it was impossible to find another saddle maker for the Matador shop.

So when a cowboy needs a new pair of leather leggings, a new saddle or bridle or anything else in the riding line, he will get in his car or pickup and drive 30 miles to Paducah.

Here Four Years Mr. Darr had owned the shop here for four years, after purchasing it following the death of craftsman and master saddlemaker H. H. Schweitzer. Mr. Schweitzer started the shop in Matador in 1924.

Pioneer Jim Cooper says the first saddle shop he can remember was opened here about 1901. Matador may be out of a saddle maker but it is not out of cowboys. The breaking up of the great Matador Land & Cattle Company empire does not mean that this has ceased to be a cattle country. It still remains as one of the finest in the world, but the ranges are smaller and the brands of a greater variety.

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New Car Tags Go On Sale Monday

Want to add an attractive new accessory to your automobile, truck or motor-scooter? The shiny black (with white figures) Texas license plates are recommended, especially if you intend to keep riding after the first of April.

The new plates go on sale Monday at the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector Jinks Wilson. The price is the same as last year. You can buy them in February and put them on immediately and you must have new licenses by the first of April.

Motley County (which registered about 800 automobiles in 1959) will start 1960 with the code letters AR and number 9225.

Trailer owners are reminded that the new law requires a certificate of title before a 1960 trailer can be issued.

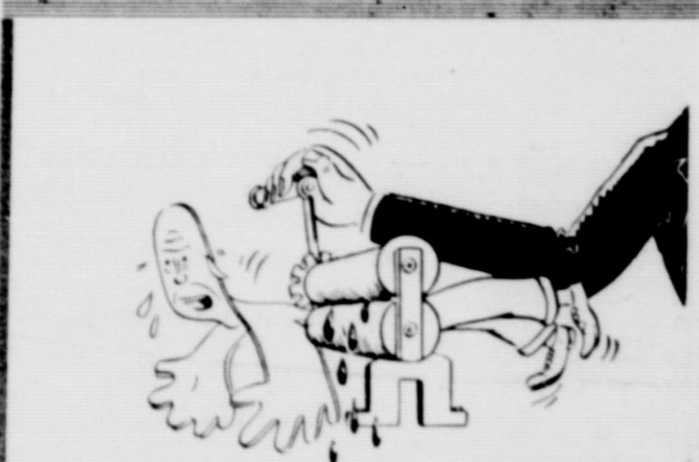
