Farm Group Plans Re-Organization

A complete re-organization of the Farmers Union was launched at a meeting held Tuesday night in the District Court room. Richard Alexander, field representative for the organization, served as chairman.

Buck Marshall of Roaring Springs was elected temporary chairman and Duke Lipscomb of Matador was elected temporary secretary. Marshall will name a membership chairman in each community.

A meeting date has been set for Monday night, January 30, at 7 p.m. to set up the permanent organization. The meeting will be held here in the District Court room.

Only a small group attended the re-organization meeting. Ike Reed of the Gasoline community in the northwest corner of the county, said:

"The Farmers Union needs everybody and everybody needs the Farmers Union, the way I see it."

He gave Farmers Union credit for the support price on cotton during the past eight years, and criticized another farm organization, the Farm Bureau. He said the Bureau has been using the farmers' money to suppress the price of cotton.

To Sell Insurance

The Farmers Union now sells group plan Blue Cross hospital insurance and the sale of insurance was deemed an important factor to increase membership.

Mrs. Donald Wooten of Crosbyton, Crosby County Blue Cross service agent explained the policy, declaring that the minimum number of new applicants would be 50. She advised, however, that a goal of 65 be set, so that after deducting the transfers and rejections, at least 50 would be qualified.

In a transaction completed last week Dean's Food of Roaring Springs has become a member of South Plains Associated Grocers, enabling the firm to buy food products on equal with the largest food chains in the nation.

Dean McInroe, manager of the store said he would now be able to offer two new brands "Shurfine" and "Shurfresh" food products, packed especially for the AG organization.

The SPAG organization is constructing the largest warehouse in Lubbock from which to serve the more than 130 independent grocers who are in the South Plains association.

Further announcement by Dean's Food is double S&H Green Stamps on all purchases over \$2.50 each Wednesday. The double Wednesday green stamp offer is effective immediately.

Greenville Rites Held For Mother Of Matador Residents

Funeral services were held Friday at Greenville for Mrs. Lucy Stafford, 92, mother of Matador residents Frank Stafford and Mrs. E. S. Jones.

Mrs. Stafford, who had been making her home with another daughter, Mrs. Carroll Evans of Floyd, near Caddo Mills, died Wednesday, January 11.

Survivors include two other daughters, Mrs. Marvin Lawrence, Amarillo, and Mrs. Bill Watson, Gainesville; and two other sons, John Stafford of Texarkana, and Virgie Stafford of California. A number of grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Stafford had been a resident of the Greenville area since coming to Texas as a small girl with her parents in a covered wagon, from Missouri, where she was born.

Stock Show Change Being Considered

A CHANGE in the set up of the annual Motley County Stock Show is being considered. At present the exhibit is operated from funds obtained by public subscription through the sponsorship of Matador,

Roaring Springs and Flomot Lions Clubs.

The immediate problem is obtaining sufficient prize money to provide an attractive inducement to the boys and girls to produce calves and swine for exhibition.

The problem was discussed Monday morning at the Lions Club directors breakfast held in the Matador Cafe. A survey of other counties which have faced the same problem points to only one solution.

That is the forming of an association, and the selling of annual membership with everyone having a part in the show sponsorship. It was suggested that two different memberships be issued; one to business firms and another to individuals.

Boss Lion L. M. Cox has called a meeting for next week, seeking to bring representatives of the three Lions Clubs together to discuss the problem on a county-wide basis.

It was announced that the association membership plan had been used in other communities with a renewal of interest and able funds to make the production of fine livestock attractive to boys and girls participating.

Texas Receives Top Share MOD Funds

ANNUAL fund drive for the National Foundation's March of Dimes was launched in Matador last week (Tuesday night) with a signal from the city fire alarm, and continued until the residential area had been canvassed.

County Judge Elbert Reeves, 1961 County Fund Chairman, said he was encouraged with the interest being shown in the various communities. A number of communities have announced programs in connection with the drive.

Following is a release by the National Foundation to define the extent of Texas' participation in the MOD program since its beginning:

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 9—Texas has been the principal beneficiary in the allocation of March of Dimes funds raised in the state over the past 23 years, it was disclosed today in a financial summary prepared by The National Foundation.

