Common sense and prior planning play a big part in assuring your youngsters' safety and enjoyment, while still allowing them the thrills of this fall celebration. A few suggestions include:

--Pre-planning the route, staying in familiar neighborhoods and only visiting homes that show the trick or treat signal of a lighted porch or yard.

--An older teenager or adult should accompany young children on their journeys. Older children walking their route with friends need to thoroughly discuss safety rules with parents beforehand.

--Set time limits for their travels. Remember Halloween is on a school night this year and the costumed imps and aliens turn back into students early the next morning.

--Costumes and masks should not restrict movement or eyesight, or trail on the ground. Use reflective tape. Pass out plenty of flashlights.

--Make certain your yard, driveway, porch and sidewalks are free of obstructions if you are handing out candy. If you are driving, take extra care to watch for small, ghostly pedestrians.

Upper Pease SWCD Selling Windbreak Trees

The Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District is now selling trees for windbreaks. They have a wide variety of trees that can be planted in this area. Some of the trees available are Eastern Redcedar, Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Afghanistan Pine, Scotch Pine, Green Ash, Russian Olive, Honeylocust and Hackberry. These trees were grown in Lubbock by the Forest Service so they are adapted to this climate.

Windbreaks can greatly improve living conditions where high winds and blowing dust frequently occur. A properly designed and maintained windbreak will protect life and property for more than 40 years. When used around the house, windbreaks can decrease heating costs, screen excessive noise levels, hide unsightly views or just enhance the natural beauty of an area. When planted around fields, the loss of

soil and the damage to crops is reduced, shelter is provided for livestock, wildlife benefits from food and cover the trees provide.

The days of the old 5 row windbreaks are gone, it has been found that one or two rows of trees can stop the same amount of wind. A row of trees thirty feet tall can protect up to three hundred feet of your field from damaging winds. With a small amount of management you can also keep windbreaks from sapping the edges of the field. By root pruning the trees every 3 or 4 years, the trees will not compete with adjacent crops.

Windbreaks are another alternative that farmers can use to protect their crops and soil from damaging winds. For more information on purchasing these trees, contact a director of the Upper Pease SWCD or the Soil Conservation Service in the Motley County Court House.

Health Care Organization Provides After-Hours Care

Due to an arrangement with South Plains Health Providers Organization, Inc. and Dr. Leon Garcia, Roy Tippin, Family Nurse Practitioner, is now available for after-hours care. This announcement came this week from Mr. Ben Flores, Project Director of SPHPOI.

Tippin and the Plainview based organization made this arrangement in order to comply with federal guidelines and to respond to correspondence that the organization received from

concerned citizens of Motley County.

This after clinic hours care includes primary (emergency) care only but **does not** include emergency transportation.

Motley County Clinic hours are Monday-Friday, 8 to 5. Dr. Leon Garcia is in the clinic on Tuesdays only and Tippin is there each day with the exception of Wednesday and Friday afternoons. These afternoons are a portion of the compensation for after hours availability.

Exercise Center To Open Soon In R.S.



Announcement came this week that Roaring Springs will soon have a new aerobic and exercise center. The name of the facility will be "The Body Shop" which will be located in the old Post Office building in Roaring Springs.

The classes will be taught by Tonda (Mrs. Chip) Hollenback. She is a certified aerobic instructor with a B.S. degree in physical education and health.

Tonda has been teaching aerobics for six years. "I really started about 10 years ago in my physical education classes and gymnastic classes. It just wasn't called aerobics at that time. The exercises have been jazzed up but the basics are still there. I try to strive for a total body workout which includes exercises from head to toe. The workout is good for both men and women of all ages. Also, if youngsters are having coordination problems, the program will provide exercises to improve those problems. A worry for most people is not being able to keep

up with an aerobic program. I, try to start out slow with everyone and gradually add new or more exercises. I, also, encourage each individual to work at their own rate. No one is there to compete. You are there for yourself because you want to get in shape for yourself" Mrs. Hollenback recently stated.

The Body Shop classes will be held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays at 5:45-6:45 P.M. and 7:15-8:15 P.M. If the response to the classes is good, other classes can be added to accommodate people who would like some day classes or weekend classes. The opening date is scheduled for November 12. The first session will go for four weeks.

An Open House will be on November 9 from 10:00 A.M.-2:00 P.M. to sign up for the classes. If you can't attend, please come a few minutes early to the first class.

