AN EDITORIAL

Elect A West Texas Statesman As The Next Governor of Texas

TEXAS is going to elect a new governor this year and it can well be one of the most decisive elections in the state's history. Texas needs a new kind of leadership, a fresh approach to increasing problems. One of the ablest men in Texas is a candidate.

The Tribune supports unequivocally and without reservation, the candidacy of Marshall Formby of Plainview, for the office of governor. The Tribune believes Marshall Formby will bring a fresh dignity and outstanding leadership to the state's highest office. He is not a member of any special group or clique. He has the experience, the integrity and the sound character to provide Texas with the kind of leadership it deserves.

His campaign will not be an easy one. According to current "polls" he ranks lowest among the announced and semi-announced candidates. Obstacles do not discourage Marshall Formby. He has had them all his life. He is well-aware that he must combat some of the most powerful political machinery ever assembled in any state. He knows that great quantities of money will probably be poured in to the campaign (money in quantities he can not match because he is a man of modest means).

Marshall Formby is a common man but his sincerity, his impartial judgement and character are uncommon. He deserves the solid block support of West Texas so he can devote his time to the big centers of population. We of West Texas are political prisoners of the great voting areas by the simple process of being out-voted. In this election we have an opportunity to place a statesman in the highest office in the statehouse, but we must support him with influence, funds to his campaign and our faith in his ability to be elected!

Political Interest is Again Showing Life

POLITICAL interest in Motley County almost dormant for two years, again showed a pulse this week with five candidates announcing in this issue of the Tribune.

The five candidates hold county offices and are seeking re-election. They were received in this order: County Judge Elbert Reeves (whose formal announcement will be published later), District and County Clerk Pat Sheridan, County Treasurer

Mrs. Velma Fuller, County Commissioner Precinct 2 Malcolm Turner and County Commissioner Precinct 4 Charles Long. Date of the first Democratic Primary is May 5.

At the present time top state political interest appears to be centered on the office of governor. The Tribune (see editorial this page) will support the candidacy of Marshall Formby of Plainview.

Former Dickens County Judge, former State Senator (from which he entered the armed services) and later Chairman of the State Highway Commission, Mr. Formby is well known in West Texas and generally known throughout the state. He was reared on a farm near McAdoo.

It is possible that a tense race may develop in the newly-combined eight-county 2nd State Representative District, but the Tribune has not received an announcement for the office. At the present time it appears as if the fireworks may be centered on the governor's race, but candidates have a way of frequently using the element of surprise in their campaigns.

Velma Fuller To Seek Office Again

Mr. Elliott repaired the broken piece and within about three hours the machine was again setting lines. To our newspaper friends, the part broken was Mergenthaler No. E-1882, left hand vice jaw block. It broke away around the screws that secure the vice jaw.

Lubbock GI on Duty Near Czech Border

While Lubbock and the South Plains were basking in the relatively mild Christmas temperatures which edged into the lower sixties, the ground was covered with snow and it was cold, bleak and windy in the vicinity of the Hohenberg Castle, near the West German-Czechoslovakian frontier.

One of the four United States soldiers maintaining a lonely Christmas vigil in the 12th century fortification was 25-year-old Gerald Fulkerson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nolan Fulkerson, 4823 45th St., Lubbock, former Matador residents. He is a grandson of Mrs. A. A. Tipton, and nephew of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Fulkerson and Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Meador, all of Matador.

The ancient structure is used today as an observation post, to keep an eye on possible Czech military moves. The castle is situated some 200 yards from the Eger River, which marks the border between the two countries.

5,000-volt Electric Fence
There is no stove in the creaking, wind-buffed tower the four men occupy. In their view is a 5,000-volt electric fence built by the Communists.

And as a somewhat bizarre Christmas activity, the Czechs recently began constructing a second energized fence, at the river's edge.

