Drawing Selected For Amphitheater

A drawing by Barbara Bird, Matador High School senior was selected to be reproduced in stone on the entrance wall of Palo Duro Canyon amphitheater. It was announced this week. The drawing depicts the ranching industry of Motley County. The contest was staged by the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation to secure drawings representative of counties in the panhandle area. More than 40 drawings will be displayed April 21 at ceremonies to dedicate the new amphitheater in Palo Duro State Park.

Honorable Mention for three other drawings submitted in the contest went to Rosanne Terry, 8th grade student, who submitted a drawing of the Comanche Indian camp ground at Roaring Springs, Nancy Bond, sophomore, for a sketch of Highway 10 across Motley County, and Terry Keltz, 7th grade student, for his drawing of the first post office in Matador.

FLOMOT TOPS VOTE COUNT FOR TRUSTEES

A CANVASS of the votes cast Saturday in Motley County by the Commissioners Court, showed Flomot Independent School District far out in front in the total number of votes cast. Flomot exceeded the remainder of the county combined, with a total of 101 patrons going to the polls.

M. S. Patton of Matador, candidate for trustee at large on the county school board, received a total of 202 votes.

Flomot re-elected O. D. Calvert with 52 votes and Leon Floyd went on the board as a new member with 47 votes. Jesse Browning was named a member of the county school board from Precinct 2, with 93 votes. Patton also received 93 votes at Flomot.

Roaring Springs was second in the number of votes cast (to elect 3) Clyde Clifton (54) and Clyde Williams (63) were re-elected and I. W. Lefevre went on as a new member with 69 votes.

Matador polled only 21 votes. Clifford Martin and Leon Smallwood each received 21 votes for reelection. Raby Webb received 20 votes as a member of the county school board and Patton received 21 votes here.

Martin, Smallwood, Browning and Patton each received 6 votes at Whiteflat. Patton and Martin received 10 votes each and Smallwood 9 at Northfield.

Law requires trustee elections in schools with less than 500 scholars, be canvassed by the Commissioners Court, County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent Elbert Reeves declared.

GOVERNOR TO LEAD PARADE IN COTTLE-KING HORSE SHOW

PADUCAH, (Special) — Governor John Connally has accepted an invitation to lead the western parade that will officially open the 21st Annual Cattle-King Horse and Colt Show and Rodeo in Paducah on April 26.

Shortly before the parade, which is scheduled for 5 p.m., the Texas governor will speak briefly to the public.

Rodeo performances are slated for both Friday and Saturday nights, along with western dances each evening.

Festivities will get underway Friday morning with an old settlers reunion at the VFW Building. Following the afternoon parade which will officially open the show, a chuck wagon dinner for the public will be held at the rodeo grounds.

Sunrise Service in Palo Duro Canyon

The new open-air theater of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation in Palo Duro State Park will be used for the first time in an inter-denominational sunrise service at 6 o'clock Easter morning, April 14.

Sponsored by the Canyon Christian Youth Council, the service will be open to the public, and the usual entrance fee to the park will be waived to those attending the service.

The sermon will be delivered by the Rev. James Dunn, director of the Baptist Student Union of West Texas State College. Rev. Dunn is a nephew of Mrs. H. O. Stanfield of Matador.

Special music for the youth service will be provided by the vested Canyon High School Choir and organ.

Rev. Miller Robinson, pastor of the First Baptist Church will take part in a Jamaican Crusade, April 21-May 4 at the invitation of the Baptist State Home Mission Board.

Rev. and Mrs. Robinson and their young son will leave next Thursday for Gatesville, where Mrs. Robinson and John Loyd will visit her family. Rev. Robinson will leave Dallas by plane on the morning of the 19th. The flight itinerary calls for stops in Atlanta, Ga., and Miami, Florida.

From Miami the flight goes directly to Jamaica. An orientation meeting is scheduled for the 20th in Montego Bay and the crusade begins the following day.

Rev. Robinson has been assigned to preach in a church in the mountain country about 20 miles from Kingston. This is one of several small churches which Rev. A. Findlay pastors. There are only 50 pastors for the approximately 250 Baptist Churches in Jamaica, according to information received by Rev. Robinson.