More than 84 cents of every dollar from Texas' March of Dimes has been put to use in aiding the state's disease victims and in research and education projects conducted by Texas institutions. Of the remaining 16 per cent accruing to the national headquarters, a large portion also has come back to Texas in shipments of polio vaccine and gamma globulin and in other nationwide services by The National Foundation.

The summary covers the period since the first March of Dimes was held in January, 1938, and compares the net total of funds raised in the state with amounts made available to Texas through September 30, 1960.

Low Raising Cost
In this period, Texas chapters of the March of Dimes organization raised a net total of \$28,255,310.30 at an average fund-raising cost of less than 7 per cent. Of this amount, \$20,878,742.57 has been available to the county chapters in carrying out their extensive patient aid programs, including advances of \$8,592,351.71 from the national office to meet local emergency situations.

In addition, 65 grants totaling \$2,946,584.11 have been made in support of research and professional education projects at Texas institutions. Principal beneficiaries of these grants have been: Baylor University, \$1,748,928.28; Jefferson Davis Hospital, \$654,797.54; University of Texas, \$332,781.57 and the Texas Institute for Rehabilitation & Research, \$162,179.85.

The latter institution also has benefited to the extent of \$1,514,672.42 from those grants made to Baylor University and Jefferson Davis Hospital.

\$300 Million Vaccine
Over and above the 84 per cent used by institutions and county chapters in the state, The National Foundation has financed within the state projects such as the historic field trials which proved the effectiveness of the Salk vaccine, epidemiological studies and scholarship and fellowship grants to Texas residents. National headquarters' expenditures for the vaccine trials in Texas amounted to \$359,726.07. In addition, the national office has sent into Texas \$291,718.84 worth of Salk vaccine and 654,924 cc's of gamma globulin in support of its polio prevention programs.

Two years ago, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis changed its name to The National Foundation in expanding its areas of interest beyond polio to include birth defects and arthritis, using the scientific

knowledge and experience gained in the fight against polio. The New March of Dimes takes place throughout the month of January.

Soil Tests Show Increase at Area Lab in Seymour

The Baylor County Soil Testing Lab located in Seymour has just completed its biggest year since opening in January, 1956 according to Roy L. McClung, Baylor County Agent who supervises the lab and makes the recommendations after the tests are made.

The agent stated the lab analyzed 922 samples in the past year from Sept. 1, 1959 to August 31, 1960.

Many Motley County farmers have had their soil tested the past several years, and 59 had tests made during the past year, said Bill Palmeyer, Motley County Agent.

"You cannot assume that your soil is the same as your neighbors," Palmeyer points out. "Every field is different and should be tested separately. Many fields differ from one side or one end of the field to the other."

Anyone interested in having soil tests made are asked to contact the county agent, who will supply soil sample bags. The fee for this service is \$2.00. Palmeyer also stated that he would like to have a number of farmers try some fertilizer plots this year.

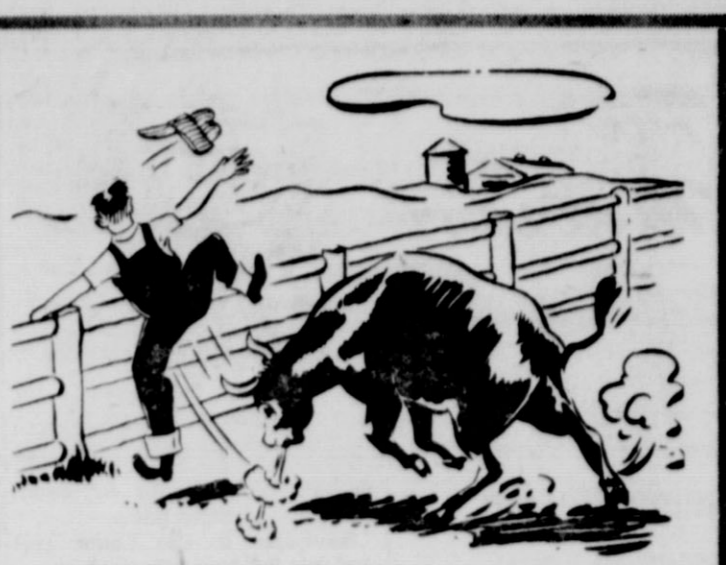
