Funeral services were held at 2:30 Saturday at Roaring Springs for J. W. Hendricks, 77, who died Thursday afternoon in Stanley Hospital, Matador, after a brief illness. He had lived at Roaring Springs for 17 years. He was a retired Missionary Baptist minister and had preached 17 years.

Services were held at the First Baptist Church, Roaring Springs. Rev. Bob Moore, pastor of Skyline Baptist Church, Lubbock, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Ben Pate, pastor of the Afton Baptist, and Rev. Haywood Kube, Roaring Springs pastor.

Mr. Hendricks was born in Alabama, May 19, 1885. He died October 18, 1962 at the age of 77 years, 4 months and 29 days. He was married to Mrs. Jodie Mae Cherryhomes at Plainview, November 24, 1942.

Survivors include the wife of Roaring Springs, two stepdaughters, Mrs. Ray Miller and Mrs. Vern Davis, both of Amarillo and one step-son, D. F. Robinson of Afton, and one brother, Jay Hendricks, address unknown.

Burial was in Roaring Springs cemetery under direction of Eudy Seale Funeral Home, Matador. Pallbearers were Dean McInroe, Buz Thacker, Albert Irwin, Charles Owens, Clyde Williams, all of Roaring Springs, and J. C. Neal of Spur.

## Walter Rogers Here On Campaign Tour

GRAVITY OF THE NATIONAL situation with regard to the Cuban embargo ordered this week by President Kennedy is extremely real, according to Congressman Walter Rogers who was in Matador yesterday.

He said he was going to Fort Worth Friday for a briefing on the Cuban situation.

Congressman Rogers was here at noon on a campaign tour and was guest at an informal luncheon held at the VFW building by a group of supporters. He was accompanied by Mrs. Rogers and two Amarillo friends, Frank Radstine and Jim Smith. S. J. Braselton of Roaring Springs served as master of ceremonies. Address of welcome was made by Mayor Bill Seale, Rev. Roy Patterson gave the invocation and the introduction of the distinguished speaker was made by Duke Lipscomb.

Rogers strongly defended his voting record and blasted his critics. He said he did not vote for Federal aid to education for his critics claimed. He said he voted for the increase of the national budget limit because the money was needed for defense. He said some GOP representative had voted for the defense budget and ten voted against providing money for it. "Money is less important than blood," Congressman Rogers said, "and I voted for defense funds to bring our armament to the strength needed for the protection of our country."

A brief address was made by Vance Gilbreath following the address by Rogers in which he urged contributions to a fund to promote the Democratic cause during the 2 weeks before election. More than \$60 was collected for the fund.

Congressman Rogers and party went from here to Paducah where he was to make another address in interest of his campaign.

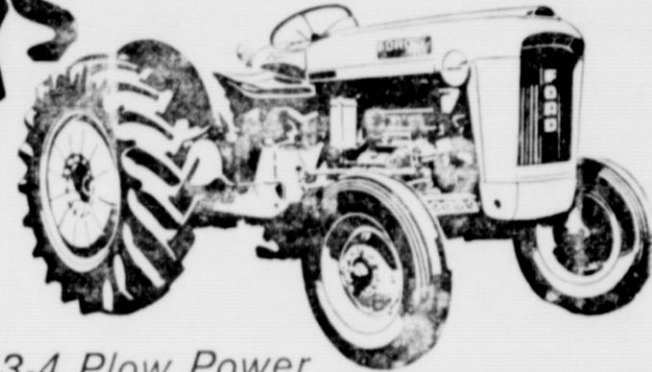

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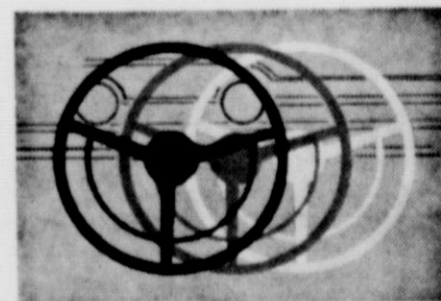
