## New Highway Map Invites Tourists

"Highways To New Horizons" is the slogan of the 1962 Texas Highway Department map of the Lone Star State. It is perhaps one of the most beautiful road maps ever published. It shows in accurate detail the more than 62,000 miles of paved roads in Texas, which include the approximately 21,000 miles of Farm to Market roads under state maintenance.

The map plots 1,828 cities and towns. It also features 12 inserts which are not city maps, but maps showing major routes in the state's dozen largest cities. They are Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Ft. Worth, Houston, Lubbock, San Antonio, Waco and Wichita Falls.

Texas in all its panoramic grandeur is illustrated in 11 full-color photographs of scenes the motorist may view from his car window as he travels on highways "engineered for safety, comfort and pleasure."

On the caricature map the area where Motley County is located is designated as "ranching" and depicts a cowboy on his horse rolling a cigarette.

**EDITORIAL:** At least 20 to 40 million youngsters have never ridden a horse but would like to, if they could ride on a real Western Texas ranch in the old cattle country. People go on vacations to spend money for the things they want to do. They average spending \$25 to \$30 or more per day per car. Nothing is more appealing, more completely sold and more universally enjoyed than the atmosphere of the West: the cowboy. Tourists will gladly spend money for what they want.

## Response To Drive Is Good

Response has been good in the Matador Community Chest fund drive conducted among local business firms, it was announced yesterday by Mrs. Bill Seale, president of the Eternas Study Club. The women's organization is conducting the fund campaign, and has expanded activities to a house-to-house canvass.

Mrs. Seale said: "We have found that the Community Chest is already 'sold' to the business firms of Matador. Contributions have been liberal and made freely throughout the business area. We hope to find the same response in the residential section."

The Community Chest area is the same as the Matador Independent School District. Boy Scout and Girl Scout work, the Salvation Army and other approved organizations are supported by the one solicitation. Largest amount of the collections remain in the local welfare fund, where it is administered to the needy during the coming year.

No Community Chest funds are paid out until the request has been screened by a local committee, serving the organization without pay.

The principal objective of the Chest is to contribute to several worthy organizations through one solicitation, and to screen out requests that might be unscrupulous, or out of line with the charity policy of the community and area.

## Warning Made on Car Registrations

Motor vehicle owners are slow in registering this year and the result is going to be a last-minute rush if the tempo of 1962 tag sales is not increased. Saturday, March 31 is the last day tags may be purchased without penalty.

The warning is sounded by the office of Jinks Wilson, Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector, which reported the number of unregistered vehicles in the county is greater than usual at this time of the year.

It may be impossible to issue new tags in time to prevent inconvenience and possible expense to many owners at the last minute.

The law requires that new tags be on all motor vehicles by Sunday, April 1. No provision is made for exemption because the first falls on Sunday.

## Resident's Uncle Dies in Louisiana

An uncle of local resident Tom Tilson, who was a nationally-known architect died Saturday at his home in Lafayette, La.

He was David R. Williams, 71, a former Dallas architect credited with popularizing the ranch style architecture that swept the country in the 1920's. He died of a heart attack in his sleep.

Mr. Williams was born on a ranch near Childress. He began his architectural training with a correspondence course and became one of the nation's leaders in that field.

As a teen-ager, Mr. Williams worked for a railroad. After being graduated from the University of Texas, he went to Tampico, Mexico, as an engineer for the Gulf Oil Co.

This work called for designing pump stations and laying out entire oil towns. His subsequent career took him all over the world.

During the late 1930's he was chief architect for the Works Progress Administration. As such he helped design buildings at Fair Park.

In 1960 Mr. Williams was elected to Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects. He was a brother of the late T. E. (Ed) Williams, long-time resident of Matador.

Survivors include two brothers, Dan Williams of Washington, D. C., and Dr. Raworth Williams of Dallas; a sister, Mrs. Ophelia Merrick of Childress, and a daughter, Mrs. Richard S. McMahan of New Iberia, La.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Sunday in the Episcopal Church of the Ascension in Lafayette.

## CECIL SIMPSON DIES IN LUBBOCK

Cecil Simpson, 69, widely-known South Plains cowboy and ranch foreman died at 11:50 p. m. Friday in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock. He had made Crosbyton his headquarters at different times from 1913 until last August when he retired there. He had earlier lived in Motley County.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday at First Baptist Church, Crosbyton. Officiating were Rev. Carlton Thompson, pastor of First Methodist Church, assisted by the Baptist pastor, Rev. Otis Terstman.

Burial was in Crosbyton Cemetery under direction of King Funeral Home.

A native of Vernon, Simpson came with his family to Motley County and in subsequent years was associated with many of the early day ranching "spreads."

