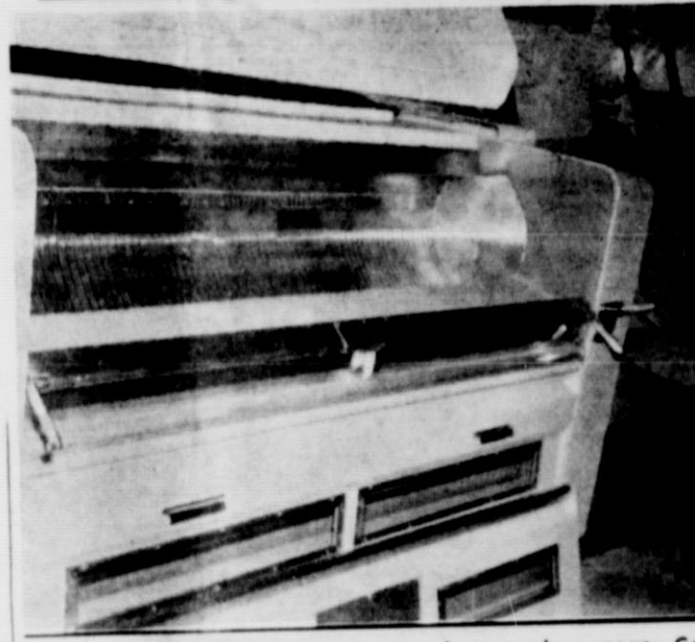
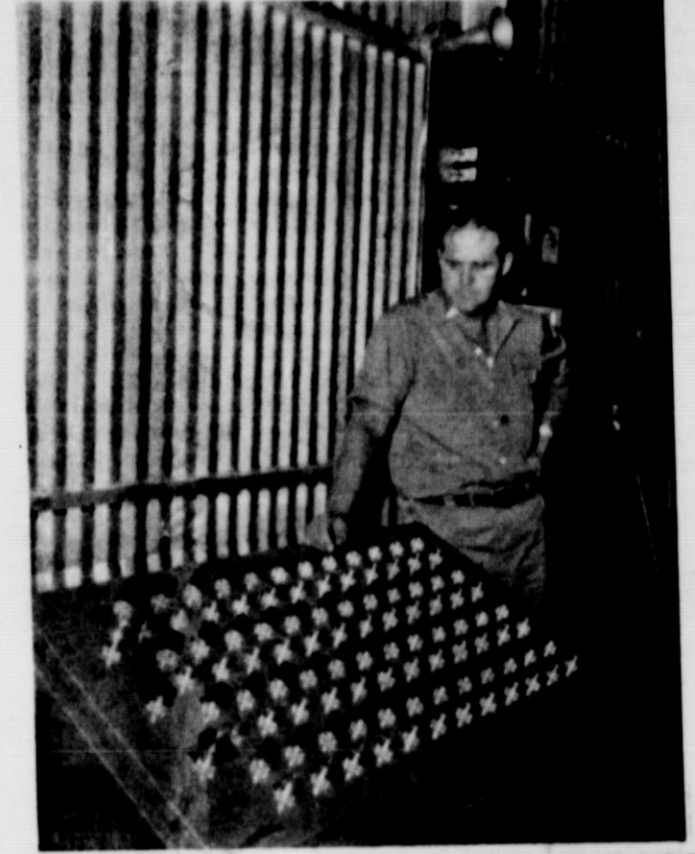
An increase is expected during the next six to eight weeks, according to Superintendent Bert Ezell.

PADUCAH - Mike Hernandez, 42-year-old farmer, Monday received a 20-year prison sentence from his marijuana crop.

Hernandez, who farms about 18 miles northwest of Paducah, pleaded guilty before 50th District Court Judge Lewis M. Williams to illegal possession of marijuana.

Officers said they confiscated 12 three-pound cans of manufactured marijuana in a raid at Hernandez' home three weeks ago. They also found 703 stalks of the weed growing there.

New Type Gin Opens In Roaring Springs

AT THE CONSOLE a button is pressed and a horn sounds as a signal that what may be one of the most modern gin plants in the world today, is starting. It is the new Red Ball Gin at Roaring Springs which will gin its first cotton this week.

The owners, Calwell Smith and Melton Thacker, admit that a more modern gin may go into operation somewhere in the cotton producing countries of the world tomorrow.

A number of the newer gin plants in West Texas have many features in the Red Ball gin, they believe, however, the new plant has more of the new features.

When all the motors are going, 48 in all, 1250 horsepower is employed. The gin will be capable of ginning 20 bales of cotton per hour. The plant will be capable of processing damp, green cotton through two modern drying machines, one of which goes into operation before

Response Good for Vaccine 'Make-Up'

RESPONSE to "Make-Up" Sunday Sabin Oral Polio vaccine (those who failed to receive the polio protection on Sunday, September 16) was considered good by those in charge of the campaign to provide immunization for Motley County and area.

