## Death Claims Man Injured in Wreck

DEATH Saturday claimed a second victim, Thomas Eugene Van Camp, 27, who was in the cab of a loaded grain truck that crashed into the side of a Quannah, Acme & Pacific Railway freight train at Roaring Springs on the afternoon of March 8. The driver of the truck, Walter L. Robinson was killed instantly. The tragedy caused derailment of three units of a four-unit diesel engine, and eight or ten cars to pile up at the intersection of State Highway 70 and the railroad, a few hundred yards from the Roaring Springs school grounds.

Funeral services for Mr. Van Camp were held Monday at Boxwell Brothers Ivy Chapel in Amarillo with Rev. Nolan Rucker of the Sanborn Baptist Church officiating. He died at 6:55 Saturday in Amarillo Veterans Hospital, without ever regaining consciousness after the accident.

He was born July 23, 1931, in Guyton, Okla., and had been a resident of Amarillo since 1942. Surviving are a daughter, two sons, his parents, two brothers and a sister. Burial was in Llano Cemetery.

Suit Is Settled

Following the accident a suit totaling \$214,000 was filed by Mr. Van Camp's family against the railroad company. District Attorney John Stapleton of Floydada, Monday told the Tribune that the suit had been settled out of court on June 5th, for \$17,000. Mr. Stapleton and the law firm of Conner & Walker of Spur, represented the plaintiff.

## Lions Name Date For City Cleanup

MEETING for the first time in the club's new fiscal year, Matador Lions directors Monday morning approved a city-wide cleanup for Tuesday, July 25. Lion Clyde Gilbert is chairman of the drive and announced that the county brush and weed shredder will operate all day. The machine is effective in rapidly cleaning large areas, such as vacant lots, etc. Property owners are asked to carefully remove wire and all metal objects from areas they wish cleaned.

It was one of the first official acts of new President Billy Watson when he suggested the motion to sponsor a city-wide cleanup, which received unanimous sanction of 11 directors. It was pointed out that extended rainfall has produced a lush crop of weeds, brush and grass which provides a haven for mosquitoes, in addition to the unsightly appearance.

An appeal is made to the entire citizenship to join in the campaign to clean up residential property, including alleys, vacant lots and other premises. Trash, rubbish and other materials may be placed in containers in alleys to be hauled away by the city cleanup truck.

After breakfast at Jay's Cafe at 6:30 Monday morning, the directors held their meeting in the 2nd story office of the Willie Oil Company station at the intersection of Highways state 70 and US 70.

The cleanup drive will start at 6 a. m. Tuesday morning with the sounding of the fire alarm as a signal to begin.

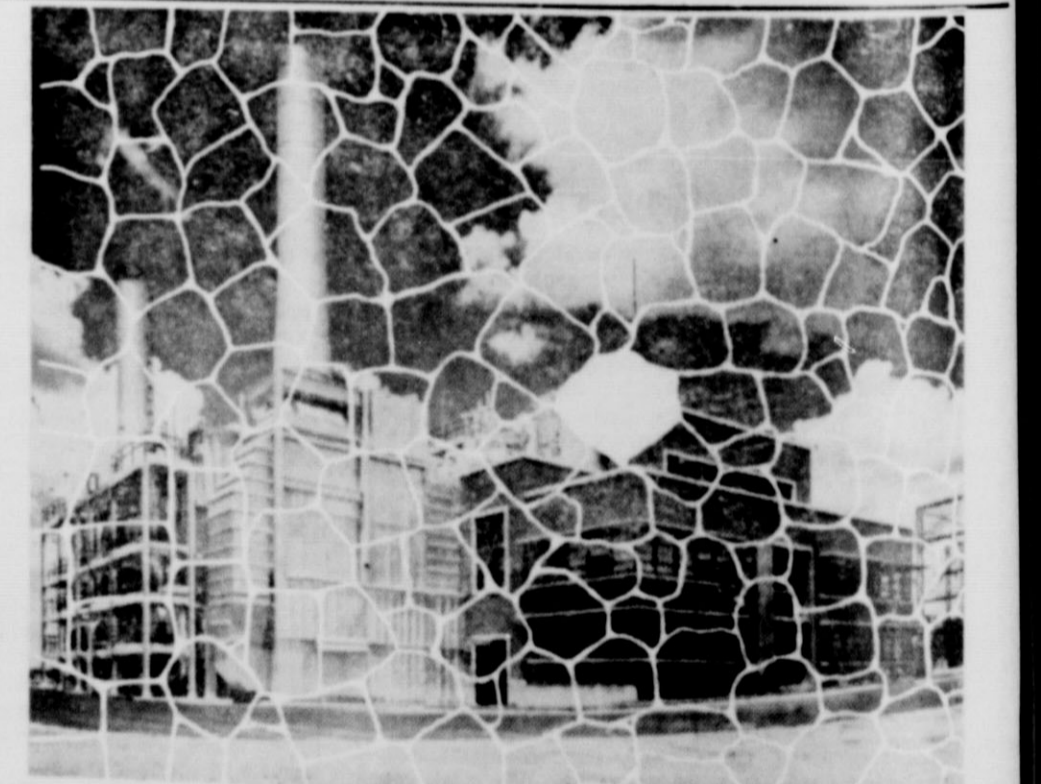

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

**GRASSHOPPER CONTROL**

As grass in pastures becomes dry and tough, grasshoppers start to move into fields in the search of juicier and tender plants. This results in severe damage to cotton fields adjoining pastures where grasshoppers have hatched. When the hoppers first hatch, they can be controlled with a spray of Aldrin, Chlordane or Toxaphene. Aldrin is used at the rate of 2 or 3 lb. ac; Chlordane at 1-1 1/2 lb. ac; and Toxaphene at 1-1 1/2 lbs. ac. Mix with enough water to give complete coverage.

If grasshoppers are already to the flying stage, wet baits are recommended. The following formula is satisfactory 100 lbs.

hulls; 1 lb. toxaphene; 10-12 gallons water. Aldrin may be used in place of toxaphene at the rate of 2 oz.; and chlordane may be used at the rate of 1/2 lb. Enough water should be used to make the mixture moist, but the mixture should not be wet enough for moisture to run from the mix when a handful is squeezed.

For best results, distribute bait in the afternoon, and place where it will be shaded by weeds or plants in the heat of the day. When the baits become dry, new moist baits should be replaced.
