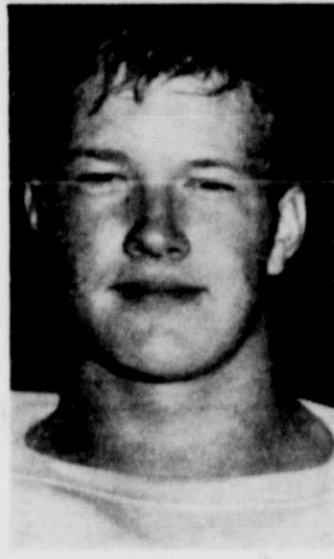

Vanquish Knox City Greyhounds 19-14



TOP SCORER Gary Lancaster won the area scoring title for the 1962 season when he accumulated 150 points in leading the C I a s B Matadors to an undefeated season and a bi-district championship. He outscored top players in Class A, AA, and AAA. He beat out Jerry Frazier of Bovina for both the overall scoring crown as well as the Class B title. Frazier was second with 124 points. Gary is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Lancaster.

KNOX CITY watched a 14 points lead go down the drain, and with it the regional title, before the ground thrust of the Matador Matadors who won their fifth region 11-B crown in 9 years, 1914.

A punt by the Greyhounds' Eddie Williams, blocked by Richard Campbell with only 26 seconds left in the third quarter, was recovered by Matador tackle Pete Davis in the end zone for the winning touchdown.

Knox City was backed up to its two-yard line at the time, after halfback Joe Reyes had blunted a 76-yard march by the Matadors with a pass interception on his 1. Williams, who scored Knox City's first touchdown on a 13-yard burst over guard, was punting in his end zone on third down.

The loss gave the Greyhounds a final season record of 9-3, while Matador finished with an undefeated 11-0-1 record, its only blemish being a 14-14 tie with Rochester.

A 78-yard touchdown drive and a 53-yard scoring pass, with tackle Freddie Smith kicking both extra points, gave the Greyhounds their 14-0 lead, which was narrowed to 14-7 at the halftime by Matador.

Second Touchdown
The Matadors' second TD came 13 plays following the second half kickoff, which the go-ahead touchdown followed six minutes later.

Knox City failed to move on its first possession of the game, punting to the Matadors who drove from the Greyhound 42 to the 25 before a 15-yard penalty caused the effort to falter. Matador quarterback Gary Lancaster's pass on the next play was intercepted by Williams on his 22.

Two passes mixed with short yardage, used 13 plays on the 78-yard scoring drive. Quarterback Brack Shaver connected with end Ken Cornett for the 31, while Williams passed 11 yards to Reyes on the Matador 18.

Three plays later Williams sped over guard without a hand touching him for 13 yards and a 6-0 lead. Smith converted, making it 7-0.

Early in the second quarter, Shaver, from his 47, threw a looping pass to Reyes on the 15 where the halfback juggled it momentarily before scoring. Smith again converted for a 14-0 margin with 8:18 left in the first half.

Matador took the kickoff, and utilizing a 27-yard by Lancaster and a 13-yard run by fullback Kenny Barton, scored with 4:17 remaining in the half. Lancaster's conversion pass was incomplete.

Team Revitalized
The Matadors, who had scored 411 points before entering the game — second only to Denver City on the South Plains — began the second half as a team revitalized.

Halfback Mike Barton returned the kickoff to his 46. Lancaster then guided the Matadors 54 yards as they ground out the 13 plays, never gaining more than seven yards at a time.

Lancaster slid over right tackle from the three, but a pitchout to halfback Lloyd Martin for the two points following.