A total of 257 came to the American Legion vaccine center Sunday during the two hour period (2 to 4 p.m.) and received the three drops of vaccine on cubes of sugar. Since the "Make-Up" Dr. J. S. Stanley provided vaccine for 13 making a total of 270. With 1714 receiving the vaccination on September 16, the total for Motley County and area is 1984.

When the drive was first planned it was estimated that between 2,000 and 2,500 might receive vaccination. After the adverse publicity released by Canada immediately prior to the drive, estimates dropped to approximately 2,000 (the total was only 16 short), or in the neighborhood of two out of every three population in the county. The drive was sponsored by the three Lions clubs in the county, but received assistance from a number of organizations,

Matadors Trounce Wildcats 24 to 16

COMING from behind at the end of the second quarter, the Matador Matadors added the Class A Crowell Wildcats' scalp to their belts, 24-16 as their second win of their second game of the 1962 season on Burleson Field here Friday night.

The first Wildcat touchdown came early in the first period when fullback Dale Doyle rammed up the middle of the Crowell line, broke away from

would-be tacklers and raced 78 yards for the TD. Quarterback Bob Borchardt made the 2 point conversion.

Matador was scoreless during the first quarter and barely made it in the second quarter. In the last few seconds before band time Gary Lancaster plunged two yards into the end zone for the touchdown. He passed to Charles Ezell who snagged the ball out of the air for the extra points.

The Matadors went ahead of the Wildcats in the 3rd quarter when Lancaster made a dive over left guard for the score. He then added the extras with a run around left end, bringing the score to 16-8 in the Matadors' favor.

Final Matador score was made at the end of a 60-yard drive when Kenny Barton toppled over from the one-foot line. Lancaster made the 2 point conversion.

The Wildcats came back to score late in the 4th when Borchardt returned a 30-yard punt for the tally. Doyle scored the extra points with a dive off right tackle.

Tomorrow the Matadors journey to Roscoe where they will meet the Roscoe Plowboys.

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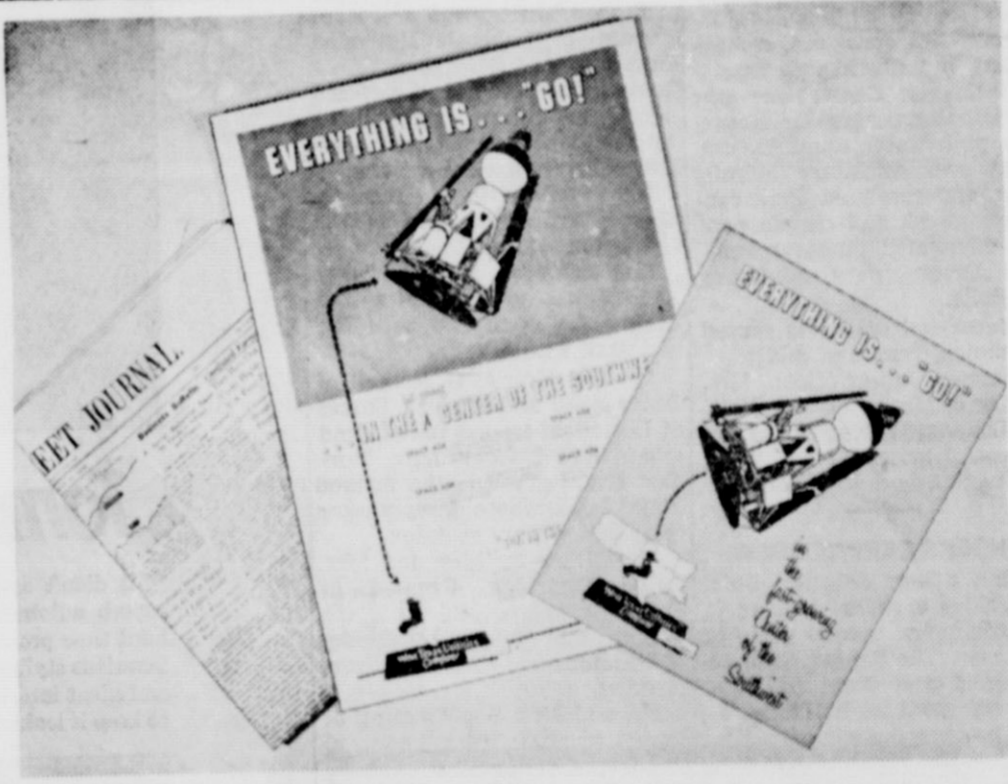
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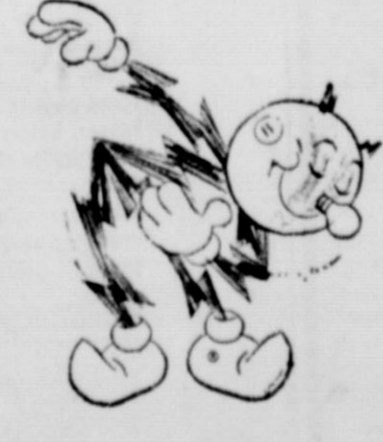