No Gossip When 20 Women Meet At Roaring Springs Quilting Club

GOSSIP is not tolerated when approximately 20 women meet each week at the Roaring Springs Community Quilting Club. It is an easy club to join and it is not expensive. The only requirements are a chair, a thimble and a covered dish for the luncheon each Tuesday.

The club has been meeting at the Carrol Pierce house in Roaring Springs for five years but it originated about ten years ago in the Teepee Flat Community with Mrs. Walter Gwinn. Meetings were held in the old Murrell house in that community.

The club, which has members from ages 27 to 80, last year quilted more than 50 quilts, 14 of which were given away. The club has a new hostess each week who provides the meat, bread and coffee for the luncheon, but the meetings are held in the same place.

The Carrol Pierce family lived in the house where the meetings are held, then moved to the farm. The house is used for hoe hands in the summer, cotton pickers in the fall and it belongs to the club as soon as it is free for use.

The club will hold its first meeting Tuesday and members are reminded to bring a thimble, a covered dish and chair. The club will meet each Tuesday until school is out.

At the beginning of each season the women pool enough money to buy a tank of butane gas, which will provide heat through the cold months. Mrs. Pierce said this week that she had been informed that five new members would attend Tuesday.

There are no records, no dues and no duties. The women are dedicated to the work they do and they do not gossip. Conversations usually center on church work, welfare needs and Christian service.

As news and events of the past year pass in review, this opportunity is taken to express appreciation for letters received from former residents, and notes included in Christmas cards. As one friend expressed it, if it weren't for notes, the cards could be gotten out on time!

Among the interesting letters received was one from Barbara Ketchersid Tilson of Jacksonville, Florida, which contained a newspaper feature concerning one Al Miller and his wife, who own a riding stable, and the Circle M Family Riding Club, which they sponsor.

"You know how you feel in a large strange city," Barbara wrote. "There is always that search for a good old familiar face in the crowd no matter where you go. Well now, one day I received quite a jolt when I did a double-take and found myself face-to-face with a man and woman completely out of step with this modern city of Jacksonville.

"Sure enough, there was that familiar broad-brimmed hat, Levi jacket and pants, and boots that were too worn to be just for the purpose of 'dressing up like a cowboy'. I never had the nerve to just go up and ask

them where they came from, so I went home wondering.

"As time went by, I saw these same two people again and again so I knew they lived close by. Then one day I took Bob (our oldest son) down to a riding stable to make good a promise I had made as a reward for making an A on his report card, and there they were—I had found my people.

"Al Miller and his wife own the riding stable just down the street from me and I now share the Tribune with him. As we were talking I found that he used to haul freight in wagons before the train came to Matador and surrounding area. He still has relatives out there and would love to come back."

"If there is one club in Jacksonville I would like to join, this is it," Barbara said of the Circle M Riding Club.

"We're a family club," Miller is quoted in the newspaper article. "There are no age restrictions. But families ride in a group and we plan all our activities to stress the family feeling. It's a fine thing for kids to go with their parents on these outings — (moonlight picnics). It's a great way for a family to relax."

Most of the club's 35 members

own their horses. They ride every Friday night in special competition events they call "Frolics." A lighted arena in front of the stables is set up with boxes, barrels and other obstacles for basketweaving, cloverleaf and barrel weaving events.

Miller times each rider with a stop watch. Winner of the night's prize—a western shirt or some authentic western article donated by local merchants—is the rider who wins the most events in the least time.

"It's better than a rodeo," Miller believes. "I don't know who's better at these Frolics, the kids or their parents."

And Barbara concludes her letter on a wistful note:

"I feel much more at home when I think that these people are my neighbors in this new 'foreign' place I must live. That old saying about taking the country out of a person is true — you can take a person away from Texas, but you'll never take Texas out of the person!"

He is serving a three-year tour of duty in Japan and with him are his wife, the former Nancy Rea of Lubbock, and their three children. Dear Friends,

We regret not making Homecoming this year. With the new schedule I would guess that you had your largest turn out. I am enclosing a check for dues but my memory isn't good. Hope the amount is correct.

