Engraving Machine In Use This Week

All engravings (pictures) in this issue of the Tribune were made with the newspaper's new electronic engraving machine, the Photo-Lathe, manufactured in La Salle, Illinois. The engravings were made without any outside assistance and most of them from Poloroid pictures made with a 4x5 Speed Graphic camera.

Readers will notice a special characteristic about the engravings. They are made with a series of lines instead of the dots which produce images in other engraving processes.

A water line in her yard was broken and it was believed that the lightning bolt may have caused it.

Also a report was received that lightning struck a transformer near the D. P. Keith farm southeast of Matador and destroyed it.

Rainfall during the series of storms totaled approximately 1.75 inches.

Almost without exception the telephone users were proud of the progress in communications here but equally regretful in losing the personal service of local switchboard operators.

These records should contain information sheet giving name, address, county, age, number of years in 4-H work, and contest entered; table of points, three photos 3 1/2" x 5" suitable for news release (black and white); the standard report form; summary of awards earned and programs entered; summary of all activities; activity summary telling of work in contest; news clippings; and record sheets of demonstrations, and correspond-

Special forms are required for some of the contests, which may be picked up at my office, along with other forms that may be needed. These should be submitted in a durable cover. Awards range from medals to trophies to the National 4-H Contest, which will be held in Chicago, November 25-29. College scholarships are also included in many of the programs. Those interested are urged to contact me immediately.

When checking fields for cotton, insects, don't forget to look for boll worms and boll worm eggs. It is impossible to kill them when it is buried in the soil, but when the worms are feeding and feeding on small bolls, they are easy to kill. Generally the time to start control measures is when four or five bollworms are found per plant. From 75 to 100 bolls per acre will more than pay for the cost of application. If plants have about 20,000 plants per acre, before it insects strike, the grower can figure what he needs to gain by proper control measures.

CITY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE BUILDING AND USE OF PRIVIES, SEPTIC TANKS, AND CESS POOLS IN THE CITY OF MATADOR, AND PROHIBITING THE USE OF CERTAIN TYPES IN CERTAIN AREAS.

Section 1. The term "sewer limits" shall be defined to mean within 150 feet of the line of the sewer system presently operated by the City of Matador.

Section 2. On or after September 1, 1962, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to build, use, operate or maintain within the sewer limits as herein defined, any cess pool, septic tank, or dry closet privy.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the above provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction be fined in any sum, not less than \$10.00, or more than \$500. Each day the law is violated shall be a separate offense.

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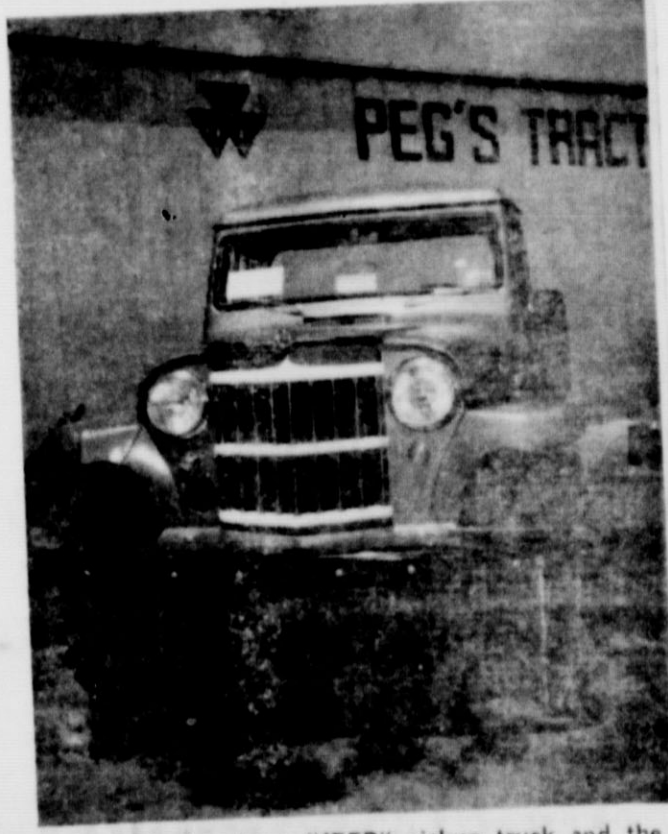
