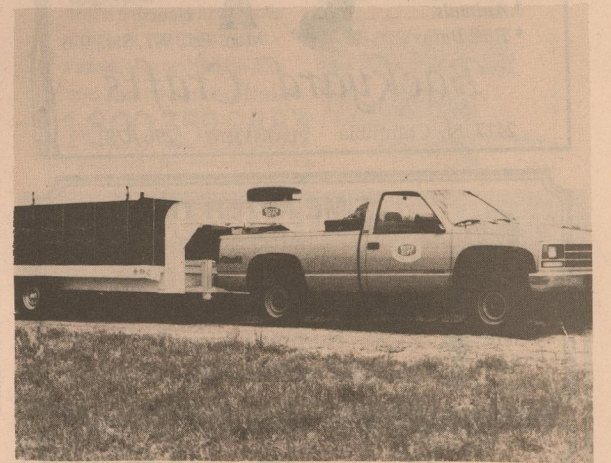

Roaring Springs Can Now Haul Citizens' Trash

Times are changing and so is Roaring Springs!

The City of Roaring Springs has purchased a pickup and trailer to haul trash to the Floydada Landfill.

The first day for dumping trash will be Friday, May 20. Hours for dumping will be 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. An attendant will be at the site to assist anyone who might need help. The trailer will be located at the old Compress loading dock west of the Red Ball Gin on Loop 42. Please cooperate in keeping the site clean as the Red Ball Gin owners have graciously allowed us to use this area. Also

do not leave trash or any items at the site when the trailer is not there.

Additional information regarding hours and items that can and cannot be dumped will be enclosed with your water bill which you will receive June 1.

Even if you do not have trash to be dumped Friday, drive by and see the new equipment. We are very proud of it, and the Mayor and City Council hope that this trash hauling attempt will be much more convenient for you as well as saving you a 28-mile trip when you need to dump trash.

Matador City Council Report

The City Council of Matador met Thursday, May 12 at 8:00 a.m. for regular session.

First item of business was to canvass the election results of the May 7 election. There had been two ballots thrown out, due to the fact they had all three councilmen candidates marked on the ballots and only two should have been marked. The count was Don Warren, 50; Shane Jones, 45; and Pete Williams, 43. Council accepted the count, putting Don Warren on the Council along with Incumbent Shane Jones.

Other items on the agenda include the following:

* Council heard Russell McInturf, Attorney at law with Calame Linebarger Graham & Pena Law Firm of Odessa. He has been with the firm as a delinquent tax attorney since 1987.

After the Mayor explained the situation with the law firms in the past, McInturf assured the Council they would not quit collection just with the large accounts but they would help the City clear up the unclaimed lots and have a delinquent tax sale.

McInturf explained they only charge the 15% they add to the delinquent tax and will do all the title work before the tax sales.

Council accepted the Delinquent Tax Resolution for the law firm to collect the back taxes of approximately \$14,000 and hire Mr. McInturf.

* Glen Martin of Spur requested to contract part or all of the solid waste he picks up to the Matador landfill. As his business grows it could mean 75 to 100 tons per month for \$20 per ton.

The Council at this time is not ready to take on that much solid waste, and cannot take on any until they get another dozer. At present it takes 3 hours to cover the waste each day. The Council did say that

Martin could probably start dumping on days they were dumping too.

* A matter of information from Charles Keith was he had attended a SPAG meeting to find out what to do to apply for funds to help with the meals on wheels program that is funded with 90% SPAG funds and 10% County or City funds. Keith explained the 10% could be done by in-kind services.

Keith stated he mainly wants to know if there is enough interest to pursue the project. He also had found out there are funds for needy Senior Citizens for home updates for safety or health purposes.

* Landfill and sewer plant reports were given. They are still waiting on a dozer or loader and for the State land acquisition.

Approximately 6,000 yards of clay has been hauled at present for the pond liner, with 4,000 yards still being needed, to the sewer plant.

* Don Warren was appointed to be Farm Manager of the City Farm Property.

* Council went into executive session at this time.

Meeting adjourned.

County Extension Agent Speaks To Club On Wildlife Survival

The program for Matador Garden Club when it met April 18, explored "Nature's Habitat and Plants to Attract Wildlife," and dealt specifically with the Bobwhite quail, with Michael Clawson, Motley County Extension Agent as speaker. The purpose of this particular area of wildlife study, Agent Clawson explained, was due to the fact that the population of Bobwhite quail had decreased in recent years.

