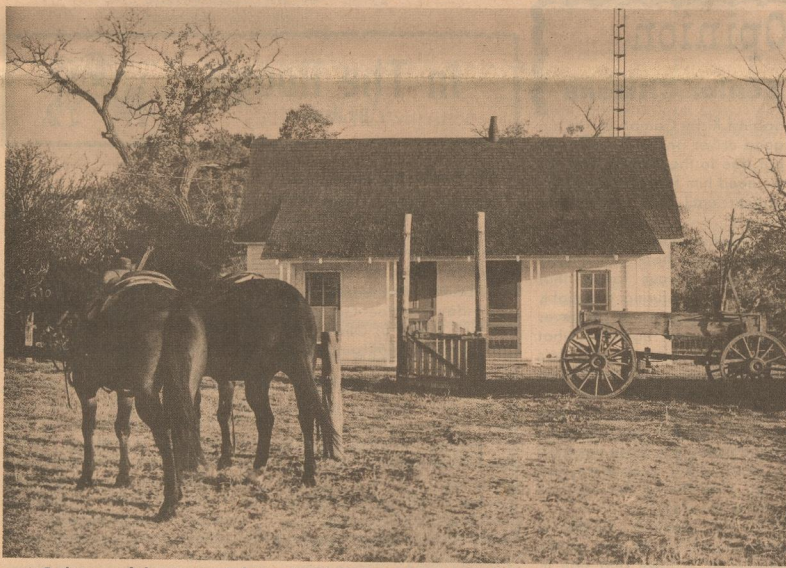

History Day At The Ranch Scheduled For October 19 and 26



Only one of the many sights to be viewed and explained at the History Day At The Ranch. For your convenience the historical tour will be on two consecutive Saturdays.

Rain or shine, early fall snow or no, plans are being made for "History Day at the Ranch", a sesquicentennial project of the General James Smith Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas to run the last two Saturdays in October, the 19th and 26th. To avoid disappointment history buffs are urged to make reservations early by calling Mrs. W. E. Burlison (806-983-3624) or Mrs. S. C. Burlison (806-983-2977) for scheduling information.

Geared primarily for school children but of interest to adults as well, the program is drawing students from many area schools. Fifty-five Motley County school children and sponsors are planning to attend the lectures, displays, demonstrations, and on-site history instruction by costumed volunteers representing the early settlers of our area: the Indians, Comancheros, ranchers, and nesters.

The rugged, two to three hour tour (with tours spaced an hour apart) will begin at "Cottonwood Mott", a line camp used by cowboys since 1879, and by the Matador Land and Cattle

Company until 1951, where two historic shoot-outs took place. Judge Billy Joe Whitaker, Motley County historian, and Judge Jay Johnson, descendant of a participant in one fight, will be on hand to tell the stories while Johnny Stevens, the last manager of the ML&C Co., will outline the history of one of the largest ranches in Texas.

At this point the visitors will climb into pickups and travel across ranch feed roads to view the remains of ca. 1900 half-dugout where Edna Leonard Waybourn, assisted by Mrs. Douglas Blackburn, President of the General James Smith Chapter of DRT, and other costumed ladies, will relate the story of the Fields family and how Mrs. Waybourn's father, Frank Leonard, came to purchase it in 1903. While keeping the home fires burning, but hopefully not the stew, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Campbell will set up a quilting frame for a fifty year old quilt, pieced by Mrs. Campbell's mother, which visitors can see being quilted by bonneted Mrs. Josephine Hamilton, Mrs. Campbell and

others.

Once back at the camp the group will hear a brief history on the Apache, Kiowa, and Comanche Indians who camped on Mott Creek and in the general vicinity. Wayne Parker will illustrate his talks with artifacts he has found in Crosby County. Assisting Wayne will be Jay Rhett Parker, his son; Choise Smith, Floyd County Judge and grandson of early pioneer Hank Smith; and Otho Stubbs, western artist from Turkey who specializes in the history of the Comanchero era.

Pitching their tipi underneath the cottonwoods of Mott Creek, authentically costumed Buckskinners will give a short talk on the Mountain Men era of 1840, demonstrate the art of black powder shooting, and answer questions on their clothing, equipment and lodging.

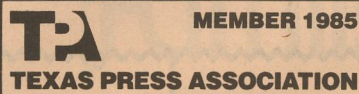

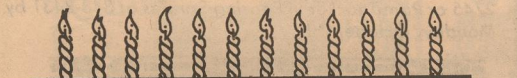

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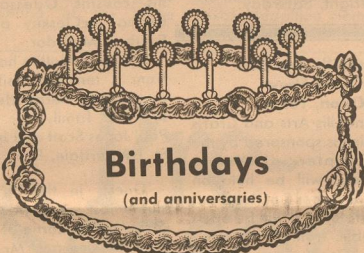

Bundy Campbell, grandson of the founder of the original Matador Ranch, will serve as coordinator of the cowboys, keeping the tales flowing and reasonably honest.

