Cotton Harvest Moving Slowly

Only 315 bales had been ginned Monday from Motley County's 1962 crop, according to County Agent Bill Palmeyer. On the same date last year the county had ginned 1203 bales. Palmeyer said the acreage in cotton is approximately the same this year as last.

Palmeyer said the full image of damage to the crop by the boll weevil will not be known until the end of the season. With few exceptions cotton crops in the county are late due to unfavorable planting conditions this year. The size of the crop will also be affected by the lateness of frost.

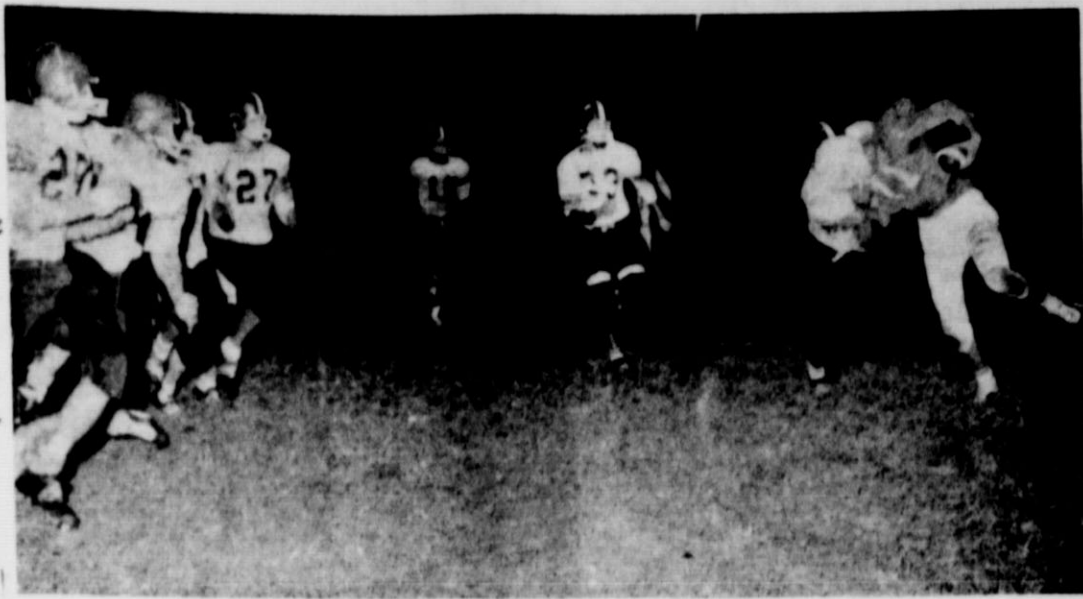

The funds come from the \$430 million authorized by the Housing Act of 1961, to be expended within a four-year period. Approximately \$95 million was obligated during fiscal 1962.

RETURN TO INDIANA

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Watkins have returned to their home in Shoals, Indiana after a ten day visit with his mother, Mrs. Joe Self and sister, Gladys.

"These funds will help 20,000 rural families who do not now have adequate housing to obtain credit to finance a new home or improve the home they already own." Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has declared.

"The rural housing program is also a driving force in rural areas development. The construction carried on with the funds provides work for local carpenters, masons, plumbers and steps up the sales of building supply dealers and other merchants in small rural communities. The wages received by the workmen and the profits retained by the businessmen are in turn circulated through local trade channels, invested in local enterprises. The effect of the housing dollar is multiplied many times before its force is diminished," Secretary Freeman explained.

"In addition the housing loans are helping to stabilize and strengthen rural communities by creating attractive modern living facilities, the type of house construction that makes communities desirable places in which to live.

"Here again the impact of the program multiplies, for the new homes built with Farmers Home Administration loans provide guide lines to the community in the economical construction of homes. In many areas the construction of these homes has stimulated the investment of

private capital in similar types of construction.

Repayments Excellent
"The program has also been highly successful so far as repayments are concerned," the Secretary said. More than \$417,000,000 has been advanced in rural housing loans since 1949. Principal and interest payments total \$147,000,000. Only \$86,000, or two one-hundredths of one percent have been written off as uncollectable.

Rural housing loans may be used to construct, modernize or repair homes and farm service buildings. They are available to farmers and residents of rural communities who cannot obtain credit from other sources.

Under the Rural Housing Program the Farmers Home Administration has made in Texas over 2,700 loans for over \$20,440,000. There have been no losses on these loans. As of December 31, 1961, these borrowers had paid over \$5,966,000 on principal and \$2,879,000 on interest, which leaves only about \$14,474,000 owed on principal, and of the borrowers, 665 have already paid their loans in full ahead of their maturities.

