Northfield Robbery Suspects Captured

ALERT STOREKEEPER Leland Timmons of Northfield was suspicious of two strangers Thursday afternoon who seemed to take more than usual interest in the store and post office. Mrs. Timmons is postmistress at Northfield. Mr. Timmons wrote down the license number of the car the strangers were driving and made mental notes of their descriptions after they purchased some food items.

That night he even placed the key in the soda vending machine just in case the strangers returned. They did. They entered the building by prying some bars off a window. They broke open the drink machine, took about \$20 from the post office and approximately \$25 from the store (including the vending machine).

A. W. Piarmiller, post office inspector from Amarillo, was here on routine check when Sheriff Jinks Wilson's office was notified Friday morning. He was notified and went to Northfield to inspect the robbery scene. After obtaining the license number of the automobile driven by the suspects, he wired Fort Worth, since the car bore a Tarrant County license plate. Thomas Ray West, 21 (released from prison one month) and Robert David Lavender, 19, were arrested about noon Friday. Sheriff Wilson's office said they had pleaded guilty to robbing the Northfield store and post office. They also admitted robbing another small post office and store near Wichita Falls. On the same night they entered the Northfield store they had previously entered Phillips 66 station and a grocery in Turkey.

Bank Announces Capital Increase

IMPROVED ECONOMY of Motley County is further evidenced this week in announcement by John L. Barnhill, vice-president of the First State Bank, that the pioneer financial institution's capital structure is being increased to \$200,000. The capital is being increased from \$75,000 to \$100,000 and surplus is being increased the same amount.

Decision to increase the capital was made by directors about the first of the year, but the announcement was delayed until Monday, pending approval of the Texas Department of Banking.

It was with reluctance that the bank accepted Mr. Simpson's resignation, made necessary by failing health. He is well known in West Texas as one of the remaining pioneers of the county.

R. L. PRITCHETT RITES SET TODAY

A heart attack about noon Tuesday claimed the life of R. L. Pritchett, 84, of 2633 Parkway Drive, Lubbock, retired farmer and Motley County pioneer.

He suffered the attack at the farm of his nephew, J. W. Pritchett in the Barton community about 23 miles north of Matador, and died shortly afterwards in Stanley Hospital, Matador.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. today at the Whiteflat Baptist Church. Rev. H. T. Harris of Childress, retired former pastor of the church, will officiate. Masonic graveside rites and burial will be in the Whiteflat Cemetery. Eudy-Seale Funeral Home, Matador is in charge of arrangements. Pallbearers will be members of the Masonic order.

Robert Lee Pritchett was born February 22, 1878 in Alabama and lived for a short time in New Mexico before coming to Motley County in 1907. He was married at Whiteflat, April 5, 1914 to Miss Allie Truett and they continued to make their home on their farm in the White Star community about 18 miles northwest of Matador until moving to Lubbock about two years ago. He was a member of the Whiteflat Baptist Church and of Matador Masonic Lodge.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. R. L. Pritchett of Lubbock; three sons, Robert, Lovington, N. M., Will, a missionary in Costa Rica, and Truett Pritchett of Amarillo; one daughter, Mrs. Gene Pepper of 2613 E. Bates, Lubbock; one brother, Gordon Pritchett, Odessa; one sister, Mrs. Nannie Hill, Lubbock; and 14 grandchildren.

WHEN THE CHIPS were down the public rallied to Motley County's Annual Livestock Show Saturday. They came, they saw and they bought. The 36 (FFA and 4-H) exhibitors received a total of \$1,386.18 in prizes and bonus purchase prices for their livestock. The total actual sale of the ten steers, two heifers, 16 fat lambs and 35 hogs amounted to \$3,542.88. Thus the exhibitors claimed a total of \$4,929.06 when the day was over.

Grand Champion steer (from the Curtis Martin Ranch) was shown by Ronnie Cox and purchased by the First State Bank here for 32c. The Hereford champion weighed 962 pounds. Reserve Champion Hereford steer was shown by Dannie Brandon of Roaring Springs, weighed 886 pounds and was purchased by Memphis Production Credit Association for 32 1/2c. The steer was bred by F. E. (Banty) Brandon. Judging was by Bill Gregory, Spur Voag teacher.

Stock Show Gets Confidence Vote

Things aren't always as they seem. This is the seasoned opinion of County Agent Bill Pallmeyer who last week wondered if the Motley County Livestock Show was singing the swan song.

The future did not look too bright when only two directors showed up at a meeting called to plan the show. A series of incidents were responsible for the gloomy condition. Several directors in the Motley County Livestock Association did not receive notice of the meeting until after it was over.

Money contributions had been reported but a list of contributors had not been submitted. Workers started immediately and the response was enthusiastic. Everyone wanted the show to continue and offered contributions and services.

Conflicting activities on the night of the scheduled meeting also accounted for a number of absences.

The vote taken at the show Saturday afternoon was overwhelmingly in favor of its continuing. About 56 to 4 at the first count. It was truly a vote of confidence.

After the show the Motley County Farm Bureau contributed \$5 to each beef contributor, \$2 to each lamb exhibitor and \$2 to each hog exhibitor.

West Texas Gin presented an additional \$3 for 1st place animals in each class and \$2 for 2nd place animals in each class for a total of \$48.

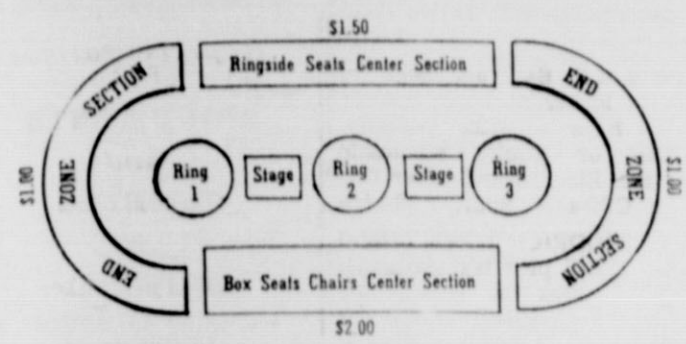

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