Voters Go To Polls Tuesday To Choose

"Propositions 1,2 and 10 especially merit approval by voters on the Nov. 5 ballot" according to James W. Taylor, of Matador, President of the Motley County Farm Bureau.

"The first two deal with helping assure adequate water for future domestic, industrial and agricultural use," the local farm leader said recently. "Proposition 10 would assist farmers and ranchers in the purchase of land," he said.

Taylor pointed out that neither the water projects nor the land purchase program will require use of tax money for financing.

Taylor added that Proposition 10 authorizes the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas water development bonds to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage,

subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation and desalinization.

"Proposition 2 authorizes the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds. Proceeds from the sale of these bonds would be deposited in an agricultural water conservation fund for use by the Texas Water Development Board in funding programs adopted by the legislature.

Proposition 10 authorizes the issuance of \$500 million of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The program would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board in the same manner that the board administers other similar land programs for the benefit of veterans," he concluded.

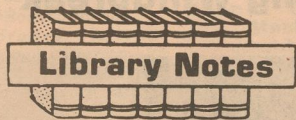
"And He cometh..and saith unto Peter, Simon, sleepest thou?..Watch and pray lest ye enter into temptation." Mark 14: 37,38.

My uncle tells of moving Mrs. Smith's outhouse to another location. (I'm sure many of you in Motley County did just that, too.)

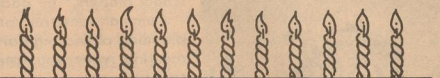
When I was a kid you could buy a gadget that you hooked to some one's screen window and it made a weird noise. The worse

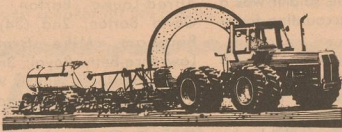

With half-time festivities out of the way, the Hornets controlled the third quarter play on a scoring five yard run. The two point conversion was good. The

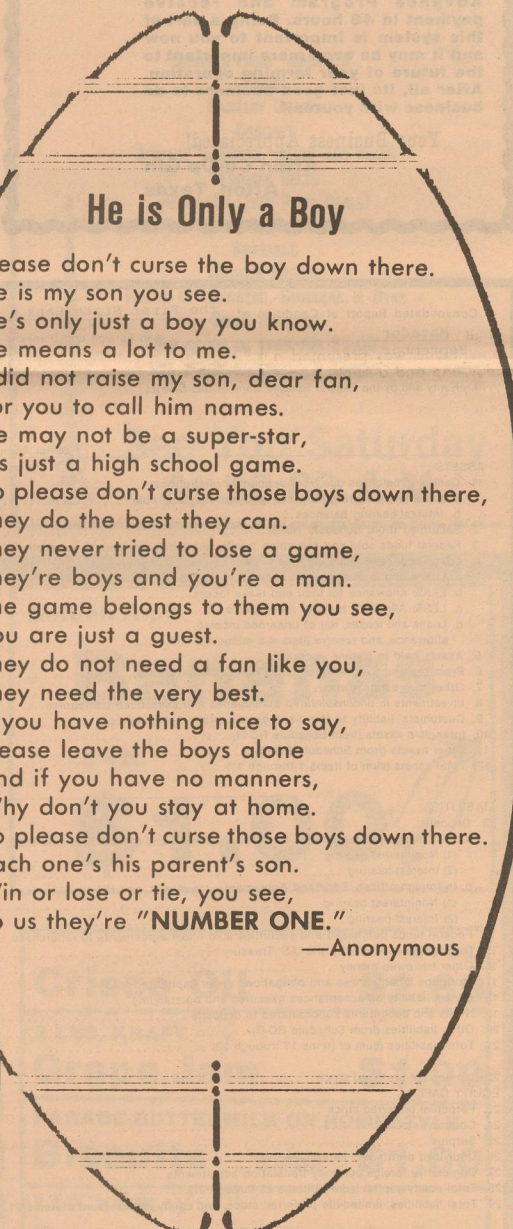

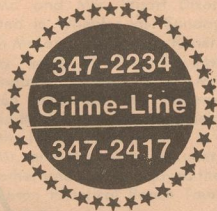

Interment was in the Flomot Cemetery under the direction of Mynatt Funeral Home of Matador.

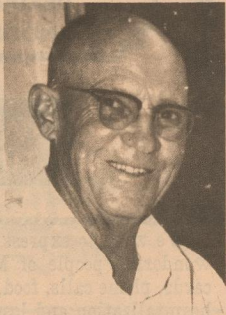
