## Annual Dedicated To J. E. Edwards

Matador school annual, "La Arena," 1962 edition is dedicated to J. E. Edwards, Matador Grade School principal and coach, who is recognized not only as a youth leader in the community but an outstanding civic and church leader.

The dedication reads, "As a tribute to a man who has devoted his time and effort unselfishly to the Matador schools, we, the staff of the 1962 La Arena, dedicate this yearbook to J. E. Edwards."

Born in Cottle County, near Paducah, "Jake" Edwards was still a small boy when his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. George Edwards, moved to adjoining Motley County.

He attended both Whiteflat and Matador schools, and following his graduation in 1930 from Matador High School, he attended Howard Payne College where he lettered four years on the football team and was All-Conference right tackle one year. He received a B. S. degree from Howard Payne.

His first position was that of athletic coach at Eden. Later he taught and was assistant coach at Sweetwater and Tyler.

## Was Naval Instructor

He served in the Navy during World War II as instructor in anti-aircraft and chemical warfare at the Great Lakes Naval Station for two years. From here he was sent on duty to the Naval Rehabilitation Hospital at Beaumont, Calif.

For the past 14 years Mr. Edwards has been with the Matador school system in the capacity of principal and grade school coach. In 1949 he received a

## Phone Company To Assign Numbers For Dial System

Every business customer of the General Telephone Company in Matador will be assigned a new number within the next few weeks "for advertising and business stationery purposes," it was announced last week by W. L. Frazier, district manager at Ralls. The ANC prefix has been changed to 347, "thus Matador's number assignments will be 347 followed by four digits," Frazier said.

The number change is another preparation for the change to a dial system cutover on August 1. Over 50% of automatic electric equipment has arrived and crews are making installations. The new building on Lariat Street, started in November, will contain terminal per station equipment, declared the most modern equipment available in the telephone industry.

The modern dial system for Matador is part of a multi-million dollar expansion and improvement campaign to be carried out in 1962 by General Telephone Company of Southwest, Frazier said.

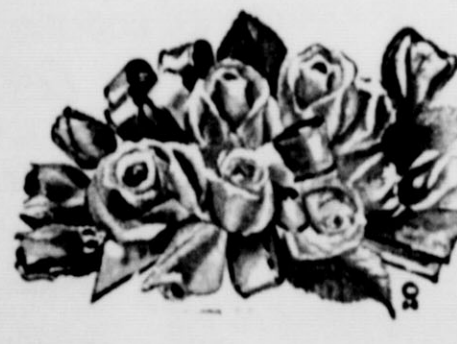
