Baccalaureate Set County Vote Light In Stormy Primary

ESTIMATED 25% of Motley County's voting strength stayed away from the polls Saturday in the stormy Democratic primary that showed an unofficial total vote of 713. Estimates were that slightly less than 1,000 voters were qualified. The Republicans polled six votes in a primary held here at Fred's Motel.

The State Representative race between W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah and Alex Saied of Childress, and the County Democratic Chairman race between incumbent Furman Vinson and S. J. Braselton were calculated to bring the voters out in large numbers.




