Mrs. Joe Meador Dies at Home Here of Heart Attack

A heart attack a few minutes past midnight Saturday, claimed the life of Mrs. Joe E. Meador, 71, at her home in Northwest Matador. She had resided here for about seven years.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. at the Church of Christ, Minister Leonard Dennis of Edmonson, Texas, former pastor here, officiated. The body was taken to Clovis, N. M. for graveside rites and burial. Eudy-Seale Funeral home of Matador directed arrangements.

Mrs. Meador was born Lillie Mae Tice, May 2, 1891 at Tokio, Arkansas. She was married August 31, 1908 to W. H. Ward, in the Indian Territory of Oklahoma. He died in 1945 at Clovis.

Several years after her husband's death Mrs. Ward came to Matador, and on March 24, 1955 she was married to Motley County pioneer Joe E. Meador in a ceremony performed at Childress. She died November 25, 1962 at the age of 71 years, 6 months and 23 days.

At the time of his wife's death, Mr. Meador was a patient in Stanley Hospital, where he is still recuperating from pneumonia. Mrs. Meador collapsed following a "wrong number" telephone call. With her at the time were Mr. Meador's son and one of his daughters, who had been at his bedside. Mrs. Meador had had a heart condition and other ailments for several years.

She is survived by her husband, two daughters, Mrs. J. T. Purner, Heber, California and Mrs. Jimmie Stewart of Spur, four sons, Burton Ward, Rushville, Nebraska, W. A. Ward, Clovis, Grady Ward, Foss, Oklahoma, and Truman Ward, Albuquerque, N. M., 20 grandchildren, three great-grandchildren; one brother, John Tice of Louisiana; four step-daughters, Mrs. Ted Woolery and Mrs. G. N. Wilson of Abilene, Mrs. Marlin Pounds of Donie, Texas, Mrs. James Bryant of California; and one step-son, Joe B. Meador of Vernon.

Serving as pallbearers in services here were nephews, Joe Meador of Paducah and Charlie Meador, James Meador, Douglas Meador, Wesley Hall and Jim Ratcliff all of Matador.

Tom Tilson, Well Known Entertainer Dies Thursday after Short Illness

A man who helped put Motley County "on the map" through his feats of magic is dead.

He is Thomas G. Tilson, 68, who died Thursday night in the Wichita Falls Hospital where he had been a patient for only a week. Although he was born in Childress, he had lived in Motley County all his life with the exception of about two years.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the First Methodist Church. Rev. J. R. Williams, pastor of the Whiteflat Methodist Church, officiated. He was assisted by the Matador pastor, Rev. Roy Patterson and retired Methodist minister Rev. W. B. Vaughn of Matador.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral home. Pallbearers were Henry L. Martin, Clifford Martin, Bennie Keltz, Preston Spray, Stuart Dixon and Levi Wilkinson.

Mr. Tilson was a member of the Methodist Church, the Matador Lions Club, and the Texas Magician's Association.

Narrow Escape in Truck, Car and Bus Highway Accident

A New Mexico couple driving a 1960 Chevrolet had a narrow escape from serious injuries or death when they attempted to pass an eastbound truck on US Highway 70 about 9:45 yesterday morning seven miles west of Matador.

At the time of the accident fog filled the valleys in the Foothills and hampered visibility. Seeing the approaching bus the driver attempted to brake his car and get behind the truck. The brakes caused his car to spin into the path of the west-bound TNM&O bus running 30 minutes behind schedule.

The bus struck the car causing extensive damage but neither of the passengers received injuries requiring medical treatment. The bus was driven by J. D. Hodges of Lubbock. Only the driver and two passengers were aboard the bus.

Programs Are Popular

It has been said of Tom Tilson that he not only struggled up the ladder of success — he built the ladder.

He started performing magical tricks locally, in 1950. His fame grew and by 1954 he began receiving bookings to perform before civic groups in towns over the South Plains and Panhandle areas. Among his early audiences were a Texas Tech Museum group, and a Great Plains Life Insurance Company party at the Lubbock County Club. He staged a show at the Amarillo Air Base, the Farm Bureau and other public functions.

As his reputation as a prestidigitator grew and demanded more of his time, he retired from farming and "went on the road" accompanied by his wife, who assisted him with his show. They staged their show in schools all over the state from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande Valley, and to the west, into New Mexico.

They received acclaim for performances before the Magician's Association in Dallas. A number of the programs for schools were repeat (by popular request) performances. They have put on as many as four performances in a single day.

Born at Childress

Thomas Granville Tilson was born August 28, 1894 at Childress, Texas although his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Tilson were at the time living in the Whiteflat community. Mr. Tilson came here from Virginia (Continued on back page)

Early in the 4th period Gary Lancaster intercepted a Mustangs pass on his own 40 yd. line. The Matadors moved to the one where Lancaster plunged over for the score. Lancaster also ran the extras.

Outstanding on the Matadors squad were Lancaster, Lloyd Martin, Kenny Barton, Mike Barton, Richard Campbell and Kenneth Pitts. Outstanding on the Mustang team were Dunk Porter, Don Bucks, and Charles Willard.

Most of Matador's population went to Clarendon Thanksgiving Day to witness the bi-district game. Several times during the day not a single automobile was visible on Main Street.

HOOUNDS OF KNOX CITY

The Greyhounds of Knox City present one of the outstanding teams of this area. The 'Hounds defeated Matador three years ago in bi-district, 20-19. Matador's line will enter the game with substantial weight advantage.

Retires Bond Issue
The Board retired the last of the 1936 bond issue on November 12, four years ahead of schedule. This was done in order to save on the amount of interest paid. A study is underway by the Board of Education to see if the 1955 bond issue can be retired at an accelerated rate. If this is possible, a considerable amount of interest can be saved, it was pointed out.

FLOMOT SCHOOL HAS ENROLLMENT INCREASE

Flomot Independent School District shows an increase in enrollment for the current year as compared with that of 1961-62, according to figures released recently by school officials.

Total enrollment for 1961-62 was 97 with only 76 in membership when school ended in May. Thus far this year 129 have enrolled, with 112 in membership. On the day this count was made, 109 of the 112 in membership were present.

Largest increase has been in the lower grades with Mrs. Leslie Pope's grade having the most. Of the twenty second graders, nineteen are present almost every day. Since the beginning of school, five new high school students have registered.

An average daily attendance of 84 would mean that Flomot would qualify for several thousand dollars more state money.

The magic number would be a considerable increase over the 72 of the previous year, said school authorities.

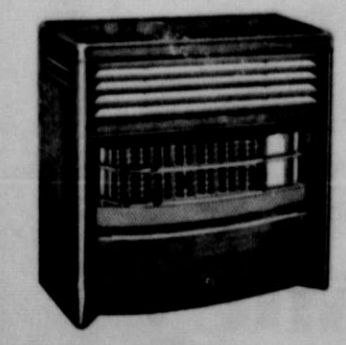