After moving to Crosby County in 1913, he worked on the Bar-N-Bar, the Z-Bar-L, the Half Circle S and the Bar-X ranch.

Returning to Vernon in 1924, Simpson was employed by the Waggoner ranches until 1942 when he went back to Crosbyton to manage the Crawford ranch for J. S. Bidwell. He was employed by the Brunson 17 ranches in West Texas and New Mexico from 1943 until his retirement last August.

He also spent several years in the oil field business near Wichita Falls and Tyler.

During the years, Mr. Simpson acquired a large collection of pioneer photographs, and a number of these have appeared in "Old Settler" editions of the Matador Tribune through the courtesy of the owner.

Survivors include his wife, a son, Julian Simpson, Midland, a brother, three sisters; and two grandchildren.

## County Growing

Motley is the third-fastest growing county in the state of Texas. This favorable but surprising information comes from Population and Research Center of the University of Texas, and was released over Amarillo Radio Station KGNC and published yesterday in the Amarillo Daily News.

Top county in growth in the state during the period of April 1, 1960 to April 1, 1961, was Randall County, reported with a population increase of seven per cent. Second-fastest growing county is Hartley with 6.6 per cent growth. Motley's rate of increase was reported at five per cent.

Potter County (Amarillo) rate was set at 3.6 per cent with a total estimated population of 119,783, according to the news release.

The Tribune has been unable to determine what authority the report was based upon, since general sources of statistics indicate population in the major communities as about normal.

## Short Course in Electrification Being Scheduled

A short course in adult farm electrification is being scheduled at Roaring Springs for March 19 through 23, if sufficient interest is shown. It was announced this week by Bill Peacock, vo-ag teacher.

The five three-hour classroom and shop sessions will be conducted by Bob Jaska, Farm Electrification specialist with the vocational agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agriculture Engineering at A&M College.

## Tribune Observes 28th Anniversary

Yesterday, March 14, was the Tribune's 28th birthday. Publishing a newspaper every week for 28 years amounts to a total of 1,456 issues. Approximately 20 gallons of read material (one column wide by 3 inches deep) go into each issue for a total of 562,400 column-inches of reading matter in 28 years. Two pages of double-spaced typewritten copy are required for a galley or column of type.

These figures are rough estimates as to the number of columns the Tribune has printed. One edition of the Tribune contained 40 pages, and many have run from 16 to 22 columns. In some of the post-war years the average paper contained eight pages. However, during the war the average size was four pages, except on the Christmas editions.

At one time the Tribune mailed over 600 copies to men in uniform without charge. The circulation was about 1100 at that period. Last week the Tribune's press run was 1606, allowing ample papers for static trouble on the press.

Somewhere during the past 52 issues the Tribune accidentally dropped two years from its total volume number. It should have read "67th Year" since the first Motley County News to which the Tribune is successor, was published in 1894. So the Tribune begins with this issue the correct volume number "68th Year."

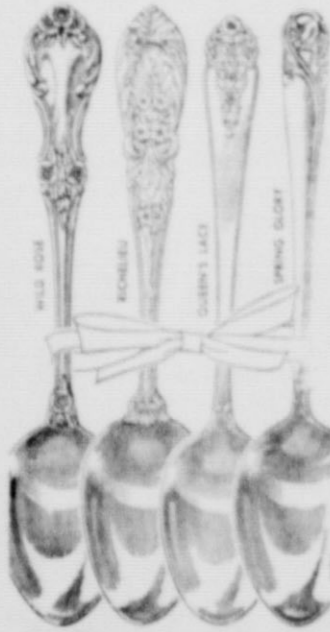

### PIED PINIONS By Mrs. M.

Recent feature article from Washington by David Lawrence is an interesting treatise about a typewriter that has been returned to the White House for exhibition to the public. The machine was once the property of President Woodrow Wilson.

Lawrence had written President Kennedy suggesting that, inasmuch as he was endeavoring to place on exhibition at the White House mementoes of every President, it might be desirable to get the Wilson typewriter from the American Red Cross.

Sold as "surplus property," the typewriter had come into the possession of the late Adm. Cary T. Grayson, President Wilson's physician, who had loaned it to the Red Cross. It was found stored in an attic, and General Gruenther, president of the Red Cross made the formal presentation to President Kennedy in a brief ceremony attended also by Admiral Grayson's sons.

We pause at this point in the story to give it a local angle. The Admiral Grayson who is mentioned was a relative, in fact the half-uncle of Mrs. Virginia Walton Willie and Mrs. Hazel Walton Donovan. The physician was a half-brother of the late Walter A. Walton, father of the ladies, who came to this country as a pioneer from Virginia and was the first County Clerk when Motley County was organized.