I am stationed at Yokota Air Base—just a short distance from Tokyo. I am the Armament-Electronics Squadron Commander and it is a very challenging job and one which I enjoy. There are 600 men including 15 officers in the squadron.

The children all go to school—Paul is in the 6th grade, Karen in the 3rd grade, and Susan goes to Kindergarten. We think the schools are good. All of us are enjoying the traveling, exploring, etc. In fact we wonder if we can possibly do it all in three years. Nancy takes Japanese lessons three times per week from a man in Fussa, who teaches English to speak Japanese.

We have been invited to his home for a party (or something) on New Year's Day. We will go, of course. On some of the trips we drive and others we go on train. Next week end we are going to spend the night in Tokyo at the New Japan Hotel—one of the newest. Downtown (and all over I guess) Tokyo has grown so much since I was over here in 1952-53. We have a typical Japanese style hotel in Ome, which serves wonderful Japanese food—completely Japanese style—it is cooked right on the table.

We have been here four months and have driven our car 3000 miles—almost as far as if

we were in the U. S. where roads are better and longer and safer. Driving on the left side isn't bad, it is only when all the other hazards, i. e. people, bicycles, large dump trucks, etc. are thrown in that it becomes unsafe.

Last week end we went up to Mt. Metake. Drove part way, then took cable car and finally a seat lift to the top. The maple trees were beautiful in their many colors. We must go back and take the camera.

We can see Mt. Fuji (Fujiam or Fujiyam) from our bedroom window and it is beautiful with the snow-topped peak.

As you probably know, Mother has been very ill almost since I left and that has been a big worry to us. She is some improved now for which we are very relieved. However, her brother, Clovis Casey, died last Sunday. He is the first of six children to die and all were over 65. Being away from Mother and Daddy is our only regret for being assigned to Japan but I was long over-due for over seas.

I hope the Tribune carries a complete story on Homecoming—who was there, etc. I will enjoy it by reading about it. We get the paper about three weeks late, but regular and enjoy it very, very much.

County Agent's Work Summary

The County Agent is the local representative of the Extension Service, which has state headquarters located at Texas A & M College.

The Extension Service is the educational branch of the USDA, with teaching the job of the workers. This work is accomplished by demonstrations, meetings and news articles, with facts presented so as to allow the people to reach a decision on problems they may have.

County Agents have nothing to do with allotments, payments or compliances, except to present information to the people based on research findings of the Experiment Stations, Federal Research findings, and other actual demonstrations and tests.

County Agent work is in cooperation with the Commissioners Court, and the following work was done by County Agent Bill Pallmeyer in Motley County

from December 1, 1960 to November 30, 1961.

Five hundred farms and homes were visited during the 259 days worked, and 214 demonstrations were given. Pallmeyer drove 17,007 miles during the year, and was out of the county part of 51 days on official business, which included taking 4-H teams to contests, judging livestock shows, and attending meetings to secure information for the people of the county.

Two thousand six hundred and forty-five people called at the office for information, and 2625 phone calls were placed or received. Pallmeyer prepared 209 news stories, and appeared on two radio programs, in addition to distributing 3222 bulletins to the people of the county. There were 3893 letters written, and 30 result demonstrations were presented.

Two hundred and one meetings were held by the County Agent during the year, with 73 for adults and 128 for 4-H club members. Some 3226 people attended the adult meetings, and 7768 attended the 4-H club meetings. Agencies worked with include the ASC, SCS, FHA, Fish & Wildlife Service, REA, Animal Health Commission, Texas Game & Fish Commission, Texas Employment Commission, U. P. Paper Pease SCD, and Vocational Agriculture Departments.

