Swine Awarded to Six 4-H Members

Winners of registered Poland china gilts in the Sears Swine program for the current year were announced this week by County Agent, Bill Pallmeyer. They are Mike Peacock and Maurice Clifton, Roaring Springs; Donnie Cruse and Barbara Moselle, Flomot; and Judy Mitchell, Whiteflat. Pat Cooper, Matador, was awarded the boar.

Winners were selected from 12 contestants who wrote letters stating their reasons for wanting a pig for a 4-H project.

The five gilts are shown in the fall to determine the county winner, which will be shown in the store area at Lubbock, along with the boar. Prizes are provided by the Sears Foundation.

Gilts are bred to farrow February or March litters, so that a choice registered gilt may be selected for distribution to another group of winners in the spring of 1963. All other pigs and the sow remain the property of the winners listed above.

Until the current year, eight gilts were distributed each year. This program has helped to improve the swine program in the county, as well as enable members to secure demonstrations.

Volunteers Douse Fast Moving Fire

A fast-moving fire that started last Wednesday in a field of dry sorghum alnum grass on the Lawrence farms east of Matador, was brought under control by volunteers and the services of two fire departments. It was estimated that approximately 200 acres of prairie grass and dried field crops were destroyed.

Motley County fire fighting equipment and one unit of the City of Matador equipment fought the blaze. For a time it was feared that the fire might get completely out of control and the Paducah Fire Department was called. Two jeeps equipped for fighting prairie fires responded, but the fire was under control when they arrived, according to Fire Chief Pete Williams.

Many volunteer individuals also aided in bringing the fire under control. Only light wind out of the northeast is also declared to have favored keeping the loss to a minimum.

Census Shows High Economy In County

ALL the people in Motley County could have a bath the same day in the county's 809 bath tubs (or showers) assuming the county's population is in the neighborhood of 3,000.

The bathtubs were counted in 1960 during the census taking and just released by the United States Department of Commerce. At the time the county had 1,324 housing units and of these 636 were in sound condition with all plumbing. Of this number 947 were occupied and 624 were occupied by owners. The median value of the owner-occupied homes was \$5,600. In 1960 the county had 323 homes occupied by renters.

One of the most interesting bits of data in the release was omitted. The census department did not find out (or release) the number of homes that have air conditioning.

It did say, however, that 762 had hot and cold running water, 801 had flush toilets and 809 were equipped with bathtub or shower. Of the 1,324 homes in the county, 55 had basements. Twelve of the total were trailer homes.

TV is popular in Motley County with 527 sets, but radio was out in front with 903 homes equipped out of the 947 occupied. They counted 391 telephones in 1960.

There is a lot of clothes washing in the home with 395 machines in the county, but only 37 dryers were counted. Important to the economy was the 251 homes that had one or more home freezers. The county had 561 homes with one automobile and 131 homes with two automobiles.



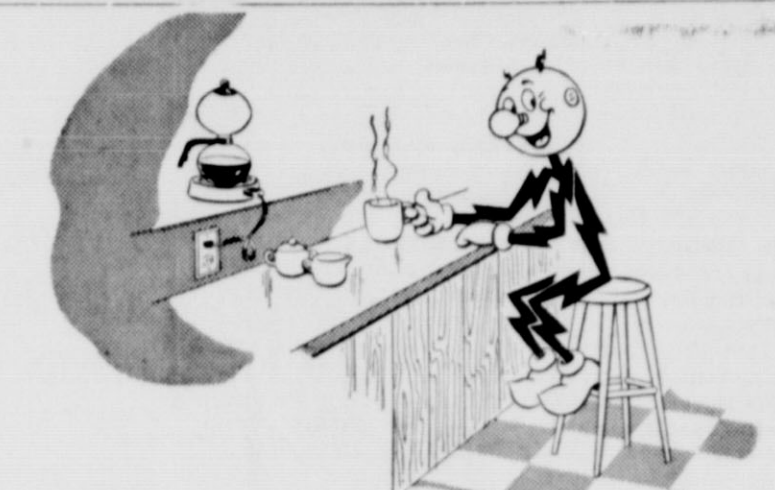