Further, the typewriter in question was of a make now extinct—a "Hammond," and Mr. M. steps forth with the assertion that he once owned a similar typewriter of the same make. The machine cost him \$100, plus a fancy, plush-lined case for an additional \$40. After taking it with him on several trips to California, he received \$15 for it in a trade-in transaction for a different make machine from a firm in Wichita Falls.

After coming to Matador in 1928, Mr. M. traded typewriters with R. E. Campbell and acquired the machine which the Tribune still uses for making stencils, having it equipped first with Gothic type for this purpose.

He regrets however, disposing of the old Hammond, for which he says now he wouldn't take \$140. Although excessively heavy, the intricate mechanism made it possible to interchange two type faces, one being script. (We could point out several other occasions when poor judgment was exercised in business transactions; in our opinion that is.)

The man who once most wisely said, "Be sure you're right, then go ahead," might well have added this, to wit: "When you know you're wrong, be sure to quit." (Cheer)

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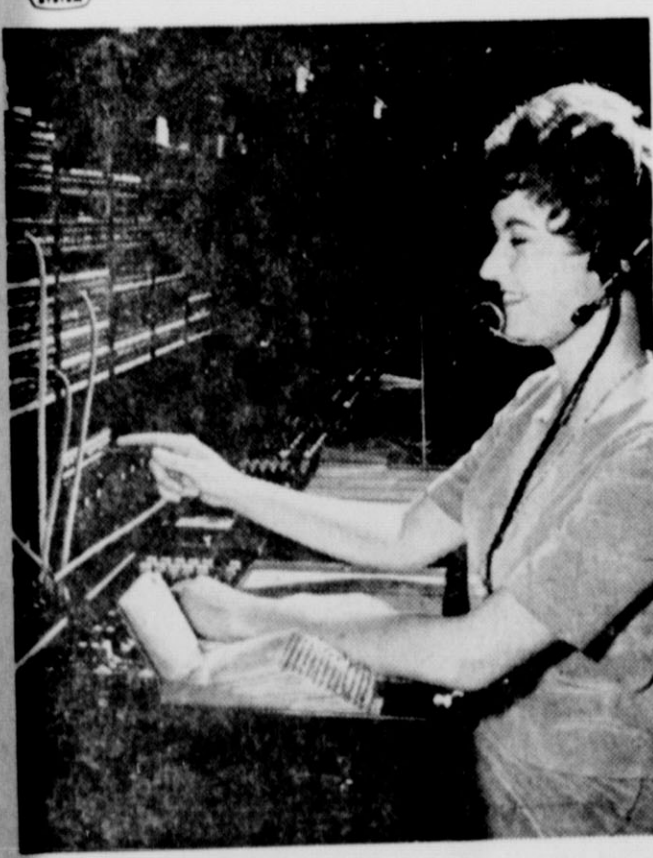

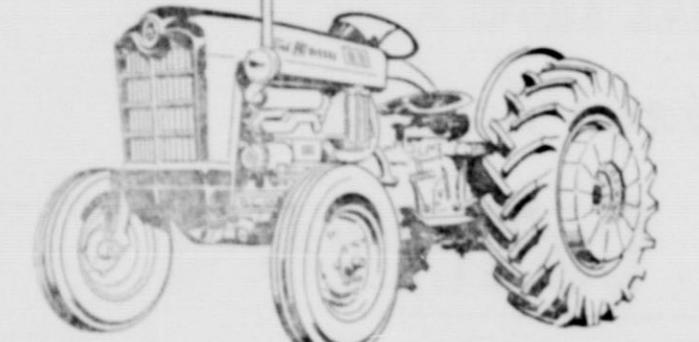

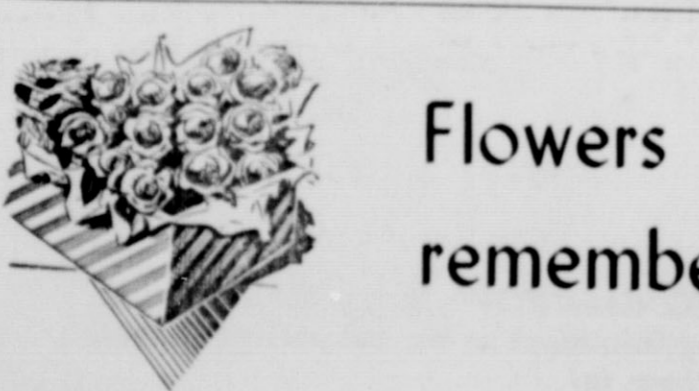