There were 159 days devoted to adult work, and 100 to 4-H club work. Leading items of work were Range Management and forage—39 days; Beef cattle—29 days; Cotton—26 days; Soil and water conservation—24 days; Swine—20 days; Safety—13 days; Small grain—11 days; and Farm machinery and buildings—10 days.

Other items worked with were vegetables, fruits and nuts, flowers and shrubs, insects, sheep, poultry, dairy, wildlife, marketing, public affairs, farm management and program planning.

Programs for the county are developed through local people who serve on the 4-H, livestock and crops committees. Those who are not currently helping plan the county program are invited to offer their suggestions to programs they would like to see carried out in Motley County.

R. L. Dockendorff Promoted By Firm

Dr. R. L. Dockendorff has been promoted to division engineer in the Butyl, Butadiene and Solvents Department of Process Technical Division at Humble Oil & Refining Company's Baytown, Texas, refinery.

He supervises the work of about 60 people, most of them chemical and mechanical engineers, who provide technical guidance to the Butyl Rubber, Polyolefin, and Solvents Plants. Their work includes designing process equipment, assisting the operators in its operation, and recognizing and recommending needed mechanical repairs and replacements.

A state registered professional engineer, Dr. Dockendorff is a member of American Chemical Society and American Institute of Chemical Engineers, and is chairman of the Houston Process Heat Exchanger Society. He holds the B. S. Degree in chemical engineering from Tufts University and the Sc. D.

