The Tribune has been unable to determine the extent of the sudden interest in the area

"Gemini" (Twins):** Two arrangements in identical containers, using the same types flowers, colors, foliage and accessories.

Class 4. "Scorpio" (scorpion): A composition using driftwood, flowers, dried or fresh materials, accessories permitted. **Class 5. "Taurus" (bull):** A symmetrical arrangement using red flowers and/or additional foliage; accessories permitted.

Class 6. "Libra" (scales): Arrangement in or using scales as accessory. **Class 7. "Venus" (love or sweetheart):** Line arrangement of roses with own or additional foliage, using crystal container. **Class 8. "Lunar" (moon):** Crescent arrangement in silver container. **Class 9. "Comet":** Hogarth curve arrangement in a suitable container.

Class 10. "Rocket": A verticle arrangement using iris and/or additional fresh foliage, accessories permitted. **Class 11. "Heavenly Blue":** A horizontal arrangement using blue flowers, featuring iris (other blue flowers may be used as accent) fresh foliage, accessories permitted.

A Junior Division of the show will have for its theme, "Starlight, Star-bright," in the following classifications:

Class 1. "Meteors": Circular arrangement using pot-pie container.

Class 2. "Star Dust": Mass arrangement using yellow flowers. All arrangements will be made by members of the Matador Garden Club and Tender Buds Junior Garden Club.

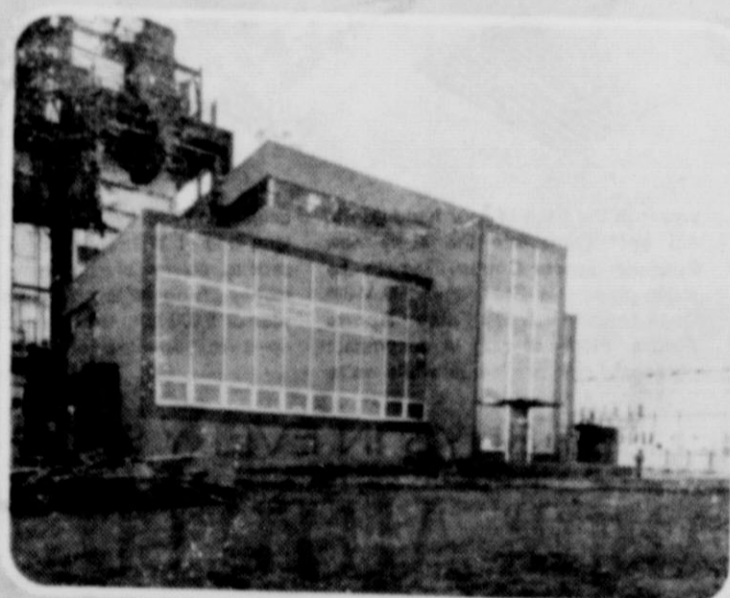

over the second place winners of the meet. This was 54 points in literary events and 55 points in field and track.