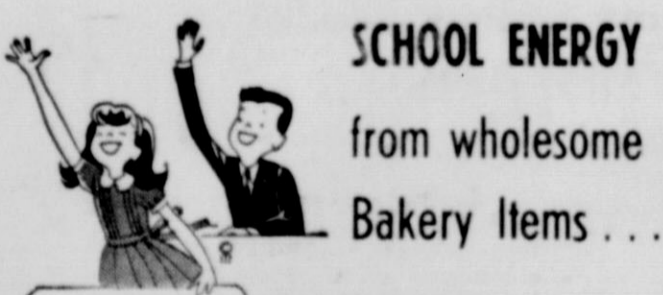

Railway Receives Safety Certificate

ST. LOUIS, MO. (Special to Tribune)—The Quana, Acme & Pacific Railway Company, a subsidiary of the St. Louis San Francisco (Frisco) Railway Company, has received a Harriman Certificate of Commendation in New York, September 19, for having scored the safest mark for railroads in the Western District of the country during the year 1961.

Quin Baker, president of the QA&P, received the award from Commissioner Everett Hutchison of the Interstate Commerce Commission at ceremonies in New York's Roosevelt Hotel, marking the 43rd annual presentation of safety awards under the E. H. Harriman Memorial established in 1913 in honor of the railroad pioneer.

The coveted Harriman Memorial Awards are presented through the Harriman Memorial Awards Committee of the American Museum of Safety, to railroads accomplishing the best over-all safety records based on statistics compiled by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Five other line-haul railroads, two switching and terminal companies, and the Pullman Company also receive awards.

The QA&P operates 110 miles of railroad between Quana and Floydada, Texas, connecting with the main line of the parent company at Quana.

ADDRESS CHANGE REQUIRED FOR SOCIAL SECURITY

Thousands of people who are collecting social security checks do not get them as promptly as they could simply because they move and fail to notify social security offices of their new addresses. The Social Security Administration has announced:

A notice to the Post Office will not get an address changed on social security records, John G. Munson, District Manager, Lubbock Social Security Office, said today. The best way of insuring the prompt and safe delivery of your social security check each month, he said, is to let the Social Security Administration know your new address as soon as you plan to move.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Boll weevils will do a lot of damage to bolls that are up to 14 or 16 day old, if there are no young squares or blooms on the plants for the weevils to puncture. This information, along with the fact that boll weevils must feed for about three weeks to over-winter, should be a guide for farmers to determine how long to protect their crops against the weevils. Boll weevils are also moving into new fields in the search of food, therefore, now may be the critical time for the cotton farmer to prevent damage to his crop.

Are grain weevils a problem in grain sorghum? Some are reporting that their feed is badly infested, and if so, these weevils can be controlled by using eight gallons of carbon tetrachloride per 1000 bu. in wooden bins. Mixtures may also be used, and if this is your problem, ask for a leaflet giving controls. If the bin is empty now, treat the surfaces with DDT, TDE, or Methoxychlor. This will help to keep populations down.

Stockmen are reminded that the back tag method of testing animals sold for slaughter stock may eliminate having to gather stock for the retest that 20 per cent of the owners must submit to each three years for certification in the Brucellosis program. I have kits and tags in my office, and if you are interested, contact me for information or supplies before you ship old cattle. Blood samples are taken at the packing plants, and results are mailed to the owner.

Members of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation wish to thank livestock producers for submitting screw-worm samples for identification, and urge producers to continue submitting worms during the fall, to help pinpoint areas of heavy infestations as an aid towards continued control. If you do not have a mailing tube and vial, let me know, and I will give you the equipment needed. Reports indicate Florida has done a very good job on screw-

worm control, and that Texas can do the same thing if livestock owners cooperate, and doctor worms to help prevent the spread of the fly.

I need some help. For the past months I have tried to present timely information of interest to the people of the county in this column, plus notices of meetings, and activities in the 4-H program. Do you find the information worthwhile and helpful? If so, please let me know, for if the information is not worthwhile, there is no use to take up space in the paper that could be used for other purposes.

was tried in the old plant. It was here that a few skeptical ginners, farmers and friends watched the operation of Ennis Moss's dream. They were not aware that they were witnessing a preview of a revolution in the cotton ginning business. In ten years the Moss Lint Cleaner has become almost as necessary as gin stands.

The extra cleaning has produced millions of dollars in extra money to farmers because of higher prices for their lint. The small office where Ennis Moss

worked on drawings of his lint cleaner stands as it was when he owned Red Ball Gin. The gin plant was completely torn down and the ultra-modern "dream" plant erected in its place.

Extra Power Needed
Because of the excessive amount of electrical power which the plant will use, West Texas Utilities Company will more than double the capacity of their lines from the Matador substation to Roaring Springs. Approximately 37,000 pounds of new aluminum wire will carry the extra current to Roaring Springs.