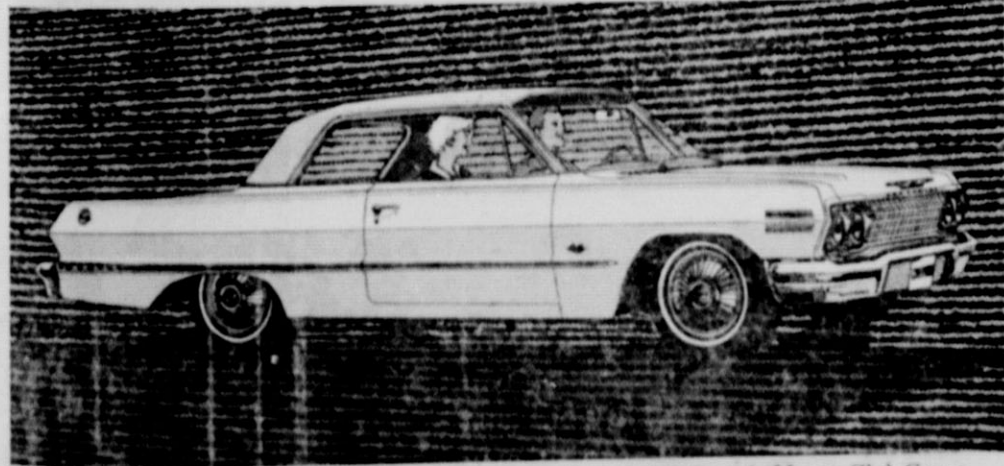

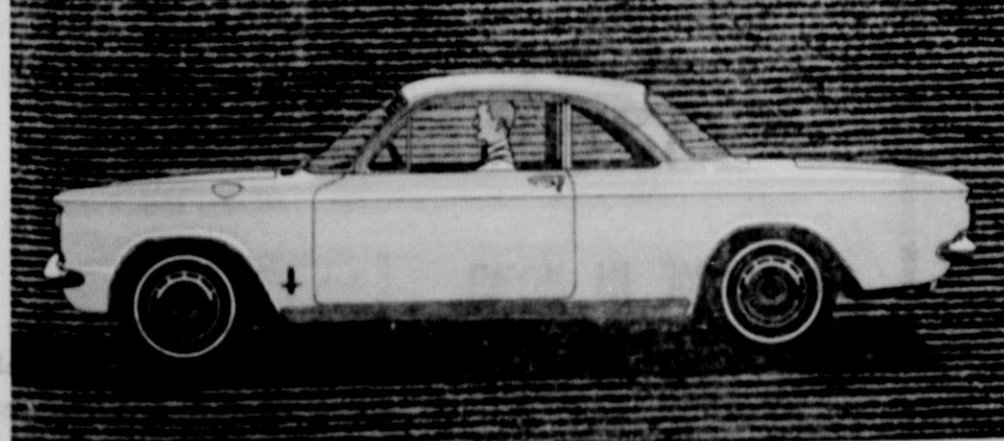

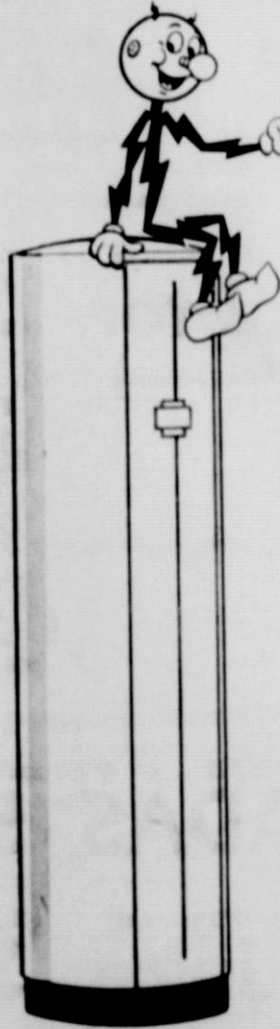

Three plays later, the fatal blocked punt followed, with the 230-pound Davis recovering, Kenny Barton kicked the point, making it 19-14.

The Greyhounds sped to the Matador 11 midway in the final quarter, mainly on a 29-yard run by Williams. A five-yard penalty for delay of the game, and eight-yard loss by Williams, and a fumble by Shavor recovered by Matador on the 30, halted Knox City's final threat of the game.

With less than two minutes left, Williams broke loose for 30 yards to Matador's 42, but an off-side penalty nullified the play.

Williams was the game's leading rusher with 139 yards on 21 carries, while Lancaster led Matador — and was close behind Williams — with 144 yards on 28 tries.