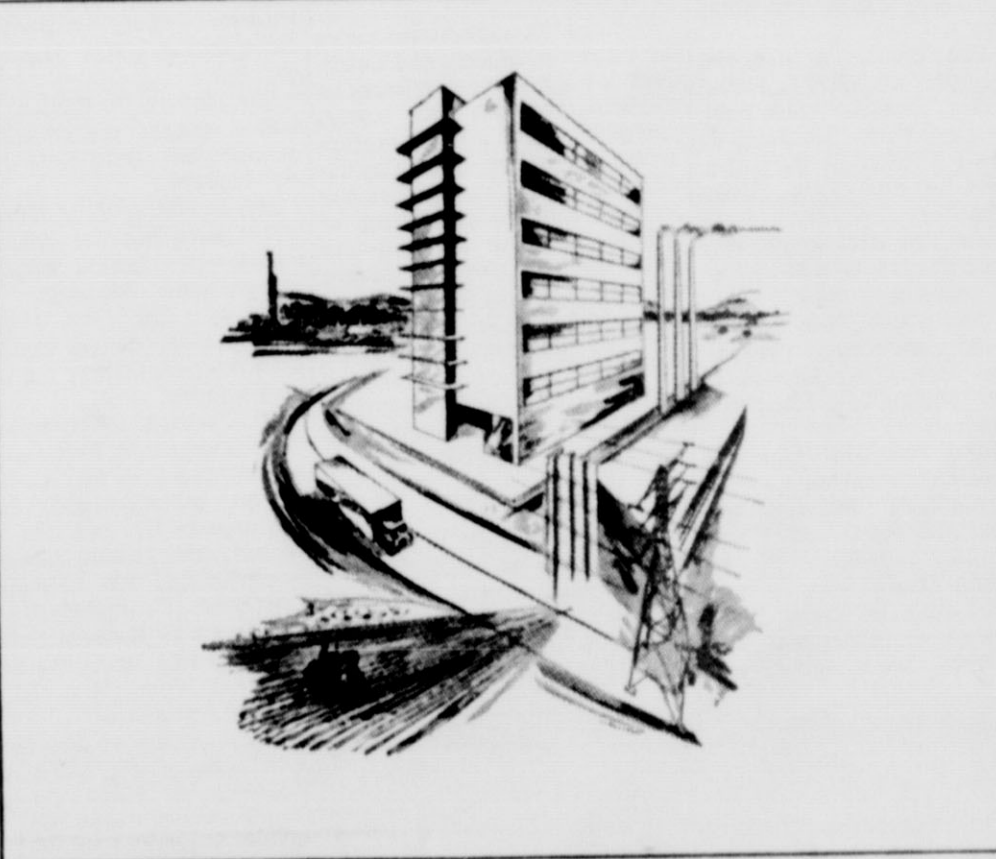

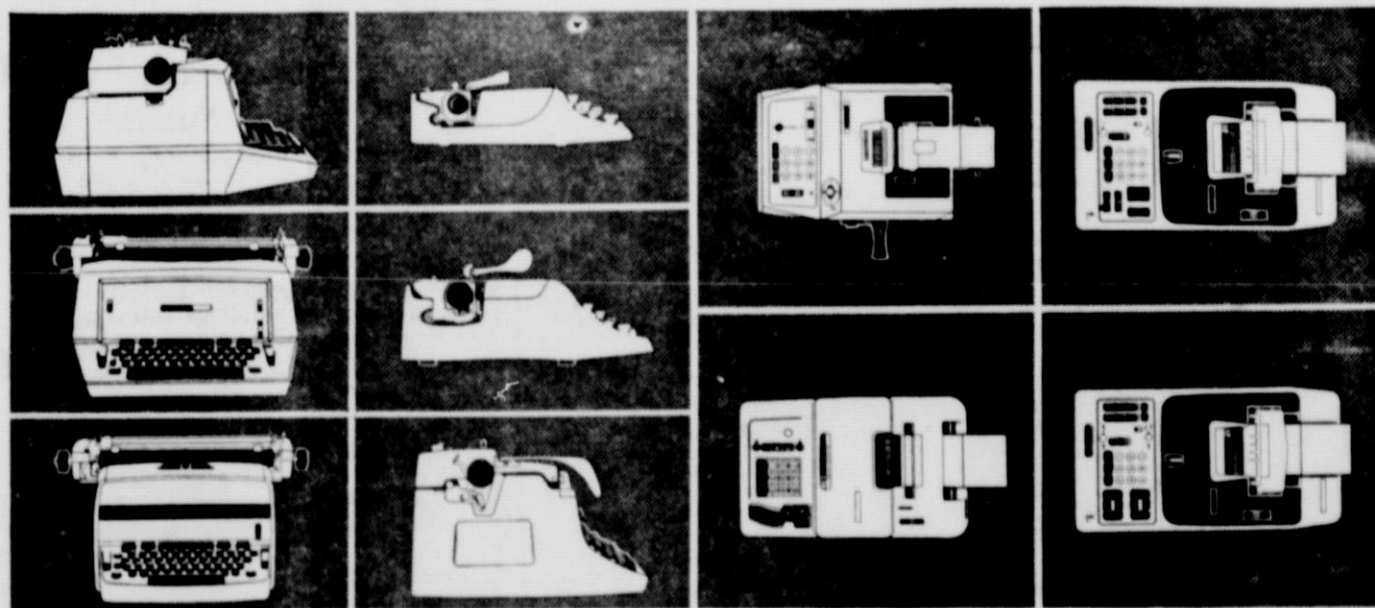

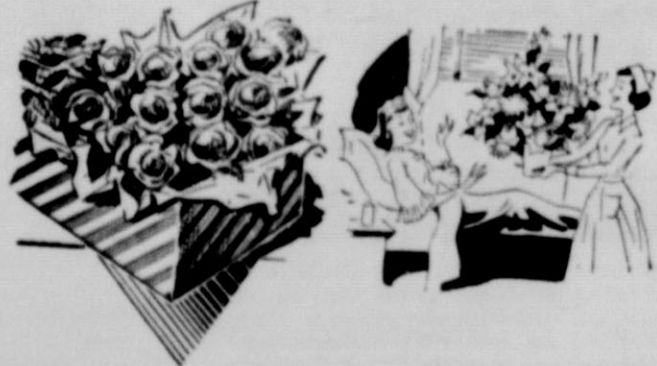
