Gene Linn Named On Radio Staff

Account of Fifty-mile Mountain Hike In New Mexico Told by Matador Scouts

An account of the hiking trip was recorded by the eight boys, who made the 58-mile trek over mountain passes during the Matador Scout Troop's recent encampment at Tres Ritos, N. M., and according to Ronnie Cox, "when we were on top we could have had a snowball fight, but we were too cold... the next day we walked to the top of another divide and saw two herds of elk. The third day was pretty easy walking."

Jesse Urias also wrote of seeing the two elk herds, and described some mountain goats, two dogs, a marmot and some squirrels. "On the second divide we walked along the ridge. It was right after a rain and we could look down on the clouds. We could see far off. It was beautiful scenery."

Gary Markham described Jicrito Divide as being "about 12,000 feet high... we went higher than the snow and it was cold. The rain got us all wet and we stayed that way the rest of the trip. The next day was the hardest one—12 hours on the trail... the last day was an easy little trek down to Santa Barbara, disregarding one little incident. And that just about sums it up."

A little more in detail is Don Seigler's account of the hike:

"We took the bus to the Angus Toro Camp grounds and started on foot from there. Each person had to carry their pack, what clothes they wore, and our share of food. We followed a government blazed trail. There were new trails and mountains that none of us had ever seen before."

"About a mile down the trail the first day we helped an old man get his jeep unstuck from the mud. He was a very nice man and he went with us down to the stream that he was planning to go fishing in. He wished us luck and when he left, we did not see a person other than the ones in the troop until late Wednesday evening."

Two Turn Back

"About 5 miles down the trail Max Barton and Charles Meador decided they could not make it and turned back. They left their food with us, and we divided it up."

"It started raining about noon and about that time we started getting into the higher altitude. We left the aspen country and got into the Douglas fir area. When we got to the divide, it was freezing and still raining and sleeting. We crossed the divide and started heading down the hill to the Santa Barbara cabin, a mountain ranger station. We built a lean-to and slept under it that night."