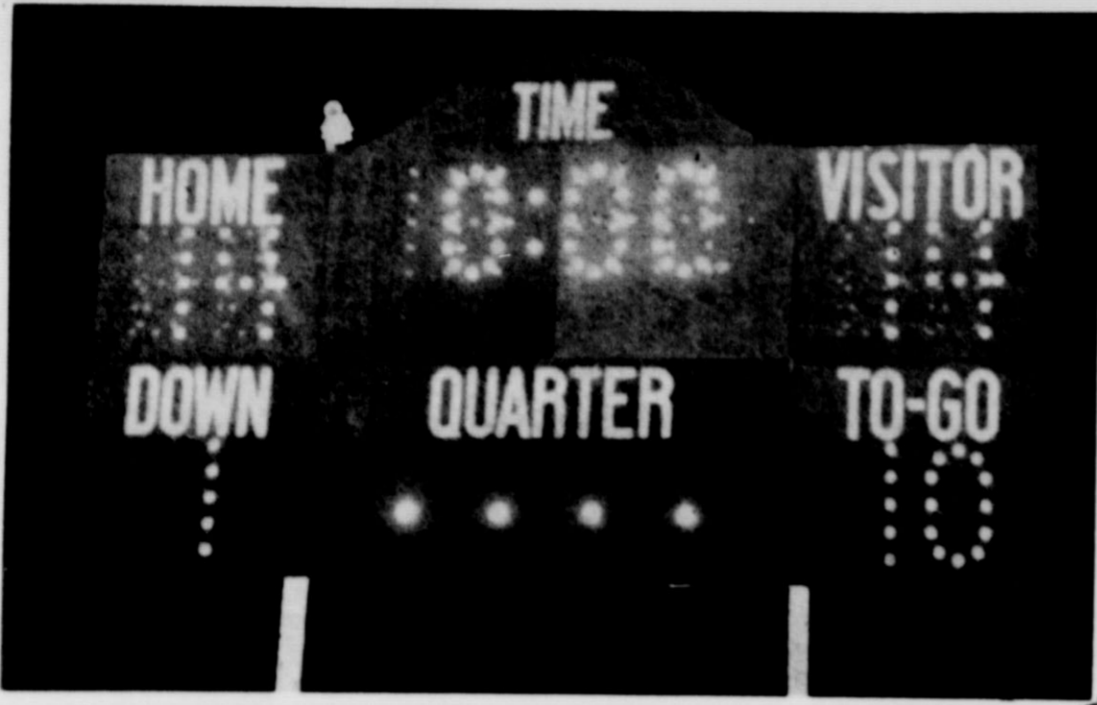

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

I received a new bulletin, "Texas Guide for controlling Diseases on Ornamental Plants," which should be of interest to the people. The bulletin gives a complete rundown on diseases that affect ornamental plants, their symptoms and treatments. It also contains discussions of each disease that will help identify and control it.

For those who are not willing to trust their diagnosis of plant diseases, a plant disease control lab has been established at Texas A & M. Samples may be mailed to this lab, along with instruction sheets that I have in my office. It is often possible for the pathologist to give a tentative diagnosis and suggest a program that will bring the disease under control. At other times it is necessary to make additional tests, but in any case the grower receives a report as soon as possible. All types of plants may be submitted, but the producer should secure an instruction sheet to determine how to wrap the sample, and what part of the plant to submit. There is no charge for this service.

The date for the 4-H Achievement Banquet has been selected Tuesday, November 27 has been reserved for this event. Did you know that drinking an extra cup of coffee could make you money? This could be the case if you are gathering cotton mechanically, because moisture level has much to do with grades. Regardless of how dry the weather, cotton should never be harvested at night or in the evening. Even on the driest days, cotton will probably not be dry enough to harvest mechanically until 8:00 a.m. Moisture in cotton seed from humidity

if the cotton is too damp, drink that extra cup.

may not be seen or felt, but it is there, and limits the job the ginner can do. Excess moisture in cotton usually results in the loss of grade and quality and this in turn costs the grower \$10 or more per bale. The ginner must increase the heat in the dryers to get desirable grades from high moisture cotton. Using more heat increases the danger of fiber quality damage on the bale being ginned and the bale following. Over-drying can result and this makes for the kind of cotton, mills don't want. Most farmers don't have a cotton moisture meter, but pick a handful of cotton, squeeze it tightly in your hand and release quickly. If the cotton fluffs out when released, it is dry enough for pulling with machines. Make this test at several different spots in the field, and

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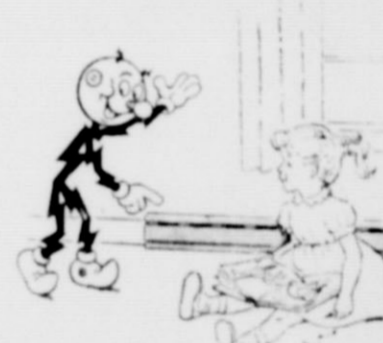