According to Agent Clawson, three components necessary for wildlife survival, including quail, are water, cover (shelter) and food. "Trends toward environmental concerns and improving wildlife habitats in rural and urban settings became vital as evidence showed that Bobwhite quail alone had an 80% annual loss in population with or without hunting," he said.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has set up a Backyard Wildlife Habitat Certification Program which gives recognition to citizens who provide habitat by improving living conditions

for wildlife on their property. "By providing food, water and cover for wildlife through the use of feeders, water devices or nest boxes you help offset the loss of habitat," he said. "Planting and maintaining native plants will help restore that habitat on your property."

He further emphasized the project with tracts and posters, and demonstrated with slides types of grasses and cover that supply these needs. Since different species of plants and grass that provide brush protection for shelter and roosting, and

weed seeds that supply food are native to this area, several club members were able to identify them as they were shown on the screen.

Also a trend toward environmental concerns and projects is that of the "Bobwhite Brigade." The first annual meeting of this organization was held last year at the Crooked River Ranch in Schackelford County as an educational program on Bobwhite quail for 4-H members. Two boys from Motley County attended the meeting, Darryn Perryman, 4-H member, and Brandon Blanch, who is in FFA, and accompanied the County Agent.

Woody plants for wildlife of the Texas Rolling Plains, and Key seed producing plants (forbs and grasses) for quail were highlighted on 17" x 23" posters provided by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for distribution to groups. Fact sheets contained interesting information concerning food requirements of the Bobwhite quail. For example a pound of sunflower seeds contains 32,000 seeds, and 1,160 are needed daily per quail.

A lively question and answer session followed the presentation, which revealed much knowledge on the part of the women, especially from those with farm and ranch experience.

Mrs. Sue Seigler, president, opened the meeting and welcomed members and guests, and at the conclusion of the program, Mrs. Winifred Lee, hostess, served refreshments. Others present were Mr. and Mrs. Mark Seigler, Opal Bradford, Marisue Potts, Winifred Darsey, Artie Wason, Opal Pipkin, Callie Giesecke, Lila Meador and Bailey Elliott.

From Etiquette at Church, she says it is not etiquette to be late at church, don't sit in other people's pews, don't turn around and

look, never punch people or giggle. "Etiquette is what you are doing and saying when people are looking and listening". From Spring - "Spring is beautiful, and smells sweet. Spring is when you draw a circle in the dirt with your finger and win all the boys marbles - I rub salt on my shooting thumb to make it tough." And from The Library - the library is full of dust, there are three kinds of books, books people do like to read and books people do not like to read and books people will never read.

Public Notice

On March 23, 1994, GTE and Contel ("The Companies") filed applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") to restructure the Companies' Switched Transport rate category and reduce the Carrier Common Line (CCL) charge of its Switched Access Service. The tariff sheets in GTE and Contel's applications, if approved, will bring the Companies' state access tariffs into structural parity with their interstate tariffs for the Local Transport rate category, which became effective on December 30, 1993.

GTE and Contel propose to implement the new tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. The Local Transport category of GTE and Contel's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers.

Persons who wish to intervene should file a motion for intervention with the PUC by June 17, 1994 with reference to Docket No. 12866 (GTE) and/or 12865 (Contel). "For in Him we live and move and exist, as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we also are His offspring.' Being then the offspring of God, we ought not to think that the Divine Nature is like gold or silver or stone, an image formed by the art and thought of man." (Acts 17:28-29)

You and I have been created in the image of God. We must not and cannot create God in our image.

Each of the candidates for the offices made speeches to persuade the student body to vote for them.

