

## Stanley Pharmacy Celebrates Anniversary



James Stanley, owner of Stanley Pharmacy, will celebrate the store's 40th anniversary this week.

In October of 1945 R.M. (Bob) Stanley purchased the City Drug Store from the late G.S. (Doc) Craven. Now Stanley Pharmacy celebrates 40 years of continuous operation in this community.

In recalling the words of the late Bob Stanley he said on the 25th anniversary celebration that Matador had changed a lot since he first saw it in 1936 when he came to visit his brother, Dr. J. S. Stanley. He recalled that the streets were not paved and that a large concrete-based post was in the center of Main and Dundee Streets and had a single light at the top.

After the purchase of the store, it was operated under the

name of City Drug Store for about two years when it was changed to Stanley Pharmacy. After Dr. Stanley built the Stanley Hospital there was some confusion and the name was changed to Bob Stanley Pharmacy.


The original location was across the street in the Barkley Building. After the courthouse burned, the county used the present Stanley Pharmacy location as a courthouse until the courthouse was built. Later J. M. Jackson acquired the property and improved the building. The pharmacy moved to the building in 1953.

The late Bob Stanley and his wife, Etoile, moved here from

Lockhart with their two sons, Fred age 11 and James age 5.

Fred and James are both graduates of Southwestern University School of Pharmacy at Weatherford, Okla. James stayed in Matador to work with his father in operating the pharmacy. Fred owns two pharmacies in Mt. Vernon. Mrs. Bob Stanley was active in the drugstore for many years.

James joined his father and mother in operating Stanley Pharmacy in 1965. It was operated as a partnership until Bob Stanley's death in 1983 and on January 1, 1984, James and Margaret Stanley became the sole owners when they bought the remaining interest.

## Matadors Experience Heartbreaking Loss

The Matadors traveled to Chillicothe last Friday night looking for their first win. Their hopes were shattered, though, losing 12 to 6 in a heartbreaking game.

The second half remained uneventful until a few Matador errors set the Eagles up for the winning score. With 8:27 left in the game Chillicothe scored on a one yard run. The Matadors piled up the extra point leaving the score 12 to 6.

In the late stages of the game, Motley County drove to the Chillicothe 30 yard line but could

not connect on several pass attempts into the end zone. The Matadors host the Spur Bulldogs this week at 7:30 p.m. The players and coaches would appreciate all the support of their fans this week.

Brandt Bearden is the offensive player of the week for his hard running and blocking during the Chillicothe game.

Rodney Doran is the defensive player of the week, having made 7 solo tackles, 6 assists, and 1 interception.

Coach Hollenback felt the team continued to show improvement in the Chillicothe game. "This is the first week we did not have a single turnover. We made a few mental mistakes that proved costly, but physically, we dominated the game. I believe the players now know what it takes to win, and we are in good shape to begin district play this week against Spur."

## Concerned Citizens Present Petition To Hospital Board

A group of Senior Citizens and other Concerned Citizens of Matador met with the Motley County Hospital Board.

Mrs. D. C. Baker brought a signed petition of 240 asking that Roy Tippin, Family Nurse Practitioner, remain as director of Motley County E.M.S. Sixty-five percent of Matador's population are Senior Citizens. There were many expressions of appreciation of Roy's DEDICATED AND EFFICIENT SERVICE voiced by people whom he had helped in time of need. The Hospital Board assured the people that Roy could go on ambulance calls with critically ill, at the patient's family's request and expense. Tippin is employed by the South

Plains Health Providers Organization, Inc., Plainview.

The Hospital Board explained that they are only responsible for the ambulance service. After Roy's resignation they hired Kirby Campbell and Jim Meador as ambulance drivers. They must have two qualified people on the ambulance service at all times.

**Editor's Note:** In reply to the Hospital Board's assurance that he could go on the ambulance at the request of a patient's family, Roy Tippin stated: "I can not go on the ambulance and I can no longer make house calls. We now have a doctor in Matador only one day a week and as a Family Nurse Practitioner I am required to have his permission to act. At the present time and circumstances, I can no longer serve the county as in the past."

## Stolen Goods Located




Shattered glass from a broken store front window awaited Guys and Gals Department Store owner DiAnn Campbell Tuesday morning.

The Team With Heart

Traditionally Matador loves winners, basking in the glow of the aura that comes from being "number one," but has little use for the noble young men who try their darndest, but lose.

Only the small following of parents, teachers, and football fans who witnessed the devastating losses of "The Survivors of 1984" can appreciate the outstanding strides the team has made this year under the leadership of Coach Hollenback.

'84 was a year to survive. The school had blown away in May, the football field was strewn with debris and the lights snapped like toothpicks, the administration was weighted down with the heavy decisions of rebuilding.

Basketball coach Moe Eddleman, readily admitting his lack of expertise and experience in football, agreed to pitch in and try to keep the football program alive until Motley County ISD once again had facilities to offer a prospective coach.

The thirteen young men who suited up that year did so with few illusions. They faced teams twice their size. The young team rejected dropping down to the ranks of 6-Man, knowing that next year the eighth graders, though lacking in size, would increase their ranks. They too chose to keep the football program alive.

By the second half, no matter how hard they tried in the first, fatigue and/or injuries would take their toll, and opponents would run the score up. Eddleman's strength came in keeping the boys from feeling like losers, though they were losing by big margins. As ex-coach Charlie Johnson summed it up at the last pep rally, "I never expected to see you finish the season. Mr. (Haden) Moore and I

could have drilled you better, taught you how to block or tackle better, but we probably couldn't have taken you through the season."

