Pioneer Preacher Has 93rd Birthday

Rev. A. P. Stokes of Afton, pioneer Baptist minister, Monday celebrated his 93rd birthday. The occasion was observed, however, Sunday when seven of his ten children joined him for the day.

Rev. Stokes was the first full time preacher to serve the Paducah Baptist Church. He moved to Cottle County with his family in 1908, from Georgia. Born in Eaton, Ohio, May 21, 1869, he lived for a time in Tennessee, where he was married, and moved to Georgia from there.

After serving the Paducah church for two years, Rev. Stokes moved to Dickens in 1911 and to the Afton community in 1913, where he still lives on the place he homesteaded. Mrs. Stokes died in 1950 and since that time a married son has lived with him and a bachelor son, Walter.

Members of his family who were with him Sunday included J. M. Stokes and his son and family, Mr. and Mrs. James Stokes and children of Littlefield, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Stokes, Waco, Mr. and Mrs. W. Stokes, Bonham; Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Stokes and daughter, Lynne, Weatherford, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Stokes, Matador; Walter Stokes and Mr. and Mrs. John Stokes and their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ronnie Stokes and children, all of Afton.

Rev. Stokes served the Afton Baptist Church as pastor for nine years. For a number of years after he retired, until suffering a stroke seven years ago, he preached on his birthday.

Light Absentee Vote Expected

A light absentee vote is expected in the second Democratic primary scheduled for Saturday, June 3, according to County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan.

Only two applications had been received early this week. In Childress County one absentee vote had been requested, according to the Sunday Childress Index.

Mr. Sheridan reminds voters that Wednesday, May 29, is the last day absentee votes may be registered. The Tribune will probably print a sample ballot next week.

Dormant Accounts List 662 Names

If the Tribune reads differently than usual this week it is because the general news usually carried in the weekly has been "held up" for the First State Bank's list of dormant accounts (more than seven years) as required by law.

Don't get excited if your own name, the name of a friend or relative is published. It does not mean that you are coming into an unexpected legacy. The odds are that it will mean that you are spending more gas in getting to the bank than the account will be, if you can prove ownership.

A total of 662 names (and firms) is listed. Many are for 1c, 3c and 20c. In fact, one bank official said the entire amount involved in 662 accounts is less than \$1,000, or about \$1.50 each average.

The First State Bank had only nine delinquent accounts of its own, but the large list was obtained with the assets of the Roaring Springs First State Bank and the former Matador First National Bank when they were absorbed by the First State Bank here during the depression days.

During that crucial period the depositors in three Motley County banks did not lose a single penny, despite the fact that banks in counties on four sides were closed. The First State Bank here merely absorbed the two other banks and deposits were transferred.

Firemen Will Hold Public Open House

MATADOR FIREMEN are going to hold Open House Monday night and the public is invited, according to an announcement made this week by Freddie Welling, President of Matador Volunteer Fire Department.

The department is going to introduce new officers, give free rides to youngsters on fire trucks, demonstrate fire extinguishers, sponsor a game of water polo and distribute favors to children. The open house will start at 7 p. m.

"We want to interest the public in spring cleanup and general fire prevention," Welling said, "and also we want the public to see our equipment and become better acquainted with the department."

In addition to President Welling, the department officials include Chief Pete Williams, Asst. Chief Ray Holcomb, Asst. Chief Bill McKelvey, Fire Marshal Bob Fullingim and Jack Simpson (undecided).

"The public has a large investment and a great deal at stake in the Matador Volunteer Fire Department," Welling said, "and currently we are faced with certain fire rate problems which may affect everyone who buys fire insurance. We want the public to become better acquainted with the department membership and be our guests at the Monday night open house. Everyone is cordially invited."

The department entertained their families and the city council, wives and families with a barbecue supper last Monday night. Approximately 65 attended. The program included a brief talk by Rev. Miller Robinson.

Almost a constant procession of combines and other equipment is headed east on US Highway 70, as the harvest season approaches. Most of the equipment is from the Plains area and is headed for the Crowell, Vernon and Quanah wheat growing (armland where the crop is ripening).

Surprising harvest here produced almost without rainfall, is attributed to the excellent "underground" moisture left by abundant fall rains.