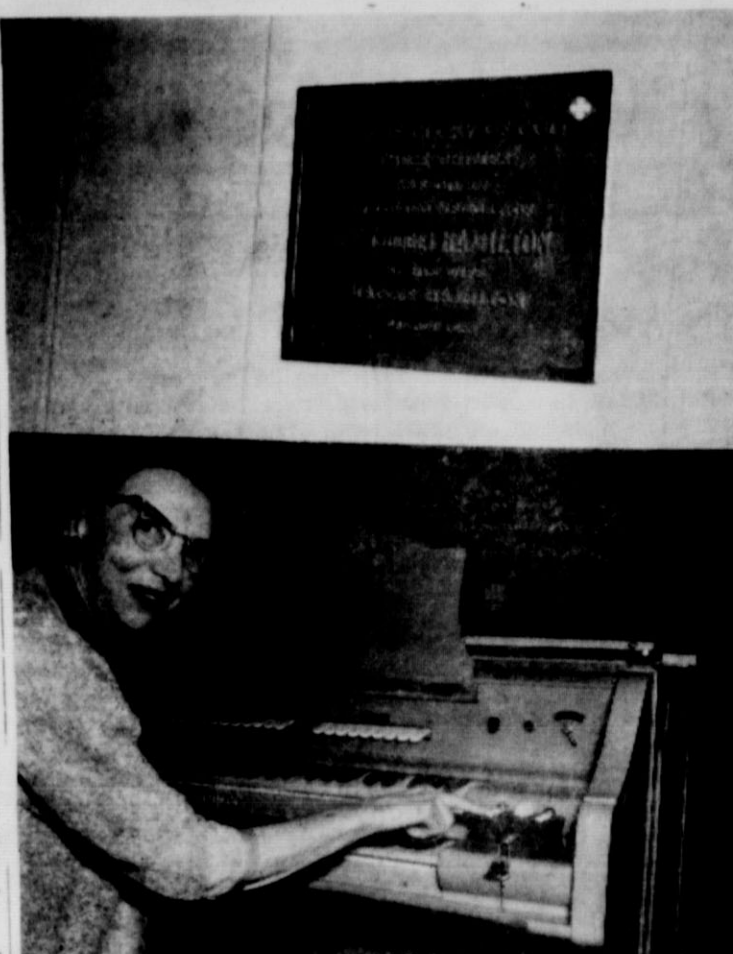
An Apology

Church Chimes will Honor City Pioneer

CHIMES IN THE METHODIST Church Easter Morning will formally pay tribute to one of Matador's most beloved pioneers, the late G. E. Hamilton, who died November 7, 1962. The excellent chimes were presented to the church by his widow, Mrs. G. E. Hamilton, in memory of her husband.

A bronze plaque on the wall near the church organ which controls the chimes, bears the following inscription: "To the Glory of God These Chimes are given in Loving Memory of G. E. (Judge) Hamilton by his wife, Maggie Hamilton, Easter 1963."

The chime system was installed last week by Schulermerich Company and is known as "ChimeAtron Carillon." Fifteen notes on the organ keyboard can be used to play the chimes.

An outside control permits the chimes to be heard for several blocks through a large bell amplifier on the church building roof. Factory representative who installed the chimes said Matador was one of the smallest towns in the country to have the quality type equipment such as this.

The chimes will be played for the first time in a regular service on Easter Sunday morning, and will remind Matador residents each Sunday morning at 9 o'clock to attend the church of their choice.

1st Stock Show Held in 1940

Old files of the Tribune disclose that the first fat stock show was held here March 30, 1940 on "the courthouse lawn." The idea was originated by former County Agent Rufus J. Emmons, who was aided by the late Hawley Plemmons. Between 30 and 40 calves were exhibited. Some swine were also shown. It

was started as a 4-H Club show and all participants in the first show were boys. The show was judged by Roy C. Mowery, instructor in animal husbandry at Texas Tech. C. B. Martin, then county agent of Hale County attended the show to discuss with the boys and their fathers, the marketing of their calves a Kasas City, with the Hale County boys after the show in Plainview, April 8-9 (1940).

Other interesting items in the Tribune printed 23 years ago, included: "Rock entrance to East Mound Cemetery had been completed by the American Legion at a cost of \$175 according to the late L. B. "Bob" Robertson, Commander."

The city was making plans for Matador Roundup and Rodeo on May 17-18. Members of the Matador Lions Club had been ordered to refrain from shaving until after the celebration.

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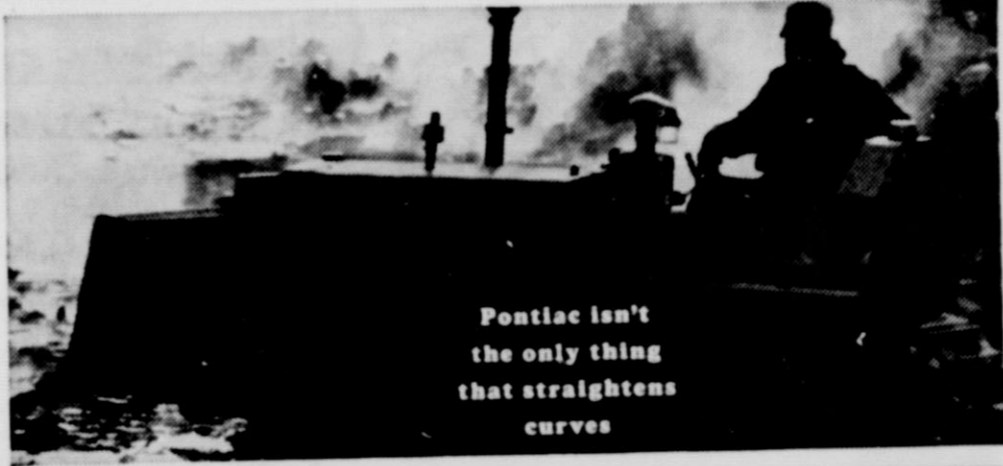


