### Roaring Springs Resident Claimed

Funeral services for Severe Newton Davis, 62, retired railroad man and long-time resident of Roaring Springs were held at 2 p.m. Friday at the First Baptist Church there.

Mr. Davis died in Stanley Hospital about 7 a.m. Thursday following a heart attack. He had been a patient there for several days.

Rev. G. C. Tiner of Dougherty, former pastor of the church of which he was assisted by the present pastor, Rev. Bob Moore, officiated at the funeral.

Mr. Davis was born in Upshur County, Texas, August 14, 1897 and died February 11, 1960 at the age of 62 years, 5 months and 27 days.

He was married in the locality of his birth, Sept. 1, 1917 to Miss Mady Ellison, and they moved to this area in 1927. They had made their home at Roaring Springs during that time and Mr. Davis was employed by the A. & P. Ry. until his retirement several years ago.

He is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Ted Kingery of Ball City, Texas; three sons, Huddell and Delmer, both of Dallas, and S. N. Jr. of Roaring Springs; 9 grandchildren; 2 great-grandchildren; 2 sisters, Mrs. Zena Conn and Mrs. Ima Wells, and one brother, Almer Davis, all of Bettie, Texas in Upshur County.

### Telegram Is Read

A telegram read in the church auditorium at the beginning of the meeting was from Major Jack Robinson, now stationed in Abilene, in which he congratulated the Matador Lions Club for its sponsorship of the annual banquet. He explained that he had been the first master of ceremonies 23 years ago when the banquet was organized by the late Lt. Paul Eubank.

Master of ceremonies Thursday evening was Roger Vinson. Announcements were made by Boss Lion Ben Edwards and invocation was by Elbert Reeves. Music at the banquet was by the "Swing Kings," Robert Brandon, David Rattan, Robin Brown and Larry Keltz. "Cotton John" Smith, KGNC radio station's well known "voice," recorded the speeches and played them back over the air Friday morning. He aided also in the introduction of "Goose" Ramey.

Innovation in the banquet was the serving of delicious barbecue prepared by a Lubbock catering firm, instead of cooking it here as had been the custom of the Lions during past years. Boys and fathers alike voice approval of the barbecue.

Members of the Scout Troop 60 were in charge of the city government Saturday, and concentrated on traffic violations which netted the boys over \$170 and concluded another annual Youth Week observance.

Contestants are given 45 seconds to identify, classify and give the characteristics of grasses and forage plants. Both live samples and mounted specimens are used, taken from a master list of 62 grasses, 13 forbs, 13 legumes and 12 woody plants.

### Drive is Nearing Objective

Although only \$175 under the goal of \$1500, Motley County's March of Dimes fund campaign has fallen short in its effort to sustain an unbroken record of accomplishment.
