Work Is Scheduled Hatain der Grihung Grihung Streichung At Methodist Church SITE IS CLEARED and actual construction of the Methodist education building is scheduled to start Monday, it was announce

education building is scheduled to start Monday, it was announced this week by Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor. The new building will be 130 feet by 42 feet and located immediately south of the church. Entrance will be on Bundy Street. Rev. Hugh Hunt of Lubbock, chairman of the Methodist Town & Country Commistion, is the architect.


The structure, which will have 11 class rooms, will be of frame construction with brick veneer. Attractive entrance will include ledge stone wing and planter on Bundy Street.

Roof of the main structure will be gable with the exception of the 20-foot area immediately south of the church, which will be flat roof. Other rooms will include the pastor's study, prayer room, church parlor and coffee bar.

Rev. Patterson said the construction will be under the supervision of Rev. Hunt and various phases of the work sub-contracted. It is estimated that the cost will be about \$40,000, half of which has been raised by contributions. It is believed that the building may be completed in about three months.

When the new building is fin ished the class rooms will be moved from the basement allowing more space there for other

activities. Rev. Patterson said A covered walk on the west and south of the present church building will make for convenient access to both structures.