The "special day" has been organized by a group of citizens who felt a special recognition should be shown a family that has done so much for their town of Floydada and the surrounding area.

Although retiring recently from the newspaper business, Mr. Steen and his wife plan to remain in Floydada where they have resided for over 50 years, and where he was editor-publisher of the Floyd County Hesperian during that time.

'Breakthru' Is New Church TV Series

The Methodist Church's answer to the problems of sub-teen age children—boys and girls of the fourth, fifth and sixth grades—is a new TV series, "Breakthru," which is scheduled in this area for Saturday, May 26.

The program will be on KCBD Channel 11, Lubbock each Saturday at 11:30 a. m. with the exception of one of two dates, according to information received here by Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor of the local church.

At a certain point in each program the film "breaks" and the program continues with a filmed studio discussion by boys and girls in the 9-11 age range.

Through the Methodist Television, Radio and Film Commission, the series will also be made available to churches as a film strip, Rev. Patterson said.

Twister Near City Destroys Property

A SMALL, SWIFT CYCLONE brushed the Matador city limits about 3:30 p. m. Sunday and left damaged property in its wake, but no injuries. Few people saw the cyclone that barely missed the Matador Drive-In Theatre a mile south of town, and headed in a northeasterly direction. A "man-hole" cover at the top of the towering screen was lifted off by the force of the wind. Some damage resulted at the J. D. Spray home just north of the drive-in, including the twisting of a television antenna.

The twister next hit at the Bill Jones home, southeast of East Mound Cemetery entrance, where a trailer was demolished, mesquite trees twisted and uprooted and damage to sheds and other buildings.



Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Rattan are reported to have seen the cyclone. They said it looked like an explosion of black dirt when it touched the ground, and later like an explosion of red dirt when it hit the ground in a different type of soil.

County Judge Elbert Reeves, who lives three miles northeast of Matador, said the twister tore away the side of his tractor shed and that he believes it passed between the house and barn. He and Mrs. Reeves were returning to Matador when the storm struck.

Rainfall registered by Bob Stanley's rain gauge amounted to .26 inch while heavier amounts were recorded in some places. Heavy rain and hail swept a few sections of the county. Some hail fell here in Matador.

The series of storms followed about 10 days and nights of almost uninterrupted high winds. While the showers have aided some sections, the dry weather situation is approaching a crucial state, while the cotton-planting season rapidly passing.

IOOF HOLDS MEETING

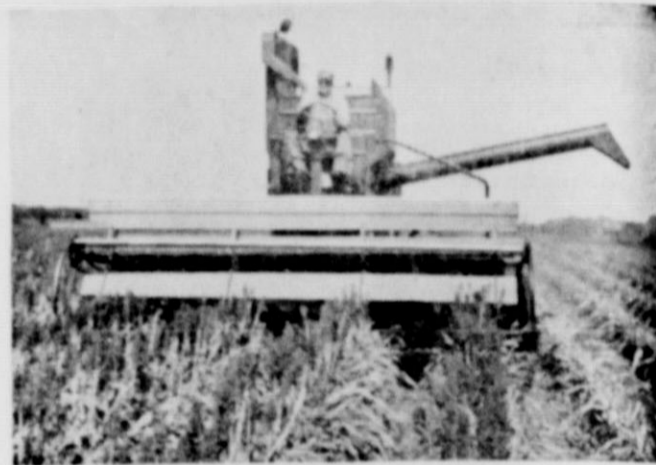

Trees Damaged By Elm Leaf Beetles

Elm leaf beetles are again damaging shade trees in Matador, according to County Agent Bill Palmeyer. He said larvae of the beetle are feeding on the under surface of the leaves, causing a ragged appearance.

First generation usually causes the most damage, and immediate control results in less damage to the tree.

For control, underside of the leaves must be covered. For a mixture of 100 gallons, use either of the following materials: 1 1/2 pints of 57% emulsifiable

Malathion or one quart of 25% emulsifiable DDT, or four pounds of lead arsenate and 16 pounds of fish or linseed oil.

The best time to spray is soon after daybreak when the air is generally calm and there is less chance of drifting. Care should be exercised in preventing lead arsenate from reaching the surfaces of buildings, since it may cause staining.

Palmeyer cautions users that all three materials are poisonous to human, birds, fish and wildlife, and urges that they be used with extreme care.