Into this picture sweeps Coach Chip Hollenback with his football philosophy straight out of the Midwest. Stressing team play and a Christian attitude while prohibiting the use of alcohol, drugs, and tobacco, Hollenbach brought not only new plays but enthusiasm and a winning attitude to a team who had won precious little. Hollenbach, believing in a well drilled team, slips in a whole philosophy of life in his practice sessions, something that could influence a boy for a lifetime.

Consider that team for a moment. Lacking any truly outstanding speed or ability, the team is seemingly composed of many members evenly matched in their talent, with varying degrees of dedication. Take the senior, choosing to stay at MCHS when his family had to move, who goes to work at 6:30 A.M. to earn his keep, plays football, and still makes top grades. Or the tackling quarterback who has never lost his faith that

"we're going to win the next one." Or the 110 lb. freshman, small in stature only, who viciously tackles opponents twice his size and height. Or the senior who is laid out after a game with an asthma attack.

These boys and others like them on the team play out of a sense of loyalty or pure love of the game, but they do so at great personal expense. So they haven't won YET, but if a team member makes an outstanding tackle, a smart play, or fights his heart out, can't we spare a few words in the newspaper, an encouraging word on the street, a pat on the back in passing for his effort? Or must we always bask in being "Number One"?



## SPOOKY SPIDER



by Peter Hamilton Kent

To make this great spider you'll need:

- 32 strips of black paper 1/2" wide and 11" long
- a Styrofoam or other ball 2 1/2" in diameter
- a Styrofoam or other ball 1 1/2" in diameter
- scraps of paper
- a string 15" long
- scissors, glue, and black paint

1. To make the legs, glue together two strips of paper as shown. Fold strip "a" over strip "b," and then "b" over "a." Continue folding one strip over the other until both have been used up. Glue the ends together. Make 15 more paper "springs." Glue two springs end to end for each of the 8 legs.
2. Cover the balls with paste and paper. When dry, paint them black. Glue the two balls together.
3. Cut out paper eyes and mouth. Glue them to the spider's head. Attach the legs and the string (for hanging) to the body.

Walter Linson once again led the team in rushing and Matt Washington scored the teams touchdown on a 1 yd. quarterback sneak.



# Law East Of The Pecos

I went to work for the Matador Ranch in 1941, patching dirt tanks in the East Pasture about thirty miles east of the headquarters near the town of Matador, Texas. Eventually, the work required us to move to the town of Matador. We soon got acquainted with some of the old timers there. Two of them (C.D. Bird and J.M. Jackson) had helped organize Motley County in 1891.

After living in Matador about two years we started in the Abstract business. Another old timer, Mr. W.M. Graham, used to come to our office to have me write his letters. He grew up in Denton County, Texas, and said that he never got to go to school but taught himself to read by studying the newspapers. He had been a buffalo hunter when he was a young man. In Motley County he had a good-sized ranch, and he told me that he

had provided in his will that each of his grandchildren be given a college education if they so desired. Mr. Graham was a good friend of Mr. M.J. Reilly, the Superintendent of the Matador division of the ranch.

At the same time Mr. Graham told me "The old ranch (the Matador) has ruined every boy that grew up in this town except Dr. Albert Traveek."

Mr. Graham didn't want his grandsons to grow up to be cowboys. They didn't. One of them, Jody Graham, was Deputy Sheriff of Motley County for several years.

For several years, being in the abstract business, I was around the Courthouse nearly every day, and knew what was going on. During that time my wife, Ina, worked in the County Judge's office for fourteen years. Neither of us can remember that a boy

(we call them juvenile delinquents now days) of Motley County was ever brought into court on any charge whatsoever.

Joe Beckham, the first Sheriff of Motley County, had been a cowboy on the Matador Ranch, as has nearly every other Sheriff of Motley County since then. These old-time Cowboy-Sheriffs knew how to handle cows and how to handle boys. If a teenage boy got too much booze, the

Sheriff would load him up, take him home, and if need be, help his parents put him to bed.

Matador, for a long time, has been a town of about 1500 people. Three hijackers, who appeared to be in their twenties, came through town one day and held up the filling station in broad daylight. They were caught before they got out of the county. Henry Pipkin, who had a barber shop across the street from the courthouse, was the Justice of the Peace and came over to the Courthouse to enter the charges against the hijackers. I was in the Sheriff's office when he came in. He spoke to the boys who were seated and handcuffed together. Henry then went over and shook hands with each one of them. I will never forget what he said to them.

He said, "I am sorry that I didn't get to know you boys before you got into this. I might have talked you out of it."

The boys all looked down at their feet and one of them said, "I am sorry too."

Henry Pipkin, as Justice of the Peace, probably set a record for holding public office longer than any one else in Motley County. He never ran for office. His friends always elected him. When the cowboys came to town they usually went to his barber shop to get a haircut and take a bath. I never at any time ever heard one of them address him as anything other than "Mr. Henry".

A good-natured old cowboy by the name of Mack Marshall got a little heavy to ride a horse and went into the business of building and repairing fences. To help him out, some of his friends put his name on the ticket and he was elected Constable. I don't know what the office paid him, but he kept on building fences. If he ever wore a gun I never saw him with it. One Saturday night old Mack was standing in front of the barber shop visiting with some of his friends. A boy about sixteen whipped his car into a parking place a little too fast and the front wheels jumped upon the curb. Mack stepped out to the car on the driver's side and said, "Kid, you'd better be a little more careful. There's a highway cop in this town and he's liable to run you in."