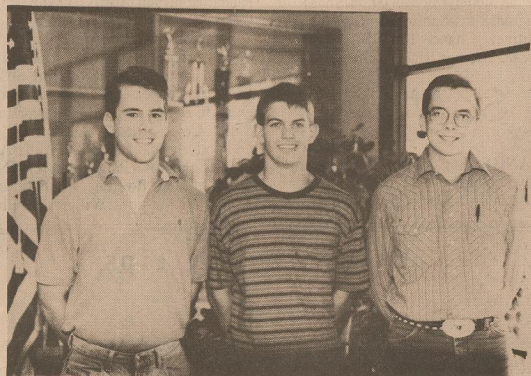

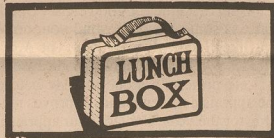

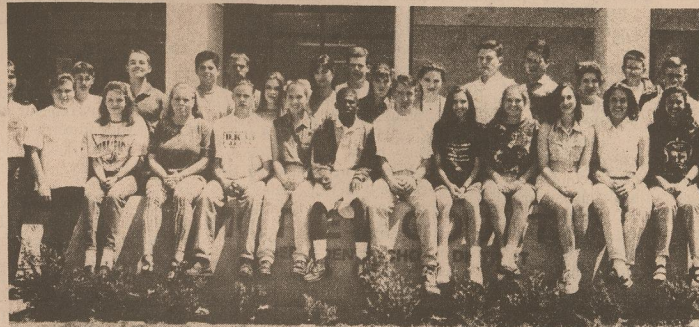

ACP COST SHARE PROGRAMS

Agriculture Conservation Programs are designed to assist farmers and ranchers with technical needs in developing conservation practices to help reduce erosion by wind and water runoff. Landowners and operators of this nation's privately owned land are extremely good stewards of our natural resource. It is in every citizen's best interest to know that the conservation needs of the land are being met, even when it is not practical economically in some cases. Occasionally, financial incentives are required to ensure that the most critical conservation measures are taken. County Office Committees and technical agencies such as Soil Conservation Service work together in reducing soil erosion by developing plans, offering cost-shared practices, and administering county level developed conservation practice guidelines. Motley County farmers and ranch-

ers are constantly making the necessary efforts toward reducing erosion conditions. Many decisions in this area of agriculture are hard to make, but later generations will be glad we did - then it will be their responsibility to maintain the standards of being good stewards of their natural resources we left them.

Dickens County ASCS was recently notified of authorization to implement Emergency Feed Programs. Under contiguous county rules, Motley County livestock producers are authorized to make application. With recent rains and warning conditions however, pastures are rapidly improving causing supplemental feed needs to diminish greatly. The County Committee has made application for Emergency haying and grazing of ACR, CU pay, and CRP acres due to the extremely low hay stocks. Authorization should be known soon.

TAX TIPS

PROPERTY TAX PROTEST AND APPEAL PROCEDURES

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- * the value placed on your property
- * any exemptions that may apply to you
- * the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- * the taxable status of your property
- * the local governments which should be taxing your property.
- * any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

Motley County Appraisal District will conduct informal reviews on May 31, 1994. Please call 347-2273.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the

appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at P.O. Box 779, Matador, TX 79244.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at Motley County Appraisal District (806) 347-2273. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH ARB *

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Social Security Tips

SOCIAL SECURITY'S TOLL-FREE NUMBER AVAILABLE AT NIGHT AND ON WEEKENDS

If you're like other busy people, finding time to take care of your personal business during the day is often a problem. That's why Social Security's toll-free phone number gives you service at night and on weekends, in addition to normal business hours.

When you call 1-800-772-1213 on your touch-tone phone at night and at any time during weekends and holidays, you get a recorded menu of choices that lets you take care of certain kinds of Social Security business. You can ask for:

- An application for an original or replacement Social Security card.
- A form to obtain a record of your earnings and an estimate of your future Social Security benefits. This is called a **Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement**.
- A document verifying that you

receive Social Security benefit payments, Supplemental Security Income, or both. You may need this document to show proof of your income to other agencies.

You can also call to ask for these forms during daytime hours - 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on business days. Our phones are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so if your business can wait, it's best to call at less busy times - such as nights and weekends, or later in the month.

Shifting your call to less busy times helps not only you, but all callers. About one of every five calls made during peak periods are to request one of the three documents listed above. So if those calls are shifted to less busy times, other callers stand a better chance of getting through without a busy signal.

Other services available to callers at night on a weekend include recorded information about Social Security programs and the opportunity to order popular Social Security leaflets.

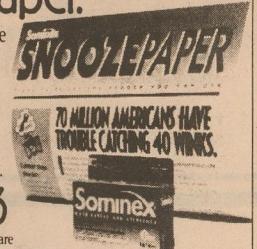
