The invitation was signed by Elbert Reeves, County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent. The letter, in part, reads as follows:

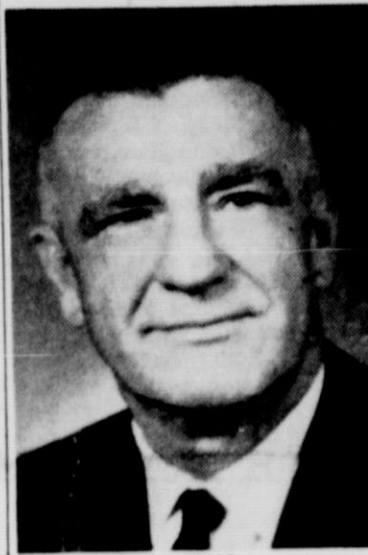

## Change Announced In Location of Stock Show Here

Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show will be held east of the former Burton-Lingo lumber yard (instead of the school agriculture building) it was announced this week by County Agent Bill Pallmeyer. The date is Saturday, April 14.

No reason for the change in location accompanied the announcement but it is assumed that convenience is the principal factor in moving the show closer to the business section of town.

Bill Gregory, Spur Vo-Ag instructor will serve as judge. Two top animals in each class will be sold at public auction after completion of the judging (if owner wishes to sell) Pallmeyer said.

All animals must be weighed in and in place by 11 a. m. on the day of the show. Scales will be provided by the Matador Ranch and weighing will be done at the show grounds.

All communities will be represented in the expected entries of 10 steers, four heifers, ten fat lambs and 45 hogs.

Championship trophies will be presented by the American Legion, VFW, Eternas Study Club, and Western Farm Supply of Floydada. Ribbons and reserve champion rosettes will be presented by the Farm Bureau, and showmanship prizes will be presented by Memphis Production Credit Association. The prizes will be haltered in the cattle and sheep division and show sticks in the swine division.

New directors will be selected at the show from each of the school districts to serve with the hold-over directors.

## Lubbock Editor Believes Understanding Key to World Problems

"Most of the people of the world want to be with us, but not just part of the way. They want our way of life but not just a part of it," Charles A. Guy, editor of the Lubbock Avalanche said here Thursday evening. He was guest speaker at the annual Gentlemen's Evening banquet and program of El Progreso Club, held in the basement of the Methodist Church.

"We must become more global-minded," Mr. Guy said, "and sell our way of life to the world. What is wrong with the plain, ordinary garden variety of American citizenship? We must be ourselves without pretense—the same kind of people we actually are."

The newsmen, whose experience in evaluating news, and sifting facts from the tangled skeins of information, and who is among the most outstanding in the Southwest, strongly opposed any form of world government.

"The world is not ready for such a fantastic plan," he said, "simply because it will not work. We talk of world government when we differ in counties and communities. A quarrel between New Mexico and Texas is just as real as a misunderstanding between nations."

"We must sell the American way of life and the American form of government if we are to extend the influence of this nation to the world."

Mr. Guy referred frequently to six foreign airmen from Reese Air Force Base who were guests of the club and was pleased that they had been invited. He was introduced by Douglas Meador, editor of the Tribune.

In his column, "The Plainsman" in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, Mr. Guy wrote this week, "I hope every one of the 25 to 30 foreign students now at Reese—and all those to come—will have opportunity to visit in neighboring towns and thereby learn to know the American people better than their otherwise may. Understanding is what the world needs most today. This is one way to promote it."

Further examination disclosed another piece of metal buried in his foot, believed to come from the sole of his boot. He is scheduled to return home today to await result of the operation in effort to save his toes.

## Wayland Moore is Scholarship Winner

Wayland F. Moore, science teacher in Matador High School, has been granted a scholarship to the 1962 Summer Institute for High School Biology Teachers at Texas Tech. College. It is a nine-week course, and will last from June 2 to August 3, 1962.

Nine categories of the course are planned—one for each week. Morphology of non-flowering plants will be instructed during the first week by Dr. Arthur M. Elliot and Dr. Paul Dr. Prior. During the second morphology and anatomy of flowering plants will be taught by Dr. Earl D. Camp.

plants will be under the instruction of Prof. Chestnut Howell. Dr. Russel W. Strassmann will teach morphology and classification of the invertebrates, and anatomy and taxonomy of the vertebrates will be taught by Dr. Donald W. Tinkle. The course also includes animal physiology, two field trips—one to Xilitla, Mexico, north of Mexico City, and one to Taos, New Mexico—and discussions, reviews, and examinations.

Besides the two extensive field trips, several local field trips are planned. The unspoiled scenic canyons near Lubbock, Palo Duro Canyon, the shinnery oak country of New Mexico, and the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge will be visited and studied by the participants.

The National Science Foundation is the provider for the stipends to each selected participant. The stipend for each participant is \$75.00 per week,

with \$15.00 allowance for each dependent. The travel allowance for one round-trip pays four cents a mile, and there are no tuition fees.

Congratulations go to Mr. Moore, who not only is a good teacher, but is active in sponsoring extra-curricular activities.