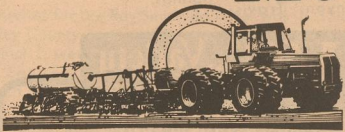

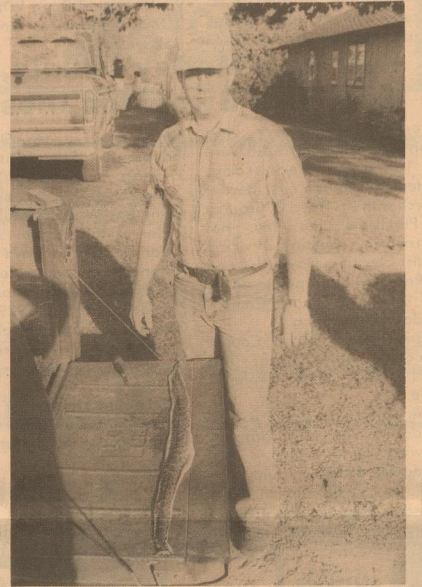

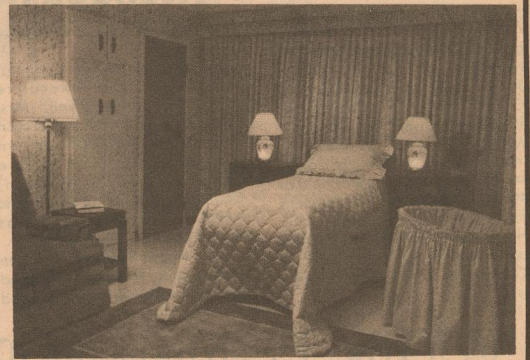

Birthing Room Added To South Park In Lubbock



South Park's New Birthing Room in Lubbock

At first glance, the large room resembles a well appointed hotel suite or luxurious bedroom. But hidden behind the fitted drapes and inside the custom built oak furniture is the latest in obstetrical labor and delivery equipment.

The birthing room, newly completed and entering service this weekend at South Park Medical Center, was designed to provide the maximum in patient comfort only seconds away from the hospital's fully equipped surgical suites and nursery area.

"Gone is the cold, impersonal environment of labor and delivery rooms of the past," stated Ms. Sandy Milburn, director of South Park's nursing service. "The birthing room was constructed and decorated specifically to create a warm and relaxed atmosphere."

"When the patient is comfortable and at ease, the birthing experience is better for everyone involved, especially the mother," she continued.

In contrast to the standard routine of transferring the patient from a labor room to delivery and recovery rooms, the birthing room allows the family to remain in one room throughout the birthing experience.

According to Ms. Milburn, this is an important part of South Park Medical Center's family-centered care which focuses not only on the mother's medical needs, but on the emotional well-being of the entire family.

"We are very proud of our new birthing room," Ms. Milburn stated. "The room has been in planning and construction for almost a year. We realized early the importance of providing the right setting for those mothers wishing to utilize a more natural birthing technique."

Essential to the operation of the birthing room is the specially designed birthing bed. Looking like a regular bed without headboard, comforter and pillow shams, the birthing bed

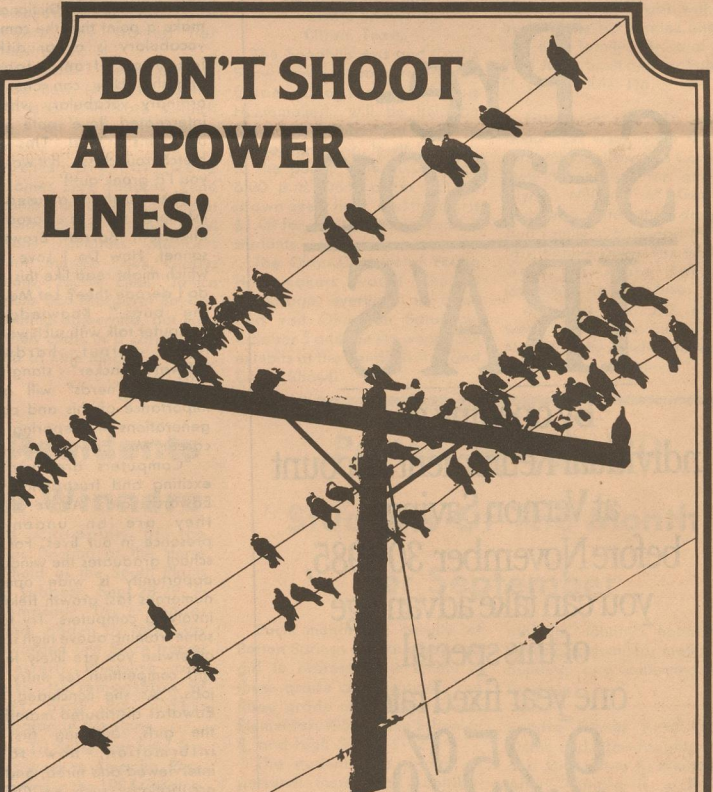
converts quickly to a sophisticated birthing chair designed to accommodate all obstetrical requirements for both normal and complicated childbirths.

The electrically operated bed easily changes shape to produce the most comfortable position for the mother during and after delivery. Because the bed forms a birthing chair, the mother can observe the child being born while using the sitting position which makes the delivery easier.

The baby and mother then remain in the bed during the bonding period, when the parents get acquainted with their new baby.

South Park's new birthing room also contains a bassinet, an oak dresser and entertainment center with color television, night stands, and a recliner and end table. The walls and draperies are beige with a pastel blue and rose colored floral pattern.

• **Always Disconnect Cords by Pulling on the plug**

When disconnecting electrical items, be sure to pull on the plug — not the cord! If you pull on the cord, you'll eventually wear it out and expose hazardous wires. Also, don't overload extension cords or outlets.
